Licensing Sub-Committee Hearings

This guide details the procedure for Licensing Sub-Committee hearings under the Licensing Act 2003. Whilst this will be used in most cases, the procedure will be altered in exceptional circumstances and when for example Personal Licences, Temporary Event Notices and Reviews are considered.

A Licensing Sub-Committee will be held if:

- The applicant has applied for a Premises Licence, Provisional Statement, Club Premises Certificate or expressed their intention to vary their existing licence/certificate and has advertised this in a local newspaper and displayed a distinctive blue notice at the premises, following which representations have been made by a Responsible Authority or Other Person/s.
- A Review has been requested by a Responsible Authority or Other Person/s and the Review has been advertised by displaying a distinctive blue notice at the premises and also at the Council's office and website.
- An application is made to transfer a Premises Licence or for interim authority and the Police have issued an objection
- The applicant has made a Personal Licence application and the Police have objected to the Licence being granted.
- A Temporary Event Notice has been given and the Police and/or those in the Council that exercise environmental health functions have issued an objection.

Prior to your item being heard:

- The Licensing team upon receiving representations will form a view as to whether the representations are irrelevant, frivolous, vexatious or for review applications; repetitious.
- The Licensing team would have provided written notice to all parties in advance of the hearing and would have responded to any request relating to personal details being removed from the agenda.

Making decisions on the items being heard:

Hearings will normally be held in public unless the Sub-Committee believe it not to be in the public interest to do so. Although the Chair will try to make the proceedings as informal as possible, these hearings are of a quasi-judicial nature, and the rules of natural justice shall apply.

Only those Responsible Authorities and Other Persons who have made a relevant representation in writing at the consultation stage **can register to speak at a subsequent hearing**. Applicants, Other Persons and Responsible Authorities will all be given a fair opportunity to put their case and the Sub-Committee will take these representations into account when making their decision. The Sub-Committee may still make a decision on any matter even if any party fails to attend the hearing. However, in these circumstances, it will only be that party's written representation that may be taken into account.

For new applications relating to Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates, Members can grant with additional conditions attached to the licence, exclude any licensable activities, refuse a Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) if appropriate or reject the application.

Members when making decisions on variation applications regarding a Premises Licence or Club Premises Certificate, can modify (add, delete or amend) conditions on the licence or reject the application in whole or part. Members will be considering the request for a variation and the impact that this may have. Therefore, representations should be focused on the impact of the variation, although concerns relating to the existing terms of the licence may be relevant in considering the track record of the applicant. However, Members may consider other issues which relate to the promotion of the licensing objectives, although only if it is reasonable and proportionate to do so.

For Provisional Statements, Members can consider any steps that are necessary having regard to the representations made in order to ensure the licensing objectives are not undermined.

Members when deciding a Review application can modify (add, delete or amend) the conditions of the licence, exclude any licensable activities, remove a DPS if appropriate, suspend the licence/certificate for up to 3 months or revoke the licence/certificate completely.

For transfer of Premises Licences, interim authority requests and Personal Licence applications Members can only refuse or grant the application.

Members when deciding on an objection made against a Temporary Event Notice (TEN) will determine whether or not to issue a Counter Notice, which if issued will prevent the proposed event from proceeding. If a TEN has been given for a premises that already has a licence/certificate, Members may impose any of those conditions from the existing licence/certificate to the TEN.

Before the meeting starts:

The Sub-Committee Members are requested to report for business no more than half an hour before the meeting starts to deal with any administrative/procedural issues. This will allow Members to consider;

- the appointment for any substitutes if required
- the appointment of the chair
- any procedural issues
- obtain the list of attendees
- late documents delivered prior to the meeting and to ensure all the paperwork is in order

The Sub-Committee will not be considering any of the actual points raised within the Report itself and no Responsible Authority or Other Person/s shall be present when the Sub-Committee deal with the above issues.

Attending the hearing that concerns you:

All Applicants, Other Persons and Responsible Authorities involved will be informed in writing of the date and time that their application will be considered by the Licensing Sub-Committee. Please contact the Licensing Service on 020 8356 4970 or email licensing@hackney.gov.uk to confirm whether you wish to attend and/or register to speak at the Sub-Committee hearing or if you wish for someone else to speak on your behalf. If you are unable to attend, the application may be heard in your absence.

All parties should arrive promptly at the outset of the scheduled meeting regardless of when the item is listed to be heard on the agenda.

Please contact the Licensing Service for advice within 4 working days from the date on the notice letter if any of the following apply;

- you have special requirements to help make your representation, because of a disability or you need a translator for example
- you wish to supply additional [documentary] information such as photographs and videos/DVDs

Please note that if you wish to provide additional relevant information, this should be given at least **5 working days** before the hearing. Any additional information provided once the hearing has started will only be accepted if all parties agree. Please note that the use of videos/DVDs is at the Sub-Committee's discretion – requests to show these should be made in advance to the Committee Officer.

Timings

In most cases the application will last no longer than 1 hour, and the times to be allocated to each section are shown on the relevant hearing procedure. If you think that your evidence is likely to exceed this time period, please let the Licensing Service know within 4 working days of the date on the notice letter and the Sub-Committee will be advised. If your request is agreed, all parties will also be granted the same extension of time.

Rights of Press and Public to Report on Meetings

Where a meeting of the Council and its committees are open to the public, the press and public are welcome to report on meetings of the Council and its committees, through any audio, visual or written methods and may use digital and social media providing they do not disturb the conduct of the meeting and providing that the person reporting or providing the commentary is present at the meeting.

Those wishing to film, photograph or audio record a meeting are asked to notify the Council's Monitoring Officer by noon on the day of the meeting, if possible, or any time prior to the start of the meeting or notify the Chair at the start of the meeting.

The Monitoring Officer, or the Chair of the meeting, may designate a set area from which all recording must take place at a meeting.

The Council will endeavour to provide reasonable space and seating to view, hear and record the meeting. If those intending to record a meeting require any other reasonable facilities, notice should be given to the Monitoring Officer in advance of the meeting and will only be provided if practicable to do so.

The Chair shall have discretion to regulate the behaviour of all those present recording a meeting in the interests of the efficient conduct of the meeting. Anyone acting in a disruptive manner may be required by the Chair to cease recording or may be excluded from the meeting. Disruptive behaviour may include: moving from any designated recording area; causing excessive noise; intrusive lighting; interrupting the meeting; or filming members of the public who have asked not to be filmed.

All those visually recording a meeting are requested to only focus on recording councillors, officers and the public who are directly involved in the conduct of the meeting. The Chair of the meeting will ask any members of the public present if they have objections to being visually recorded. Those visually recording a meeting are asked to respect the wishes of those who do not wish to be filmed or photographed. Failure by someone recording a meeting to respect the

wishes of those who do not wish to be filmed and photographed may result in the Chair instructing them to cease recording or in their exclusion from the meeting.

If a meeting passes a motion to exclude the press and public then in order to consider confidential or exempt information, all recording must cease and all recording equipment must be removed from the meeting room. The press and public are not permitted to use any means which might enable them to see or hear the proceedings whilst they are excluded from a meeting and confidential or exempt information is under consideration.

Providing oral commentary during a meeting is not permitted.

Lobbying of Councillors

If a person or an organisation wants to make a representation to the Licensing Sub-Committee, they must **NOT** contact Sub-Committee Members directly. Licensing Sub-Committee Members have to retain an open mind on any application and determine it on its merits. Members can not be in anyway biased towards a party. Therefore, if a Member of the Sub-Committee has had any prior involvement they must ensure that they come to the hearing with an open mind.

Local ward councillors may be able to speak on behalf of objectors if requested to do so, provided that if they have a disclosable pecuniary interest they leave the meeting room when the application is being considered unless they have been granted dispensation.

Reports

Agendas and Reports for Licensing Sub-Committees are published on the Council's website (www.hackney.gov.uk) 5 working days before the hearing takes place. Copies are also available by contacting Governance Services on 0208 356 3578 or email governance@hackney.gov.uk. Copies of applications together with the detail of any objections will be included in the report.

Appeals

Applicants or any party to the hearing can appeal against the decision made by the Sub-Committee. The appeal to the Thames Magistrates Court must be made within 21 days of the decision being sent formally in writing. However, TEN's have the added restriction that no appeals can be made later than 5 working days before the event is scheduled to take place.

Withdrawal of an Item or Cancellation of a Hearing

An item may be withdrawn from the agenda of a Licensing Sub-Committee meeting at short notice due to the withdrawal or resolution of the representations or objections to an application or notice. A hearing by the Licensing Sub-Committee may therefore be cancelled at short notice if there are no substantive items remaining on the agenda.

As much advance notice as is practicable of the withdrawal of an item on the agenda or cancellation of a meeting of the Licensing Sub-Committee will be provided on the Council's website but please note that this might be as little as a few hours before the hearing if the applicant chooses to leave it that late to satisfactorily address any representation or objection giving rise to the need for a hearing.

Facilities

There are public toilets available, with wheelchair access, on the ground floor of the Town Hall. Induction loop facilities are available in the Assembly Halls, rooms 101, 102 & 103 and the Council Chamber. Access for people with mobility difficulties can be obtained through the ramp on the side to the main Town Hall entrance.

ADVICE TO MEMBERS ON DECLARING INTERESTS

Hackney Council's Code of Conduct applies to <u>all</u> Members of the Council, the Mayor and co-opted Members.

This note is intended to provide general guidance for Members on declaring interests. However, you may need to obtain specific advice on whether you have an interest in a particular matter. If you need advice, you can contact:

- The Corporate Director of Legal, HR and Regulatory Services;
- The Legal Adviser to the committee; or
- Governance Services.

If at all possible, you should try to identify any potential interest you may have before the meeting so that you and the person you ask for advice can fully consider all the circumstances before reaching a conclusion on what action you should take.

1. Do you have a disclosable pecuniary interest in any matter on the agenda or which is being considered at the meeting?

You will have a disclosable pecuniary interest in a matter if it:

- relates to an interest that you have already registered in Parts A and C of the Register of Pecuniary Interests of you or your spouse/civil partner, or anyone living with you as if they were your spouse/civil partner;
- ii. relates to an interest that should be registered in Parts A and C of the Register of Pecuniary Interests of your spouse/civil partner, or anyone living with you as if they were your spouse/civil partner, but you have not yet done so; or
- iii. affects your well-being or financial position or that of your spouse/civil partner, or anyone living with you as if they were your spouse/civil partner.

2. If you have a disclosable pecuniary interest in an item on the agenda you must:

- i. Declare the existence and <u>nature</u> of the interest (in relation to the relevant agenda item) as soon as it becomes apparent to you (subject to the rules regarding sensitive interests).
- ii. You must leave the room when the item in which you have an interest is being discussed. You cannot stay in the meeting room or public gallery whilst discussion of the item takes place and you cannot vote on the matter. In addition, you must not seek to improperly influence the decision.
- iii. If you have, however, obtained dispensation from the Monitoring Officer or Standards Committee you may remain in the room and participate in the meeting. If dispensation has been granted it will stipulate the extent of your involvement, such as whether you can only be present to make representations, provide evidence or whether you are able to fully participate and vote on the matter in which you have a pecuniary interest.

3. Do you have any other non-pecuniary interest on any matter on the agenda which is being considered at the meeting?

You will have 'other non-pecuniary interest' in a matter if:

- i. It relates to an external body that you have been appointed to as a Member or in another capacity; or
- ii. It relates to an organisation or individual which you have actively engaged in supporting.

4. If you have other non-pecuniary interest in an item on the agenda you must:

- i. Declare the existence and <u>nature</u> of the interest (in relation to the relevant agenda item) as soon as it becomes apparent to you.
- ii. You may remain in the room, participate in any discussion or vote provided that contractual, financial, consent, permission or licence matters are not under consideration relating to the item in which you have an interest.
- iii. If you have an interest in a contractual, financial, consent, permission or licence matter under consideration, you must leave the room unless you have obtained a dispensation from the Monitoring Officer or Standards Committee. You cannot stay in the room or public gallery whilst discussion of the item takes place and you cannot vote on the matter. In addition, you must not seek to improperly influence the decision. Where members of the public are allowed to make representations, or to give evidence or answer questions about the matter you may, with the permission of the meeting, speak on a matter then leave the room. Once you have finished making your representation, you must leave the room whilst the matter is being discussed.
- iv. If you have been granted dispensation, in accordance with the Council's dispensation procedure you may remain in the room. If dispensation has been granted it will stipulate the extent of your involvement, such as whether you can only be present to make representations, provide evidence or whether you are able to fully participate and vote on the matter in which you have a non pecuniary interest.

Relevant Extracts from Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy

Please find below relevant extracts from the Statement of Licensing Policy 2011.

LP1 Planning

Licence applications should normally be from premises where:

- (a) The activity to be authorised by the licence is a lawful planning use or is a deemed permitted development pursuant to the General Permitted Development Order (1995)
- (b) The hours sought do not exceed those authorised by any planning permission.

Note- Where the appropriate planning consent has not been obtained in advance and relevant representations are made, applicants will need to demonstrate that the operation of the premises would not be detrimental to the promotion of the licensing objectives.

LP2 Provisional Statements

The principles to be applied for provisional statements are similar to those applied for premises licences.

The application form for provisional statements is to include:

- Clear plans of the proposed structure
- An operating schedule including details of:
 - The activities to take place there
 - The time at which such activities will take place
 - The proposed hours of opening
 - Where the applicant wishes the licence to have effect for a limited period, that period
 - The steps to be taken to promote the licensing objectives, and
 - Where the sale of alcohol is involved, whether supplies are proposed to be for consumption on or off the premises (or both) and the name of the designated premises supervisor the applicant wishes to specify.

LP3 The Application Form and Operating Schedule (minimum requirements)

The application form is to outline the operations of the entire licensed business or event and must include:

- (a) Prescribed plans
- (b) A general description of the style and character of the business or event to be conducted at the premises or venue, e.g. supermarket, restaurant, cinema, nightclub, or street party

- (c) An indication of the type of entertainment available
- (d) The relevant licensable activities to be undertaken at the premises or event, preferably with a risk assessment in respect of these activities
- (e) The times during which each of the proposed licensable activities are to take place
- (f) Any other times during which it is proposed that the premises or event be open to the public
- (g) Where the applicant wishes the licence to have effect for a limited period, that period to be specified
- (h) Whether alcohol is to be supplied for consumption on or off the premises or both
- (i) Where alcohol is to be supplied, details of the designated premises supervisor (not necessary for premises holding club premises certificates unless alcohol is to be sold rather than supplied to members)
- (j) Whether they propose to have sexual entertainment involving nudity or striptease or any other activity involving full or partial nudity, e.g. topless waitresses etc, or sex related entertainment such as the showing of films or other recordings with an 18 restricted category. This will need to be licensed as a sex establishment under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, as amended. The applicant must demonstrate that they hold the relevant licence
- (k) The steps which are proposed to promote the licensing objectives. In doing this, applicants are strongly encouraged to address the LPs as applicable.

Note:

- The conditions that are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives should normally emerge initially from a prospective licence or certificate holder's application.
- If the application has been granted the details of the application will be incorporated into the licence as conditions. Breach of these conditions could result in prosecution or a review and ultimately revocation.
- Where representations are made and the matter progresses to a Licensing Sub Committee, if the Sub Committee have:
 - Doubts about the applicant's ability to promote the licensing objectives and comply with the terms of a licence (for example, proposed conditions, and how licensable activities will be conducted during the operation of the licence)

- ii) Doubts around the track record of the management and suitability of the DPS,
- iii) Been notified of any actions taken by responsible authorities or the licensing authority in relation to the premises
- iv) Been notified of recent or historical complaints

the Council may not grant the permission as sought.

LP4 Crime and Disorder

Applicants are expected to demonstrate within their application measures to prevent crime and disorder, such as:

- (a) Details of registered door supervisors and other staff to be provided including their relevant qualifications or registrations, the number of such staff, their location whilst working at the premises and the times they will be on duty. All door supervisors are to be licensed by the Security Industry Authority (www.the-sia.org.uk)
- (b) Locations of any physical security features to protect the premises, customers and staff, such as CCTV equipment, alarms systems, secure window locks to be used inside/outside the premises. When referring to CCTV, identify its coverage of the interior and exterior of the premises, that it is to be recordable, kept for a minimum of 31 days and made available to the Police and Licensing Authority on request. When details of security measures are provided, they will be kept out of the public domain
- (c) Provision of adequate search facilities where appropriate to the use of the premises. This may include use of technology such as club scan, weapon arches and search wands
- (d) Measures proposed to prevent possession, supply or consumption of illegal drugs and possession of weapons. For example, designing out areas or surfaces where there is a risk of crime, drug detection and confiscation policies, internal patrols
- (e) Measures to be implemented to promote sensible drinking and prevent binge drinking. For instance, by the display of safe drinking material or legal warnings
- (f) Arrangements for any promotional events such as "happy hours" or special offers should be avoided having regard to the mandatory conditions. If any such event is undertaken, careful consideration should be given to their duration, times, location within premises and any additional measures (such as increased security), to minimise crime and disorder
- (g) Location of lighting inside/outside the premises
- (h) Other measures aimed at preventing crime and discouraging anti-social behaviour. Careful regard should be given to the Council applying its borough wide DPPO ("Controlled Drinking Area"). Depending on the

circumstances, this may for example include the restricted sale of low cost, high strength alcohol (which may be indicated by wording such as "super" on the drinks packaging) and the display of signage highlighting that the premises is located in a Controlled Drinking Area

- (i) Whether or not the premises will be serving alcohol in glass or plastic containers; if serving alcohol in glass containers, identify what measures will be implemented to ensure patrons cannot take glass outside the premises
- (j) Whether the premises belongs to a local Pub Watch scheme or has complied with a Police Club Industry Minimum Operating Standards (CIMOS) report
- (k) The availability of drinking water
- (I) The location of any toughened glass to be installed at the premises
- (m) The details of any proof of age scheme to be implemented
- (n) The maximum capacity figure for the premises and a statement demonstrating the premises' ability to accommodate the predicted number of patrons safely and how this is managed, for example by way of door supervision or counting mechanisms such as clickers
- (o) Whether the premises has undertaken a Police Drug Ion Itemiser Tracker assessment or cooperated with any other Police investigation in order to detect crime and disorder. Where premises have taken part in such activity, an explanation of the outcomes, including any actions taken in addressing the issues raised is encouraged
- (p) Whether queue management arrangements are in place. This may include door supervision and/or the use of barriers where these do not obstruct the public highway
- (q) Whether staff training on the licensing objectives is provided and recorded
- (r) Whether other socially responsible practices are employed, such as anti spiking measures, use of hand bag clips, notices and designated driver schemes
- (s) Whether other management practices are employed, such as maintenance of incident and accident logs, refusal of sales logs, refusal of entry logs, server training, provision of emergency contact numbers to regulatory agencies should contact with management be required as a matter of importance
- (t) Whether appropriate safeguards are in place to address the potential risks and impacts of gang related activity, particularly where the area and/or the premises are renowned for being a source of or associated with gang related activity.

LP5 Public Nuisance

Applicants are expected to demonstrate within their application that problems such as noise, light, smoke, odour, litter, anti-social behaviour, human waste, fly posting and highways/footpath obstructions can be minimised through steps they propose.

For example, the application should where necessary:

- (a) Demonstrate that, between 11.00 pm and 7.00 am:
 - No noise is audible a metre from the façade of the nearest noise sensitive premises, or
 - No noise is audible within the nearest noise sensitive premises.
 - There is no discharge of glass recycling bins and no waste/recycling collections

Depending on the individual circumstances, the Council may request the provision of an acoustic report

- (b) Provide details of the location and types of noise attenuation measures used to minimise noise and vibration escaping the premises and car parking areas. Such measures may include sound-proofing, acoustic lobbies and sound limitation devices
- (c) Demonstrate measures to avoid vehicular queuing on the carriageway and disturbances from patrons queuing on the footpath
- (d) Illustrate the location of any taxi ranks, bus stops, train or tube stations in relation to the premises
- (e) Provide details of the location of gardens, open-air areas and the number of tables and chairs (where relevant) within the property boundary for use by patrons drinking, eating, smoking, queuing or congregating outside, and the hours of use of such areas

Provide details of how outside areas will be managed, in particular:

- The hours of use of any outside area where for example smoking, eating and drinking will be permitted. These may explain that use of the area is prohibited after a certain time to avoid disturbance late at night where residents are located nearby
- Measures to prevent drinks being spiked where people leave these unattended
- Where there is payment for admission, how re-entry can be managed – for example by the use of wrist bands
- Measures to ensure that patrons outside do not create nuisance from noise, smoke, obstruction or litter to neighbours or members of the general public
- Use of any physical security features and CCTV
- Use of door supervisors to monitor the area and people's behaviour
- Clear delineation of outside areas in consultation with Environmental Enforcement Services and Public Realm to

- avoid the obstruction of any public highway
- Provision of regular glass collection and cleaning patrols
- Any offer of a waited table service

Demonstrate that there are effective dispersal policies in place, such as:

- Door supervision
- Notices and posters asking patrons to enter and exit the premises quietly
- "Winding down" periods

NOTE:

For good practice guidance on managing the end of a night, applicants may wish to refer to the NOCTIS Dispersal Policy available at: www.noctisuk.org

- (f) Provide details of permissions where relevant (for example, planning permission or a street trading licence) for any gardens, open-air areas or tables and chairs to be used by patrons
- (g) Provide details of the refuse and waste management arrangements and collection times in place at the premises, including where on the premises refuse and recycling will be stored before collection. Give details of trade waste agreements that exist for the premises
- (h) Identify whether the activity will generate additional litter (including flyposters and/or illegal placards) in the vicinity of the premises, and the measures to deal with any such litter

LP6 The Protection of Children from Harm

- (a) Applicants are expected to demonstrate within their application that those factors that have the potential to harm children have been addressed. These include the potential for children to:
 - (i) Purchase, acquire or consume alcohol. (details of any proof of age schemes should be provided)
 - (ii) Be exposed to drugs, drug taking or drug dealing
 - (iii) Be exposed to gambling
 - (iv) Be exposed to activities of an adult or sexual nature including the exhibition of film, or transmission of programmes or videos that include strong language and/or sexual content
 - (v) Be exposed to incidents of violence or disorder
 - (vi) Be exposed to environmental pollution such as excessive noise
 - (vii) Be exposed to hazards

(viii) Purchase cigarettes from vending machines. The Council expects these machines to be in sight and under the supervision of bar staff

Note – This is not intended to be an exhaustive list.

- (b) Alcohol is not to be served to under 18s, except in the limited circumstances allowed for by the Licensing Act 2003. For example children aged between 16 and 18 are only permitted to consume beer, wine or cider on licensed premises if accompanied by an individual aged 18 or over and if eating a table meal (this excludes bar snacks). (This excludes venues holding a club premises certificate where over 18s only are allowed alcohol.)
- (c) Where relevant representations have been made, the Council will not normally permit children to be admitted where:
 - (i) Entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is commonly provided
 - (ii) There have been convictions for serving alcohol to under 18s
 - (iii) Certain gambling activities take place (see Council guidance note)
 - (iv) There have been convictions of harbouring drug dealings or the premises has a known association with drug dealers
 - Note The Act details a number of measures designed to protect children in licensed premises. The Council will work closely with the Police and its partners to ensure appropriate enforcement of the law, in line with the Council's Enforcement Policy
- (d) Where limiting access to children is considered necessary, the Council will consider the following options:
 - (i) A limit on the hours when children may be present
 - (ii) An age limitation (for under 18s)
 - (iii) A limitation or exclusion when certain activities are taking place
 - (iv) A requirement for children to be accompanied by an adult
 - (v) Access may be limited to certain parts of the premises
- (e) No conditions will be imposed requiring that children be admitted to any premises and, where no limitation is imposed, this will be left to the discretion of the individual licensee
- (f) Events provided primarily for children will not be permitted to sell alcohol on or from the premises
- (g) Where internet access is provided measures may be put in place to ensure children are suitably supervised in those areas.

LP7 Access to Cinemas, Theatres, Auditoriums and similar premises

- (a) Licensees are required to restrict children from viewing age-restricted films according to the recommendations of the British Board of Film Classification or, where relevant, any age restriction agreed by the Council. The licensee should state in the operating schedule what measures are to be put in place to control such access
- (b) For regulated entertainment especially presented for children, the Council will, where relevant representations have been made, require the following arrangements in order to control entry to and exit from the premises to ensure their safety:
 - An adult member of staff to be stationed in the vicinity of every exit, subject to there being a minimum of one member of staff per 50 children or part thereof
 - (ii) No child, unless accompanied by an adult, to be permitted in the front two rows of any balcony
 - (iii) No standing to be permitted in any part of the auditorium during the performance

Note The Council will expect these issues to be satisfactorily addressed in operating schedules. The Council will consider attaching conditions to licences and permissions to prevent harm to children.

LP8 Public Safety

Applicants are expected to demonstrate within their application measures to protect public safety, including:

- (a) A current fire risk assessment as required by the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005. If this has not been undertaken, the Fire Authority are likely to make a relevant representation on public safety grounds
- (b) Safe use of special effects/equipments (lasers, smoke machines, strobe lights etc) which may affect public safety (particularly in music and dance venues and similar premises)
- (c) The availability of up-to-date public transport and car parking information at the premises
- (d) A detailed plan that identifies all existing and proposed fire safety features, including smoke detectors, emergency lighting, sprinkler systems and other safety features. All fire safety measures to be compliant with relevant standards
- (e) All exits to be kept unobstructed, easy to open and clearly signed
- (f) Adequate measures to be in place for disabled people to allow their safe evacuation in the event of an emergency

- (g) The availability of first aid equipment and arrangements for training staff in its use
- (h) Any equipment or fixtures of a particular standard used on the premises to be maintained and inspected with details of checks recorded in a log book.

LP9 Premises Safety

- (a) Applicants are expected to demonstrate the safety of their premises by ensuring records are kept detailing maintenance checks thereafter in respect of:
 - (i) Periodic electrical inspection
 - (ii) Annual inspection of fire alarm
 - (iii) Annual inspection of hand fire appliances
 - (iv) Emergency lighting inspection and test
- (b) Premises wishing to provide regulated entertainment, or who do not currently adequately ensure safety under current legislation, may also need to comply with prescribed standards. These may include (but are not limited to) additional certificates such as battery discharge, gas safety, passenger lifts, stage equipment, ceilings, and generators.

LP10 Personal Licences

- (a) When determining a contested application the Council will consider whether the grant of the licence promotes the crime and disorder objective. It will consider the:
 - (i) Seriousness and relevance of any conviction(s)
 - (ii) The period that has elapsed since committing the offence(s)
 - (iii) Any mitigating circumstances.

LP11 Temporary Event Notices

- (a) The Police have indicated that they will normally object to TENs where:
 - The TEN does not provide sufficient information to alleviate Police concerns
 - The TEN has not been completed fully
 - Insufficient notice has been given for the Police to satisfy themselves that the event would not undermine the crime and disorder objective
 - The premises has a history of complaints or incidents linked to the crime and disorder objective. Alternatively, the premises has had a one off serious incident affecting the crime and disorder objective
 - Previous TENs by the premises user have caused issues of Police concern
 - The premises user has failed to comply with previous advice and recommendations given by the Police with regard to the management of the premises/ event
 - Crime and disorder issues have arisen as a result of previous

- temporary events linked to the organiser and/or the premises
- The venue does not already possess a premises licence, or if the event involves a departure from the terms of the premises licence, applicants have not sufficiently demonstrated that the management of the event will meet the requirements set out in the LPs as applicable and proportionate to the nature of the event
- A risk assessment of the event in consultation with and to the satisfaction of the Police has not been provided to the Police 14 days in advance of the event. The Police recommend completion of a Form 696 to help satisfy this.

The Licensing Authority treats the Police as its main source of advice on crime and disorder and so is likely to treat the advice of the Police in matters concerning TENs as worthy of significant weight.

Therefore, applicants are strongly encouraged to have regard to the factors above and provide the following data when notifying the Police and Council of a TEN:

- Accurate premises user contact details as well as alternative contact details to ensure that contact can be made
- Full details of all acts/performers
- Confirmation that the owner of the land/building has consented, preferably in writing, to the TEN
- Confirmation that the building/land are deemed suitable for the proposed TEN both in terms of patron safety and neighbouring premises and occupants safety.
- (b) The premises user is reminded that a fire risk assessment is to be completed or should be in place. Failure to do so may lead to the Fire Authority prohibiting use of the premises under their separate powers
- (c) The freeholder or leaseholder of the premises (where relevant) should have given their permission for the use of the premises for the temporary event
- (d) When the Police have made an objection based on crime and disorder and a Licensing Sub Committee uphold the objection at a hearing, a counter notice will be issued.

LP12 Licensing Hours

Where relevant representations have been made, the Council adopts the following principles.

- (a) The Council supports the principle of flexibility in its approach to licensing hours and will consider the merits of each individual application. The licensing hours fixed will always reflect the individual merits of the application, the relevant representations received and the requirement to promote the licensing objectives.
- (b) Earlier hours may be set if the individual circumstances require it. Later hours will be set where it can be demonstrated by the applicant that there would be no breach of the licensing objectives. In residential areas the Council will not normally grant licences beyond 12 midnight, unless the applicant can demonstrate that operating hours beyond this will not cause

undue disturbance to local residents.

- (c) The Council would expect premises wishing to trade for longer hours to site themselves in places where they will not create disturbances to residential accommodation, and will take a stricter approach to licensing hours in residential areas.
- (d) The Council may impose conditions limiting the hours of usage of an outside area or preventing drinks being taken to the outside area beyond the stated terminal hour.

LP13 Special Policy Area – Shoreditch

It is the Council's policy that where a relevant representation is made to any application within the area of the Shoreditch SPA, the application will be refused unless there are exceptional circumstances. This policy is to be strictly applied.

The Council expects that any exceptional circumstances offered by the applicant should be genuinely exceptional and so would not include reference to:

- The quality and track record of the management
- The good character of the applicant
- The extent of any variation sought.

LP14 Special Policy Area - Dalston

All **new or variation** applications within the Dalston SPA will have to show:

- High standards of management
- The quality and track record of the management
- The good character of the applicant

Notwithstanding the above, where a relevant representation is made the policy will be to refuse any new or variation application which seeks to:

- Increase the capacity of an existing premises,
- Extend the hours of operation of an existing premises, or
- Permit any activity/use not identified or allowed for in the table below or,
- Permit any activity/use where there is a genuine concern that the proposal will have a negative impact in the area. For example this may include premises that have a large capacity or are mainly outdoors.

The policy is directed at the concentration of persons in the area and particularly those who have been drinking late at night. Therefore any application will need to demonstrate that it does not add to the issues of cumulative impact in the Dalston area.

LP16 The Olympic and Paralympic Games 2012

- (a) Where, as a result of representation(s) made, it is identified that a licence, certificate or proposed event presents a risk that the licensing objectives will be undermined, it is likely that such applications will not be granted.
- Careful consideration will be given to representations from responsible authorities in relation to licence applications for activities before, during and after the Games which refer to the safety and security of the public.

Particular regard will be given to representations received which highlight that the resources of the Police and other emergency/ regulatory services are insufficient to deal with the risks presented.

1 Election of Chair

1.1 Councillor Lufkin was duly elected to Chair.

2 Apologies for Absence

- 2.1 Apologies were received from Councillors Patrick and Snell.
 - 3 Declarations of Interest Members to declare as appropriate
- 3.1 There were no declarations of interest.
 - 4 Licensing Sub-Committee Hearing Procedure
- 4.1 The Chair outlined the hearing procedure.
 - 5 E5 Bakehouse, Railway Arch 396, Mentmore Terrace, E8 3PH
- 5.1 This application was determined under delegated authority and withdrawn from the agenda.
 - 6 Essence Cuisine UK Ltd, Basement and, Ground Floor, 94 Leonard Street, EC2A 4RH

(The Chair with the agreement of all parties adjourned the meeting at 7.15pm and reconvened at 7.24pm)

- 6.1 The additional information including the information submitted by the applicant at the meeting and agreed by all parties, was circulated at the meeting.
- 6.2 Mike Smith, Principal Licensing Officer introduced the report in relation to a variation application for off sales of alcohol and reported that representations had been received from Licensing and Other persons. Planning has submitted an informative but made no representation.
- 6.3 The Sub- Committee noted the Other Persons written representations.
- Nolan Luijten, the premises licence holder made submissions in support of the variation application. He stated that premises was a restaurant and take away business for vegans and vegetarians offering vegan and organic beers, wines and cocktails. The application would enable them to offer their curated vegan and organic wines off sales to customers to consume at home. The alcohol sales formed a minor part of the business revenue and they supplied high quality alcohol which was reflected in their prices. The cheapest wine on the menu started at £23 and the high prices would deter excessive or street drinking therefore minimising any public nuisance and cumulative impact. In addition, they were responsible operators and management would be present during the opening hours.
- 6.5 Channing Riviere, Licensing, outlined in his submission that the applicant had agreed to include an additional condition regarding sealed containers, however, the applicant did not agree to the proposed condition of alcohol being sold ancillary to food. This proposed condition was intended to mitigate any cumulative impact in the area and ensure that the premises did not operate in the future as a vertical drinking establishment.
- 6.6 Mr Luijten stated that he believed that the proposed condition was not relevant to the application as it related to on sales of alcohol and furthermore, staff had been provided with extensive training to ensure compliance with licensing conditions therefore minimising public nuisance and cumulative impact.
- 6.7 Mr Riviere stressed that the proposed condition relating to alcohol and food was necessary to ensure that the premises continued to operate as a restaurant. In recent years there had been a rise in licensed premises in Leonard Street which was contributing to the negative cumulative impact in the area.
- 6.8 In response to questions from the Chair regarding the application, Mr Luijten confirmed that the off sales of alcohol hours was until 21.00 hours. Mr Luijten explained that the premises had previously operated as vertical drinking establishment called the Shoreditch Art Club and off sales had not been granted due to the nature of the business. The premises was now under new management and operating as a restaurant primarily selling food.
- 6.9 In response to questions from Councillor Gordon seeking further clarification, Mr Luijten and Mr Verhavert stated that the restaurant/takeaway had been open for nine weeks without any issues. It currently attracted more diners but they planned to grow the takeaway business. With regard to the designated outside area, Mr Luijten clarified that there was a bench and no tables in this area and since opening a maximum of 2 patrons had used this area. Moreover, there had

been no issue with patrons congregating and causing a public nuisance in the outside area and any spillage of patrons from Griffins Pub was cleared.

- 6.10 With regard to the request to reduce the opening hours, Mr Luijten responded that there were many licensed premises in Leonard Street with later opening hours and any reduction in the hours would be detrimental to his business.
- 6.11 The Chair referred to the wording in conditions 1 and 17 and Mr Luijten clarified that his understanding was that condition 1 related to off sales and condition 17 related to on sales. The Chair proposed and the applicant agreed to amend condition 1 by adding the words 'except for a maximum of four patrons using the designated external seating area.' Condition 24 was also amended to clarify the number of smokers.
- 6.12 The Chair referred to the Other Person's concern in relation to giving proper notice of the variation application. Mr Smith confirmed that the public notices relating to this application had complied with licensing requirements.
- 6.13 Mr Riviere summarised that having a condition to make alcohol ancillary to food would support the licensing objectives.
- 6.14 Mr Luijten summed up that the proposed condition was irrelevant as it applied to on sales alcohol and this application related to off sales.

The decision

The Sub-Committee in considering this decision from the information presented to it within the report and at the hearing today has determined that having regard to the promotion of all the licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- Prevention of public nuisance;
- The protection of children from harm;

The application has been approved in accordance with the Council's licensing statement and the current conditions at paragraph 3.1 of the report, with the following agreed amendments:

• Condition 24 – amended to include the number of smokers to the sentence 'except for 4 smokers'.

and along with the proposed conditions set out in paragraph 8.1 of the report, with the following agreed amendments:

 Condition 1 - add the following words to the sentence 'except for a maximum of four patrons using the designated external seating area.'

Reasons for the decision

The application has been approved with the above amendments, as the Licensing Sub-Committee having heard from the applicant today was satisfied that given the intended operation of the business, off-sales during the existing licensable hours, would not undermine the licensing objectives.

Public informative

The applicant is reminded of the need to operate the premises according to any current planning permission relating to its user class, conditions and hours.

It also should be noted for the public record that the local planning authority should draw no inference or be bound by this decision with regard to any future planning application which may be made.

The applicant is reminded of the need to regularise the planning status for the premises.

6. GUIDANCE CONSIDERATIONS

6.1 The Licensing Authority is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003.

7. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

- 7.1 Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the London Borough of Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Policy") adopted by the Licensing Authority.
- 7.2 The Policy applies to applications where relevant representations have been made. With regard to this application, policies LP3 (Operating Schedule), LP4 (Crime and Disorder), LP5 (Public Nuisance), LP6 (Protection of Children from Harm), LP8 (Public Safety) and LP15 (Cumulative Impact) are relevant

8. OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

8.1 If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following conditions should be applied the licence:

Supply of Alcohol (On/Both)

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
- (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence.
- (b)At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit(other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- (e)dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5.5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.
- 5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- 5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
- (a) a holographic mark or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature
- 6. The responsible person must ensure that:
- a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied

having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:

- beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
- gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
- b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- c)where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customers is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

- 7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979:
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D+(DxV) Where -
- (i)P is the permitted price,
- (ii)D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii)V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol:
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence:
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Exhibition of Films

- 8. Admission of children (under 18) to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with: -
- (a) Recommendations made by the film classification body where the film classification body is specified in the licence, or
- (b) Recommendations made by the licensing authority where the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or the relevant licensing authority has not notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question.

"film classification body" means person('s) designated under s4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984(c.39).

Door Supervision

9. Each individual who is to carry out a security activity at the premises must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Conditions derived from operating schedule

- 10. To employ a number of staff that is appropriate to the activity being undertaken. Employing suitably competent/ qualified staff as necessary.
- 11. To ensure attendance of local pubwatch scheme.
- 12. To install CCTV immediately outside the premises to deter any potential disorder, nuisance or anti-social behaviour, camera positions as agreed by Hackney Licensing Officers.
- 13. Lighting, alarms and other security measures to be installed as recommended by Hackney Crime Prevention Design Officers.
- 14. To employ licensed door supervisors as necessary.
- 15. To comply with all relevant health and safety/ fire requirements and best practice.
- 16. Fire precautions to be put in place as advised by the Hackney Fire Service.
- 17. Where necessary, staff to ensure quiet and orderly departure of people from the premises in respect of local residents.
- 18. Any litter to be kept clear.
- 19. Strict door checks and ID checks to ensure no sale of alcohol to minors.
- 20. Staff to ensure that adults are not allowing minors to consume their alcoholic drinks.
- 21. The doors or gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied /in use under the licence and notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded:

"THIS DOOR/GATE TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED / IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE":-

Any door or gate that does not open in the direction of escape.

- 22. The fire alarm installation shall be under the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The result of the tests shall be recorded in a logbook which shall be readily available for inspection by officers of the Council or LFEPA.
- 23. Any alterations or additions to the existing electrical installation (including those which may be found necessary as a result of any Electrical inspections) shall be carried out using a system of wiring approved by the Council (e.g. cables enclosed in screwed metal conduit or metal trunking, or mineral insulated metal-sheathed cables. (NOTE FP.200 or similar cables would not be acceptable for this purpose).
- 24. The fire alarm change over switch shall be in the "FIRE ALARM LIGHTS AND BUZZERS" position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the licence.
- 25. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
- 26. Capacity figures to be monitored by front of house security team.
- 27. Security, stewards and street staff to monitor queue at all times.
- 28. Every person entering the club to be clicked in using a tally counter.
- 29. A minimum of one SIA registered door staff per 100 customers at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11 pm.
- 30. All events are risk assessed, with consideration given to
- a. Age group of crowd
- b. Previous record of promoter or event in other venues
- c. If it has potential for trouble, the event will not be held
- 31. An incident log of crime and disorder occurrences to be maintained.
- 32. Customers can only leave via one exit, unless in an emergency.
- 33. At the exit a strong, vigilant security presence shall be maintained at three separate points, at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11pm.
- 34. Customers attempting to leave the premises with glass or bottles to be required to surrender the items before exit.
- 35. Only safety/toughened glass to be used in the premises unless the event has been risk assessed as low.
- 36. When requested, risk assessments for all events to be supplied by promoters and sent to local police.
- 37. Searching of customers to be a condition of entry to vary from full body pat down and/or metal detector on high profile nights to bag checks on other

occasions unless the event has been risk assessed as low; but always for entry after 11pm.

- 38. Any potential weapons to be handed over to management and destroyed.
- 39. Patrols to take place inside and outside the venue, including surrounding area, to discourage use or dealing of illicit substances.
- 40. Any controlled drugs on the premises to be confiscated by security, with duty manager responsible for destroying it.
- 41. Temporary barriers to be erected to give good control of customers approaching and leaving the premises.
- 42. Highly visible stewards to manage the behaviour of customers and begin the selection process.
- 43. Specialist cleaners to be employed to remove unwanted graffiti.
- 44. During hours of operation the fire exits to be manned by security that is in constant radio contact with colleagues and management.
- 45. Attendants solely designated for washroom duty to be rostered for all peak times, floor operatives to monitor the toilets at all other times.
- 46. CCTV to be maintained on the premises
- a. Hard drive to be kept under lock and key
- b. Constant recordings daily for 31 days
- c. Images to be stored for 31 days.
- 47. Subject to any lesser figure advised by fire authority, capacity to be restricted to maximum of 720 persons.
- 48. A separate room, far from any noise, to be set up for customers suffering any signs of distress, where they can be monitored by a first aid team until well.
- 49. Any person entering this room will automatically trigger the completion of an incident report and a manager must be made aware ASAP.
- 50. A manager, on advice of a first aider will make the decision to call emergency services.
- 51. Sound limiting devices to be installed on the premises, with master control held by sound engineers, in a locked area separate from public manipulation.
- 52. All doors and windows to be kept closed whilst amplified music is being played within the premises.
- 53. Acoustic lobbies to external doors to be maintained.
- 54. At all late night events security to be permanently located at all fire exits to ensure doors are not left open when amplified music is being played.

- 55. Air-handling units external to the premises to be sound insulated to avoid late night nuisance.
- 56. Smoking customers wishing to use smoking area must queue inside the venue and wait their turn. Numbers outside are strictly limited to ensure no nuisance is caused to premises in the local vicinity and controlled by managers and security. Customers are reminded at all times to be quiet while using the area.
- 57. No food to be prepared or cooked on premises.
- 58. Litter marshals to patrol the streets regularly; they are also obliged to tidy and sweep the streets regularly and finally when the venue has closed for the evening.
- 59. All outside promoters must sign declaration to undertake not to engage in fly-posting.
- 60. Challenge 21 to be adopted with photographic ID is required for all customers who appear to be underage. Only a valid driver's licence, passports and the proof of age scheme card that carry the PASS logo shall be accepted.
- 61. Children not to be permitted into the venue during performances of an adult content, nor late night events i.e. after 9pm. All shows content is risk assessed before contact and consultation with partners is updated every step of the booking from enquiry to strike out.
- 62. Film screenings to be ticketed events only.
- 63. All bars shall stop the sale of alcohol at least twenty minutes before the end of the evening to ensure prompt exit at closing time and reduce noise when music stops.
- 64. The cloakroom to be set up with the purpose of swift return of coats. All staffing levels and control systems are increased prior to closing with this goal in mind.

9. REASONS FOR OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

9.1 Conditions 10 to 64 above are derived from the applicant's operating schedule. No conditions have been proposed by responsible authorities.

10. LEGAL COMMENTS

- 10.1 The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
 - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance
 - The Protection of Children from Harm

10.2 It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

11. HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998 IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 There are implications to:
 - **Article 6** Right to a fair hearing
 - **Article 14** Not to discriminate
 - Balancing: Article 1- Peaceful enjoyment of their possession (i.e. a licence is defined as being a possession) with Article 8 Right of Privacy (i.e. respect private & family life) to achieve a proportionate decision having regard to the protection of an individuals rights against the interests of the community at large.

Proposed Conditions

- 1. To employ a number of staff that is appropriate to the activity being undertaken. Employing suitably competent/ qualified staff as necessary.
- 2. To ensure attendance of local pubwatch scheme.
- 3. To install CCTV immediately outside the premises to deter any potential disorder, nuisance or anti-social behaviour, camera positions as agreed by Hackney Licensing Officers.
- 4. Lighting, alarms and other security measures to be installed as recommended by Hackney Crime Prevention Design Officers.
- 5. To employ licensed door supervisors as necessary.
- 6. To comply with all relevant health and safety/ fire requirements and best practice.
- 7. Fire precautions to be put in place as advised by the Hackney Fire Service.
- 8. Where necessary, staff to ensure quiet and orderly departure of people from the premises in respect of local residents.
- 9. Any litter to be kept clear.
- 10. Strict door checks and ID checks to ensure no sale of alcohol to minors.
- 11. Staff to ensure that adults are not allowing minors to consume their alcoholic drinks.
- 12. The doors or gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied /in use under the licence and notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded:
 - "THIS DOOR/GATE TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED / IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE":-
 - Any door or gate that does not open in the direction of escape.
- 13. The fire alarm installation shall be under the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The result of the tests shall be recorded in a logbook which shall be readily available for inspection by officers of the Council or LFEPA.

- 14. Any alterations or additions to the existing electrical installation (including those which may be found necessary as a result of any Electrical inspections) shall be carried out using a system of wiring approved by the Council (e.g. cables enclosed in screwed metal conduit or metal trunking, or mineral insulated metal-sheathed cables.
 - (NOTE FP.200 or similar cables would not be acceptable for this purpose).
- 15. The fire alarm change over switch shall be in the "FIRE ALARM LIGHTS AND BUZZERS" position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the licence.
- 16. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
- 17. Capacity figures to be monitored by front of house security team.
- 18. Security, stewards and street staff to monitor queue at all times.
- 19. Every person entering the club to be clicked in using a tally counter.
- 20. A minimum of one SIA registered door staff per 100 customers at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11 pm.
- 21. All events are risk assessed, with consideration given to
 - a) Age group of crowd
 - b) Previous record of promoter or event in other venues
 - c) If it has potential for trouble, the event will not be held
- 22. An incident log of crime and disorder occurrences to be maintained.
- 23. Customers can only leave via one exit, unless in an emergency.
- 24. At the exit a strong, vigilant security presence shall be maintained at three separate points, at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11pm.
- 25. Customers attempting to leave the premises with glass or bottles to be required to surrender the items before exit.
- 26. Only safety/toughened glass to be used in the premises unless the event has been risk assessed as low.
- 27. When requested, risk assessments for all events to be supplied by promoters and sent to local police.
- 28. Searching of customers to be a condition of entry to vary from full body pat down and/or metal detector on high profile nights to bag checks on other occasions unless the event has been risk assessed as low; but always for entry after 11pm.

- 29. Any potential weapons to be handed over to management and destroyed.
- 30. Patrols to take place inside and outside the venue, including surrounding area, to discourage use or dealing of illicit substances.
- 31. Any controlled drugs on the premises to be confiscated by security, with duty manager responsible for destroying it.
- 32. Temporary barriers to be erected to give good control of customers approaching and leaving the premises.
- 33. Highly visible stewards to manage the behaviour of customers and begin the selection process.
- 34. Specialist cleaners to be employed to remove unwanted graffiti.
- 35. During hours of operation the fire exits to be manned by security that is in constant radio contact with colleagues and management.
- 36. Attendants solely designated for washroom duty to be rostered for all peak times, floor operatives to monitor the toilets at all other times.
- 37. CCTV to be maintained on the premises
 - a) Hard drive to be kept under lock and key
 - b) Constant recordings daily for 31 days
 - c) Images to be stored for 31 days.
- 38. Subject to any lesser figure advised by fire authority, capacity to be restricted to maximum of 720 persons.
- 39. A separate room, far from any noise, to be set up for customers suffering any signs of distress, where they can be monitored by a first aid team until well.
- 40. Any person entering this room will automatically trigger the completion of an incident report and a manager must be made aware ASAP.
- 41. A manager, on advice of a first aider will make the decision to call emergency services.
- 42. Sound limiting devices to be installed on the premises, with master control held by sound engineers, in a locked area separate from public manipulation.
- 43. All doors and windows to be kept closed whilst amplified music is being played within the premises.

- 44. Acoustic lobbies to external doors to be maintained.
- 45. At all late night events security to be permanently located at all fire exits to ensure doors are not left open when amplified music is being played.
- 46. Air-handling units external to the premises to be sound insulated to avoid late night nuisance.
- 47. Smoking customers wishing to use smoking area must queue inside the venue and wait their turn. Numbers outside are strictly limited to ensure no nuisance is caused to premises in the local vicinity and controlled by managers and security. Customers are reminded at all times to be quiet while using the area.
- 48. No food to be prepared or cooked on premises.
- 49. Litter marshals to patrol the streets regularly; they are also obliged to tidy and sweep the streets regularly and finally when the venue has closed for the evening.
- 50. All outside promoters must sign declaration to undertake not to engage in fly-posting.
- 51. Challenge 21 to be adopted with photographic ID is required for all customers who appear to be underage. Only a valid driver's licence, passports and the proof of age scheme card that carry the PASS logo shall be accepted.
- 52. Children not to be permitted into the venue during performances of an adult content, nor late night events i.e. after 9pm. All shows content is risk assessed before contact and consultation with partners is updated every step of the booking from enquiry to strike out.
- 53. Film screenings to be ticketed events only.
- 54. All bars shall stop the sale of alcohol at least twenty minutes before the end of the evening to ensure prompt exit at closing time and reduce noise when music stops.
- 55. The cloakroom to be set up with the purpose of swift return of coats. All staffing levels and control systems are increased prior to closing with this goal in mind.
- 56. During the last 20 minutes of trading strategies shall be employed to encourage the gradual dispersal of customers, including closing off rooms and areas, gradually increasing the lighting levels in the said areas, playing of slower music and reducing the volume as the customers leave the dance floor.
- 57. A duty manager to be always positioned in an area close to the main exit to oversee the end-ofnight departure period. Customers queuing for cloaks to be reminded to be considerate upon leaving the premises. Highly visible notices to be placed at the doors requesting exiting customers to leave quietly and to respect neighbours and their property.

- 58. Events running after 9pm not to use glass products unless risk assessed as safe. Customers are not allowed to leave the premises with bottles and glasses. This policy to be supported by a vigilant security team, stopping and searching customers where necessary. Bins to be provided at the exits for the use of customers.
- 59. Rubbish patrols are carried out regularly during the night and at the end of activities. Patrols to collect all cans, fliers, food wrappings in the immediate vicinity of the premises.
- 60. Door staff shall draw customer attention to notices in the foyer and ask them to act responsibly, especially in regard to keeping the noise down and leaving in an orderly manner.
- 61. Door staff shall actively encourage customers not to congregate around the premises after exiting and direct customers toward the Conditions derived from Responsible Authority representations.
- 62. No paying customers to be allowed into the venue after 03:00, at which time the premises front door will be closed (except for staff/artist/guest list and possible late arriving ticket holders).
- 63. The licensee will embed into all contractors a clause that all promotional material, including websites and outside promoters websites, will advertise that there is strictly no entry after 03:00. No promotional material to be distributed until cleared by Village Underground.
- 64. Management and Security teams will be fully briefed on the above specifics before every shift and this information will be included in all induction staff handbooks/job descriptions.
- 65. The installation of sound limiting devices (device type to be approved by the Pollution Team) to all music systems. The limiting devices should be set to ensure inaudibility at 1m from the façade of the nearest noise sensitive premises, a certificate of compliance should be submitted to the Pollution Team on an annual basis.

- 2.1 The Premises has been renovated to accommodate members of the public attending for entertainment and to ensure the Premises is ideally suited to provide licensable activities without disturbing local residents.
- 2.2 The Premises is situated in a busy area of East London with high ambient noise levels. The area is characterised by a busy main road, Great Eastern Street and thoroughfare, Holywell Lane, railways, wide ranging licensed Premises and various other commercial uses. Notwithstanding, Village Underground's management take their responsibilities to control the risk of noise breakout very seriously.
- 2.3 Village Underground works from a Noise Management Plan (commissioned a leading acoustic expert specialising in licensed premises, amended as necessary) addressing noise emanation and the prevention of public nuisance. Village Underground and their acoustic expert(s) will work with the Council's Noise Team whenever necessary ensure accordance with the current Premises Licence conditions.
- 2.4 The following noise controls will be implemented to ensure local residents are not disturbed by the operation of the Premises:
- 2.4.1.1 No noise shall emanate from the Premises so as to cause a nuisance.
- 2.4.1.2 All amplified recorded and live music played within the Premises shall be subject to a noise management plan prepared by an acoustic consultant registered with a recognised regulating authority
- 2.4.2 High specification and state of the art audio system to reduce the risk of noise emanating from the Premises;
- 2.4.3 A Public Address system control and set up policy.
- 2.4.4 Appointment of a qualified acoustic consultant to advise on all aspects of sound generating equipment and the prevention of noise outbreak from the Premises;
- 2.4.5 Comprehensive customer management procedures to ensure no nuisance is caused by customers either inside or outside the Premises;
- 2.4.6 Thorough SIA and staff supervision of customers during busy periods; and

2.4.7 A dispersal policy to ensure the quick and quiet departure of customers – especially at night and when all areas of the Premises are in operation concurrently (see below).

Smoking Outside Premises

- 2.5 Staff will very carefully supervise customer activity outside the Premises, limited to the front 'yard' with no smoking allowed on the street. This includes SIA supervision of the external area during busy trading periods. Customers will not be permitted to take their drinks when they leave the Premises.
- 2.6 The designated smoking area will be controlled. The number of smokers will be limited to ensure no obstruction on the highway and no nuisance caused by persons smoking.
- 2.7 Any customer behaviour that may cause public nuisance or crime and disorder is not, and will not be tolerated under any circumstances.

3 Age Verification Policy & Admission

Age Verification

- 3.1 The Premises will operate a Challenge 21 age verification policy. This policy requires anyone who looks under 21 to provide approved identification (see below) to demonstrate they are aged 18 or over when purchasing alcohol.
- 3.2 Any member of staff who sells alcohol to a person under the age of 18 may be guilty of an offence, which may result in a fine and they may be dismissed.
- 3.3 The applicant's Challenge 21 policy operates as follows:
 - 3.3.1 Staff are required to ask for a valid form of identification for anyone attempting to purchase alcohol who appears to be under 21;
 - 3.3.2 Staff will only accept the following forms of ID: UK/EU passport, UK/EU driving licence (with photo) or proof of age scheme cards with PASS accredited hologram logo.

Admission

- 3.4 Everybody is welcome at the Premises, providing they are not:
- 3.4.1 Intoxicated either by alcohol or drugs;
- 3.4.2 Behaving in a manner that may disturb local residents or other customers;
- 3.4.3 In possession of a weapon; or
- 3.4.4 In possession of illegal substances, for example drugs.
- 3.5 If a person is suspected of:
- 3.5.1 Carrying a weapon;
- 3.5.2 Carrying, dealing or using illegal substances;

A manager shall be immediately informed and the Police should be called.

Drug Policies

- 3.6 The Premises operates a <u>zero tolerance</u> policy in relation to the use or supply of drugs in accordance with the London Borough of Hackney Police Licensing Unit's model licence condition:
- 3.6.1 Premises to operate zero tolerance policy to drugs and comply with Hackney Police Drugs, Weapons and Search policy.
- 3.6.2 The applicant's management will co-operate with the Police in respect of any operation and investigation regarding the misuse of drugs.
- 3.6.3 Customers entering the Premises may, as a condition of entry, be required to submit to a search. Failure to comply will result in non-admission to the Premises.
- 3.6.4 Customers within the Premises are liable, at any time, to be asked to leave the Premises if they are suspected of being in possession of illegal drugs.
- 3.6.5 Any customer found on the Premises or attempting to enter the Premises in possession of illegal drugs will have the drugs confiscated in accordance with the Met Police "Safe and Sound".
- 3.6.6 Any customer on the Premises found to be in a distressed state, even if they are suspected to have used drugs, will be given the best care possible by all team members.

4 Dispersal Policy

- 4.1 The objective of the Dispersal Policy is to ensure a quiet, controlled and swift dispersal of the Premises' customers.
- 4.2 The Dispersal Policy promotes a professional and responsible management of customers as they leave the Premises to ensure they make their journey home without any adverse impact on local residents.
- 4.3 The Policy prevents nuisance caused to local residents from the following risks:
- 4.3.1 Noisy or anti-social behaviour by customers leaving the Premises.
- 4.3.2 Large numbers of people leaving the Premises at the same time.
- 4.4 Despite the Premises' central London location, employees are made aware that local residents live in the area.
- 4.5 This Dispersal Policy is followed throughout the opening hours, although particular attention is paid to customers leaving at night especially when all areas of the Premises are in use at the same time.

Entrances and Exits

4.6 The main entrance/exit is on Holywell Lane. Staff and/or SIA supervisors will carefully supervise this entrance during busy periods.

Dispersal

- 4.7 The primary point of dispersal is the main exit points on Holywell Lane. From here customers will be encouraged to disperse directly home by foot, to their taxi or the area's numerous transport links (see below).
- 4.8 Towards closing time, the following measures are taken to ensure a gradual and quiet closure of the Premises:
- 4.8.1 Raised lighting levels.
- 4.8.2 Lowered music levels.
- 4.8.3 Politely reminding customers the Premises is about to close.

Transport

4.9 The Premises is well serviced by public transport links, as set out below. All staff must be familiar with the transport links so they can advise customers when required.

Overground, Rail and Tube

- 4.10 Shoreditch, Liverpool St and Old St stations are located within easy walking distance of the Premises.
- 4.11 Other rail stations, for example Victoria, Paddington, Liverpool Street, Euston, Waterloo and Kings Cross St Pancras are easily reached by tube, bus or taxi.
- 4.12 Where necessary customers will be given directions to the relevant station and reminded to reach the station as quietly and as quickly as possible when they leave.

Buses

4.13 The Premises is well serviced by public buses. TFL bus services, including night buses, are accessible by bus stops in the area. Buses travel to a variety of destinations throughout London.

Bus routes include: 8, N8, 26, N26, 48, 78, 149 (24h), 242 (24h), 388, 35, N35, 47, 135 and 67

4.14 Staff will be familiar with the local bus services and will advise customers accordingly

Taxi

- 4.15 Village Underground operates a taxi rank system to help facilitate the smooth drop-off and pickup of customers.
- 4.16 Drivers will be asked to comply with a Driver Code of Conduct. This will include requirements to prevent the risk of drivers causing nuisance, for example customers encouraged to wait inside the Premises for their taxi, avoiding leaving engines running unnecessarily or slamming car doors.
- 4.17 Other local licensed taxi companies operate in the area. Customers will also be expected to use Uber or similar licensed taxi services.


5 Servicing – Deliveries & Collections

- 5.1 Refuse and recyclable waste will be stored in a designed refuse storage area until it is collected by London Borough of Hackney waste services.
- 5.2 Deliveries and collections will be arranged carefully and sympathetically to the local amenity. Where possible, multiple deliveries and/or collections will be combined to avoid high numbers of vehicles servicing the Premises. Delivery and collection times will not be scheduled late at night or early in the morning to avoid disturbing local residents.

6 Summary

- 6.1 The comprehensive controls summarised in this document will supplement Premises Licence conditions to ensure the Premises does not have any adverse impact on the local area in Shoreditch.
- 6.2 Village Underground is committed to working in partnership with the responsible authorities to ensure it always operate professionally alongside local businesses and residents.
- 6.3 The Premises will continue to be an exciting cultural hub and globally recognised home for contemporary music and the performing arts. In doing so Village Underground strives to remain a valued member of the Shoreditch community and a treasured asset to the London Borough of Hackney.

Hackney Council have provided us with a copy of your representation in respect of our licence application. I would be grateful for your consideration of this letter. I hope this will provide more information on the reason for our application and scope of the proposals, which result in an overall reduction in our licence hours across the week. This is because we volunteering to give up 6 hours of late night trading over Mondays to Wednesdays as part of the proposal for the extra hours on Fridays and Saturdays (see below).

Our team has worked tirelessly over the last decade to make Village Underground one of London's best grass roots music venues. We proudly present hundreds of music and arts events, and we work with over 1500 artists each year. As a grass roots venue, our reason for existing is to develop new music and artists' careers - and in doing so we are dedicated to contributing to the cultural life of Hackney and London, as well as feeding new talent into the UK's music and cultural industries.

You may be aware of the recent sad demise of music venues in London. Village Underground has not been spared the pressures that have ended other important grass roots venues. Our venue's rent has increased 600% in line with property prices in the area and we have had a major business rates rise. In addition, as a London Living Wage employer, we have seen a massive increase in our staffing bill over the last few years.

All these and other financial pressures have brought us to a crossroads; we want to continue pursuing our mission of being one of London's best grass roots music venues, building the careers of home grown artists and curating acts from around the globe for the many communities of the city. This is why we do what we do. But for that to continue, and to be viable and sustainable, we now have to change our operation.

We are applying to extend our finish time from 4am to 6am on Friday and Saturday nights. Critically, this will enable us to present live music and other cultural events on Friday and Saturday evenings, before starting the later weekend music programming. In turn this means that we can free more Wednesdays and Thursdays for commercial/corporate events - the revenue of which is essential to keep Village Underground and its mission viable for the future. Village Underground is a Social Enterprise. Our music and arts programming has always needed subsidising in this way, only of late that subsidy level has been dramatically pushed up.



For the avoidance of any doubt, none of our existing or proposed programming involve alcohol-led nightclub type events. Whilst this would generate considerably more income for us, it is inconsistent with our core mission to give grass roots music, arts and cultural events a platform to develop in a safe and well managed environment.

To balance out the extra hours on Fridays and Saturdays, we are volunteering to surrender our weekday hours. This involves a reduction of our existing 2am closing time on Monday, Tuesdays and Wednesdays to midnight. This equates to an overall net reduction in hours.

In summary, the proposed premises licence application is on the same terms as the existing premises licence, save for:

- 1. A reduction to the terminal hours for regulated entertainment and the sale of alcohol by 2 hours on Mondays to Wednesdays to midnight (currently 2am) and 23:40 (currently 01:40) respectively.
- 2. An extension to the terminal hours for licensable activities on Fridays and Saturdays to 06:00 for regulated entertainment (currently 03:30) and 05:30 for the sale of alcohol and late night refreshment (currently 03:30).
- 3. Cleaning up some of our conditions with minor amendments and updates to conditions 35, 36, 56, 63, 67 and 72.

All other proposed licensable activities, permitted hours and conditions will remain as per the existing premises licence. Please see enclosed track-changed copy of our existing licence which highlights the changes we are seeking.

Following concerns raised about a later alcohol licence, we have decided to reduce the proposed terminal hour for alcohol sales on Fridays and Saturdays to 5.00am. This will also help support a controlled dispersal of our customers between 'last orders' and closing time.

If the licence application is granted, we intend to start our weekend programme of events later in the evening in order to accommodate more cultural events. This later start time means the number of hours we sell alcohol on Fridays and Saturday nights will be the same as our historical trading activity. Generating revenue from alcohol sales has never been our primary objective. Our bar sales have always significantly reduced during later hours authorised under our temporary licences over the years. We hope this helps to reassure you that we have not made the application for a 'late booze licence' to sell more alcohol. Instead, the later hours have been proposed to help attract more and better quality artists at weekends so as to focus on revenue generating corporate functions earlier in the week.

In terms of change for you as a neighbour and impact on the immediate area, we do not believe there will be a significant difference. For the last decade we have used our full temporary lience extension quota (currently 21 days per year) to extend our close time in this way. In this sense we are regularising what already happens, with we hope a modest increase — we are certainly not interested in running



our venue until 6am every week/for 104 nights a year. We will continue develop our tried and tested management procedures to ensure the additional hours have no adverse impact on you in Shoreditch.

We have not previously received complaints relating to music noise or dispersal noise at either 4am or 6am, so do not expect there to be an issue under this proposed change. In fact, we have always believed 6am is a better time to disperse customers than 4am because the ambient noise is much higher and public transport is fully functional, both greatly reducing the chance of any disturbance.

We genuinely would not be doing this unless we felt we had to. I hope that you have seen us to be conscientious neighbours, only a phone call away and responsive to our closest residents. Continuing a friendly and cooperative relationship with our neighbours is extremely important to us, whatever the outcome of our application. I hope that you can also value what we're trying to achieve here and that you can support us in continuing our mission.

Please get in touch with any questions. I would like to meet to discuss this in detail and our operating practices in general, if you can spare the time. I am also planning to hold a residents' meeting to discuss our proposals further. Please let me know if you would like to attend.

Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions

Supply of Alcohol

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence.
 - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.



- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5. 5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.
 - 5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - 5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years if age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
 - A. a holographic mark or
 - B. an ultraviolet feature.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that:
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - beer or cider:1/2 pint;
 - gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
 - still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
 - a. these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - b. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

- 7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
 - 7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -



- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D+(DxV) Where -
- (i)P is the permitted price,
- (ii)D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii)V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Exhibition Of Films



- 8. Admission of children (under 18) to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with: -
 - (a) Recommendations made by the film classification body where the film classification body is specified in the licence, or
 - (b) Recommendations made by the licensing authority where the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or the relevant licensing authority has not notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question.

"film classification body" means person('s) designated under s4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984(c.39).

Door Supervision

9. Each individual who is to carry out a security activity at the premises must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.



Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 10. To employ a number of staff that is appropriate to the activity being undertaken. Employing suitably competent/ qualified staff as necessary.
- 11. To ensure attendance of local pubwatch scheme.
- 12. To install CCTV immediately outside the premises to deter any potential disorder, nuisance or anti-social behaviour, camera positions as agreed by Hackney Licensing Officers.
- 13. Lighting, alarms and other security measures to be installed as recommended by Hackney Crime Prevention Design Officers.
- 14. To employ licensed door supervisors as necessary
- 15. To comply with all relevant health and safety/ fire requirements and best practice.
- 16. Fire precautions to be put in place as advised by the Hackney Fire Service.
- 17. Where necessary, staff to ensure quiet and orderly departure of people from the premises in respect of local residents.
- 18. Any litter to be kept clear.
- 19. Strict door checks and ID checks to ensure no sale of alcohol to minors.
- 20. Staff to ensure that adults are not allowing minors to consume their alcoholic drinks.
- 21. The doors or gates in the following locations shall be locked back in the open position whilst the premises are occupied /in use under the licence and notices shall be exhibited adjacent thereto worded
 - "THIS DOOR/GATE TO BE KEPT LOCKED BACK OPEN WHILST THE PREMISES ARE OCCUPIED / IN USE UNDER THE LICENCE":Any door or gate that does not open in the direction of escape.
- 22. The fire alarm installation shall be under the supervision of a competent person who shall arrange for regular maintenance and testing to be carried out. The result of the tests shall be recorded in a logbook which shall be readily available for inspection by officers of the Council or LF EPA.



23. Any alterations or additions to the existing electrical installation (including those which may be found necessary as a result of any Electrical inspections) shall be carried out using a system of wiring approved by the Council (e.g. cables enclosed in screwed metal conduit or metal trunking, or mineral insulated metal-sheathed cables.

(NOTE FP.200 or similar cables would not be acceptable for this purpose).

- 24. The fire alarm change over switch shall be in the "FIRE ALARM LIGHTS AND BUZZERS" position during the whole time that the premises are in use under the licence.
- 25. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
- 26. Capacity figures to be monitored by front of house security team.
- 27. Security, stewards and street staff to monitor queue at all times.
- 28. Every person entering the club to be clicked in using a tally counter.
- 29. A minimum of one SIA registered door staff per 100 customers at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11 pm.
- 30. All events are risk assessed, with consideration given to
 - 1. Age group of crowd
 - 2. Previous record of promoter or event in other venues
 - 3. If it has potential for trouble, the event will not be held
- 31. An incident log of crime and disorder occurrences to be maintained.
- 32. Customers can only leave via one exit, unless in an emergency
- 33. At the exit a strong, vigilant security presence shall be maintained at three separate points, at events risk assessed as moderate and always after 11pm.
- 34. Customers attempting to leave the premises with glass or bottles to be required to surrender the items before exit.
- 35. Only safety/toughened glass to be used in the premises unless the event has been risk assessed as low and always after 10pm.



- 36. When requested, Rrisk assessments (form 696) for all events to be supplied by promoters and sent to local police.
- 37. Searching of customers to be a condition of entry to vary from full body pat down and/or metal detector on high profile nights to bag checks on other occasions unless the event has been risk assessed as low; but always for entry after 11pm.
- 38. Any potential weapons to be handed over to management and destroyed.
- 39. Patrols to take place inside and outside the venue, including surrounding area, to discourage use or dealing of illicit substances
- 40. Any controlled drugs on the premises to be confiscated by security, with duty manager responsible for destroying it.
- 41. Temporary barriers to be erected to give good control of customers approaching and leaving the premises.
- 42. Highly visible stewards to manage the behaviour of customers and begin the selection process.
- 43. Specialist cleaners to be employed to remove unwanted graffiti.
- 44. During hours of operation the fire exits to be manned by security that is in constant radio contact with colleagues and management.
- 45. Attendants solely designated for washroom duty to be rostered for all peak times, floor operatives to monitor the toilets at all other times.
- 46. CCTV to be maintained on the premises
 - 1. Hard drive to be kept under lock and key
 - 2. Constant recordings daily for 31 days
 - 3. Images to be stored for 31 days.
- 47. Subject to any lesser figure advised by fire authority, capacity to be restricted to maximum of 720 persons.
- 48. A separate room, far from any noise, to be set up for customers suffering any signs of distress, where they can be monitored by a



first aid team until well.

- 49. Any person entering this room will automatically trigger the completion of an incident report and a manager must be made aware ASAP.
- 50. A manager, on advice of a first aider will make the decision to call emergency services.
- 51. Sound limiting devices to be installed on the premises, with master control held by sound engineers, in a locked area separate from public manipulation.
- 52. All doors and windows to be kept closed whilst amplified music is being played within the premises.
- 53. Acoustic lobbies to external doors to be maintained
- 54. At all late night events security to be permanently located at all fire exits to ensure doors are not left open when amplified music is being played.
- 55. Air-handling units external to the premises to be sound insulated to avoid late night nuisance.
- 56. Smoking customers wishing to use smoking area must queue inside the venue and wait their turn. Numbers outside are strictly limited to 4 at a time to be ensure no nuisance is caused to premises in the local vicinity and controlled by managers and security. Customers are reminded at all times to be quiet while using the area.
- 57. No food to be prepared or cooked on premises.
- 58. Litter marshals to patrol the streets regularly; they are also obliged to tidy and sweep the streets regularly and finally when the venue has closed for the evening.
- 59. All outside promoters must sign declaration to undertake not to engage in fly-posting.
- 60. Challenge 21 to be adopted with photographic ID is required for all customers who appear to be underage. Only a valid driver's licence,



- passports and the proof of age scheme card that carry the PASS logo shall be accepted.
- 61. Children not to be permitted into the venue during performances of an adult content, nor late night events i.e. after 9pm. All shows content is risk assessed before contact and consultation with partners is updated every step of the booking from enquiry to strike out.
- 62. Film screenings to be ticketed events only.
- 63. All bars shall stop the sale of alcohol at least twenty minutes before the end of the evening to ensure prompt exit at closing time and reduce noise when music stops.
- 64. The cloakroom to be set up with the purpose of swift return of coats. All staffing levels and control systems are increased prior to closing with this goal in mind.
- 65. During the last 20 minutes of trading strategies shall be employed to encourage the gradual dispersal of customers, including closing off rooms and areas, gradually increasing the lighting levels in the said areas, playing of slower music and reducing the volume as the customers leave the dance floor.
- 66. A duty manager to be always positioned in an area close to the main exit to oversee the end-of-night departure period. Customers queuing for cloaks to be reminded to be considerate upon leaving the premises. Highly visible notices to be placed at the doors requesting exiting customers to leave quietly and to respect neighbours and their property.
- 67. Events running after 9pm not to use glass products unless risk assessed as safe.

 Customers are not allowed to leave the premises with bottles and glasses. This policy to be supported by a vigilant security team, stopping and searching customers where necessary. Bins to be provided at the exits for the use of customers.
- 68. Rubbish patrols are carried out regularly during the night and at the end of activities . Patrols to collect all cans, fliers, food wrappings in the immediate vicinity of the premises.
- 69. Door staff shall draw customer attention to notices in the foyer and ask them to act responsibly, especially in regard to keeping the



- noise down and leaving in an orderly manner.
- 70. Door staff shall actively encourage customers not to congregate around the premises after exiting and direct customers toward the

Conditions derived from Responsible Authority representations

- 71. No paying customers to be allowed into the venue after 03:00, at which time the premises front door will be closed (except for staff/artist/guest list and possible late arriving ticket holders)
- 72. The licensee will embed into all contractors a clause that all promotional material, including websites and outside promoters websites, will advertise that there is strictly no entry after 0203:00.No promotional material to be distributed until cleared by Village Underground.
- 73. Management and Security teams will be fully briefed on the above specifics before every shift and this information will be included in all induction staff handbooks/job descriptions.
- 74. The installation of sound limiting devices (device type to be approved by the Pollution Team) to all music systems. The limiting devices should be set to ensure inaudibility at 1m from the facade of the nearest noise sensitive premises, a certificate of compliance should be submitted to the Pollution Team on an annual basis.

- The offer to reduce hours for activities during the week is welcomed.
 However, there are likely to be concerns that the additional hours proposed
 at weekends would further exacerbate existing negative impacts in the
 area; for example increased levels of public drunkenness, street urination,
 littering, rowdy behaviour etc.

I live in the Shoreditch Saturation Zone Special Policy Area and any increase in opening hours in the surrounding licensed premises will greatly add to the cummulative impact of nuisance at night for residents. On Fridays and Saturdays night, we cannot wait till the last wave of rowdy and loud groups coming out of clubs and pubs has gone out of the neighborhood to finally have peace and be able to sleep. Not to mention the endless stream of cabs, arguments, fights and other behaviours in the streets.

It is not about how well the club is managed, it is about the huge amount of people in the streets during the night. These people cannot possibly be managed by the clubs as they disperse around at various times. They are not your normal crowd of people, they are usually in groups, half deaf from the loud music and need to scream instead of talking normally. In addition, they are often drunk or under the influence of some other substance and this creates a cacophony of arguments, loud voices, singing, public disorder etc. They park anywhere in my street even on double yellow lines, bang the car doors, and play their music system extremely loudly. I am writing to you today as I found out that there is an application to extend the licensing hours for the Village Underground until 6am on Fridays and Saturdays.

I am a Shoreditch resident living in Charlotte Road (and have been so for the last 8 years).

While I am personally a big fan of the Village Underground due to its rich culture offerings I am afraid I will still have to voice my strong objections to this for the following reasons.

- Despite all the great work the council is doing around the Shoreditch Special Policy Area we have seen a very significant increase in crime and disorder over the last 2 years, especially in the hours after 3am. Alcohol- and drug-related violence and general disorder are now quite common place on Friday and Saturday nights on our otherwise very peaceful street.
- Public safety starts being a real issue. Referring to the latest figures on Crime and Violence in Shoreditch (as presented at the Licensing Policy Consultation on Nov 22nd last year) the main offences take place after the hours of 1am on Friday and Saturday.

Yet another venue with an extended late-night license will further contribute to this problem and will not only harm the residents on a regular basis (who are already being stretched to the maximum) but in the medium turn will also lead to a climate that will harm the nighttime economy overall.

I am writing to oppose the 6am license application of The Village Underground for the reasons set out below.

- 1. The prevention of crime and disorder,
- 2. Public safety,
- 3. Prevention of public nuisance

We are currently battling with an epidemic of crime on our street caused by night time activity in the area which increases each time a new bar opens or license is extended close by. For me personally, this has meant weekly calls out to the police because of violence, vandalism to our property and increasingly over the last 6 months, cars parked with music turned up to club noise levels with people taking drugs before going to late night bars or clubs. The latter is the main concern for me with a new club open late – people don't go straight to the club, they park up in Shoreditch, drink or take drugs, create their own pre-party in the street (which often leads to violence or threats to women – we had someone arrested last week outside our house who was stopping women from passing in the street and getting them into their car). Then the same happens when they come back from the bar – fights, loud music, smashing bottles or throwing things around – we often have bags of rubbish emptied out into the street and kicked around. The point is, even if the noise from the Village Underground itself wasn't disruptive, the problem for us is the pre- and after-crowds who are high, have no respect for the area or community living there and increasingly see Shoreditch as a clubbing resort. Any extension of license would actively encourage this behaviour and perception.

At the moment, it isn't safe for me to leave my front door during these pre and post party hours and have been threatened from inside my house many times. I am 4 months pregnant and when I open the window and ask the groups to turn the music down, I get threatened, sworn at and told

to move from the area – this is how much clubbers visiting the area feel entitled to treat the community as a party destination they feel no responsibility for how they behave in.

When things get so bad or the crime is a concern outside our flat for the safety of others and we call the police for help, they are very responsive and often make arrests. However, I feel this is a huge and unnecessary drain on their resources which is exacerbated by the kind of community being created with the number of bars and clubs relative to residents and the extension of licensing hours just means that these problems continue for an extended period of time.

The final issue with late licensing is the added pressure on council resources such as rubbish collection and street cleaning. At the moment, the system seems to be very carefully thought-out so that after the majority of bars and clubs close, there is a rubbish collection straight after, street cleaning services between 1am and 6am and so when we are out in the morning with others enjoying or visiting the neighbourhood, the community looks clean and traces from the nightlife scene are largely gone. This would not be the case if licensing hours for bars or clubs changed as there would not be this window to clean the place up ready for the visitors that we welcome to the area and want to encourage, supporting the many galleries, coffee shops, pop-ups etc. that make the community great.

I appreciate the work you do in listening to the voices of the community and obviously happy to provide any more detail on the above or attend any forums to explain my view.

I believe this application does not meet the four licensing objectives as laid out in the Licensing Act of 2003

- 1. the prevention of crime and disorder,
- 2. public safety,

It seems obvious that a 6am alcohol license on Fridays and Saturday nights is going to attract heavy drinkers and cause a lot more noise at a time when local residents and their children are asleep. Shoreditch has already first hand experience of anti-social behaviour to such an extent that Hackney Council recently launched a review aimed at finally bringing sanity back to this area.

It also appears that the timing of this application is opportunistic and an attempt to expand the hours of the venue before the Hackney Council review has been completed and the possible expansion of the Special Policy Area established.

I am not only the owner of at Holywell Lane - the to Village Underground - but I am also the landlord for Village Underground as they currently rent my building for ancillary uses. I have been owned this building these past 34 years. I do not live in Shoreditch at the moment and in fact Village Underground have rented my property for the past decade so they can run the venue seamlessly. I have no objection to the arts based side of the enterprise - in fact I support it - as the area has for a long time attracted artists, myself included. But I received no notification from Village Underground about this highly controversial application. In fact was deliberately kept out of the loop by the people running the venue.

There is no way that Village Underground can control what their customers do when they leave the club in a drunken state. Local residents are regularly woken up by the screams of drunken Village Underground customers, not to mention the fact my building is often sprayed with graffiti after late night events at VU. Its also a commonplace experience for surrounding buildings to be urinated over and even defecated upon. I write to put in my strong objection to an extension of Village Underground's licence to 6am on Friday and Saturday nights. As everyone in the neighbourhood knows, 4 am is bad enough but 6am is totally unreasonable for a variety of reasons.

I believe this application does not meet the four licensing objectives as laid out in the Licensing Act of 2003

- 1. the prevention of crime and disorder,
- 2. public safety,
- 3. prevention of public nuisance, and
- 4. the protection of children from harm

Village Underground, seems to run a decent operation. However, make no mistake, late hours are a nuisance. As hundreds of people spill out of the clubs they roam the streets, shouting, vomiting, drinking, screaming, urinating and littering. I can see from my window crimes regularly taking place late night nearby this venue, such as drug taking and selling and men exposing themselves as they pee in the street. In the early mornings when I walk my dog I find empty drug bags and cannisters all over the ground and a ridiculous amount of rubbish. There is a genuine safety concern with all these drunk and high people roaming our streets. Enabling these absurdly late hours will contribute to the cumulative impact.

The protection of children from harm is vital. Shoreditch is overwhelmed with inebriated and unsociable people due to the concentration of drinking establishments. Evenings attract violence, illicit acts and vile behaviour, and residents have their doors smashed, front doors urinated and defecated on, etc. As a resident I fear for the safety of my child and others in the area.

As this venue is on the border of the Shoredtich SPA it should be given the strictest review. If you allow them to have a 6am licence it will set a precedent and other bars and clubs will aim to extend their licences as well. At that point, why have any time restrictions?

For each one of the reasons set forth above I believe that the Application should be rejected in its entirety by the Council.

I am writing to voice a strong objection to the request by the owners of Village Underground music and entertainment venue to extend their hours to 6am every friday and saturday night, all year round. the license extension covers music, dancing and provision of alcohol over the new extended hours.

I had previously objected to Village Underground's initial license, and have made a number of complaints about the noise, to Hackney council, meeting with noise control officers on site, more than once.

As I live the road from the venue, in Fairchild Place, I have first hand experience of the disruption the venue already causes.

There continues to be a noise nuisance. While it may fall within acceptable decibels, the constant low pounding bass disrupts sleep of all the nearby residents. To have this occurring every single weekend is unacceptable.

I am concerned too, that the longer license will attract more young people, who already leave the venue intoxicated, and either fight, pause to drink more alcohol, or urinate or vomit, in our small dead end street, on their way back to Liverpool Street Station or Old Street Station. All of these issues are already occurring regularly the morning after events at Village Underground.

As the venue has become more popular, the queues to get in get longer and longer, extending onto Shoreditch High Street, with many already drinking or intoxicated, and noisy, the greater the volume of people there, plus alcohol (and drugs) the greater the risk of public disorder and of crime. This threatens the safety of passing members of the public, and is intimidating to those of us who live very close by, trying to get to and from our homes.

I am sure the increasing number of tourists that are visiting the Shoreditch area would also find it intimidating, as would people (including children) staying at the new Citizen M hotel, whose entrance is directly opposite the entrance to Village Underground (and could not avoid the crowds waiting to get in).

Dear Hackney Licensing,

I write to strongly object to the recent license application by Village Underground, in particular their plans to extend their alcohol license until 6am on Saturday and Sunday mornings.

I believe this application fails to meet the four licensing objectives as laid out in the Licensing Act of 2003

- 1. prevention of crime and disorder,
- 2. public safety,
- 3. prevention of public nuisance, and
- 4. the protection of children from harm

Village Underground is a Jekyll & Hyde venue. Although local residents don't have a problem with its so-called 'arts & culture' aspect we do have issues with its 'nightclub' aspect. This application falls into the latter category.

The owners of this venue are fully aware Hackney Council are currently conducting a serious review of the licensing activities of this part of the borough with a view to expanding the 'Special Policy Area'. This venue would fall within the boundary of an expanded SPA. The timing of their application reveals opportunistic motives of simply trying to gain a licensing extension before this happens.

I also find it strange they feel they are not capable of running an 'arts & culture' venue without the granting a 6am booze license. Perhaps they are in the wrong business? Or the wrong part of London? There are countless 'arts & culture' venues throughout London that don't need such a license to prosper.

There are families with children living close to this venue. Many local residents get little respite from the night time economy as it is but to then have precious weekend mornings ruined even further by the loud screams and shouts of drunken customers pouring out of Village Underground two hours later is really too much. Are we all really supposed to sleep with ear plugs?

Annoyingly, we also regularly have our buildings vandalised with graffiti and urinated against during the aftermath of 'Temporary Event Notice' events at Village Underground. And now, with this new license, Village Underground plan to hold these events every weekend? If they cannot control drunken customers with their 4am license how will they control these same customers when they are two hours drunker at 6am? It makes no sense.

Due to their colossal sound system Village Underground also contributes to the 'fug of noise' local residents struggle to sleep through. The noise from Village Underground is actually at its most noticeable in the early hours of the morning - and when the Councils Noise Pollution Teams have long gone off duty - and so to prolong this by a further two hours would be just more punishment for residents.

Granting this license would simply exacerbate the noise disturbance and anti-social behaviour that already badly affects the streets of Shoreditch. And yet whose responsibility is it to control these hordes of drunks marauding the streets? The

Police want no part of it and Hackney's tiny handful of wardens are tucked up in bed themselves by this point. Chaos on the streets in the very early hours of the morning is the inevitable fruit of far too many alcohol licenses in too small an area being granted too easily.

In light of the above I truly hope the Council will keep one eye on the future by rejecting this application completely.

As you know we had an extension of our hours some years ago. This enabled us to invest in our facilities, which was essential in VU becoming one of London's best grass roots music venues. We proudly present hundreds of music and arts events, and we work with over 1500 artists each year. As a grass roots venue our reason for existing is to develop new music and artists' careers - and in doing so we're dedicated to contributing to the cultural life of the area and of London, as well as feeding new talent into the UK's music and cultural 'industries'.

I'm sure that you have read much of the recent sad demise of music venues in London. I expect that you've performed in some of the great clubs that we've lost. Village Underground has not been spared the pressures that have ended other important grass roots venues. We've fought hard to survive the Citizen M hotel opposite and the Highgate development next door, but we've also suffered a 600% rent increase and a major business rates rise. Keeping up as a London Living Wage employer we've also seen a massive increase in our staffing bill over the last couple of years.

All these and other financial pressures have brought us to a cross roads: We want to continue pursuing our mission of being one of London's best grass roots music venues, building the careers of home grown artists and curating acts from around the globe for the many communities of the city. This is why we do what we do. But for that to continue and to be viable and sustainable we now have to change our operation.

We're applying to extend our finish from 4am to 6am on Friday and Saturday nights. Critically, this will enable us to present live music and other cultural events on Friday

and Saturday evenings, before the later weekend music programming. In turn this means that we can free more Wednesdays and Thursdays for commercial/corporate events - the revenue of which is essential to keep VU and its mission viable for the future. VU is a Social Enterprise and our music and arts programming has always needed subsidising in this way, only of late that subsidy level has been dramatically pushed up.

To balance this out we are also volunteering to hand back some of our weekday hours, instead of a closing time of 2am Monday - Wednesday we will close at midnight. This equates to an overall net reduction in hours.

In summary, the proposed premises license application is on the same terms as the existing premises licence, save for:

- 1. A reduction to the terminal hours for regulated entertainment and the sale of alcohol by 2 hours on Mondays to Wednesdays to midnight (currently 2am) and 23:40 (currently 01:40) respectively.
- 2. An extension to the terminal hours for licensable activities on Fridays and Saturdays to 06:00 for regulated entertainment (currently 03:30) and 05:30 for the sale of alcohol and late night refreshment (currently 03:30).
- 3. Cleaning up some of our conditions with minor amendments and updates to conditions 35, 36, 56, 63, 67 and 72 Ive attached our license so that you can look at these in more detail if you would like.

All other proposed licensable activities, permitted hours and conditions will remain as per the existing premises licence. For full clarity we will also submit a document summarising the differences between the existing premises licence and the proposed premises licence appended to application.

In terms of change for you as a neighbour and impact on the immediate area we do not believe there will be a significant difference, for the last decade we have used all 21 available T.E.N. opportunities each year to extend our close time in this way. In this sense we are regularising what already happens, with we hope a modest increase.

We have not received complaints of music noise or dispersal noise at either 4am or 6am, so do not expect there to be an issue under this proposed change.

We have always believed 6am is a better time to disperse customers than 4am because the ambient noise is much higher and public transport is fully functional, both greatly reducing the chance of any disturbance.

I know that you were opposed to our previous license application, so I wanted to go through this all with you in advance. We genuinely would not be doing this unless we felt we had to. I hope that since our last application you've seen us to be conscientious neighbours, only a phone call away and always responsive. I hope that you can also value what we're trying to achieve here and that you can support us in continuing our mission.

Please get in touch with any questions, I would like to meet to discuss this in detail and our operating practices in general, if you can spare the time.

Dear sirs.

I am writing to voice my serious concern with regards to the plans to extend the licensing hours of the Village Underground to 6am - every Friday and Saturday night.

As a resident of the area local to the venue in question I live in a historically protected property. Due to these limitations it is not possible to have double glazing installed in the property. As I live on the second floor of the building I am already subject to an enormous amount of noise, pollution and vibration on the front of the property (which is adjacent to the traffic lights on Shoreditch High Street.

The only respite in this situation, is that I am fortunate enough to have my bedroom on the rear of the property - so the traffic / people noise is sufficiently reduced from the front of the building to allow me to get at least some rest on most nights.

In recent months buskers under the bridge on shoreditch high street have been allowed to be exceptionally noisy which has made the level of noise at the front of the property almost unbearable on some weekends (including Sunday) nights. This noise is also loudly audible at the rear of the property and combines with the general noise emitted from the Village Underground customers and those of other local venues as they spill out onto the street and hang around often in large groups. In the summer when it is essential to open windows (to allow air to flow around what is essentially a very small flat) this level of noise can already be experienced at levels which make it impossible to sleep.

Fortunately this noise has been restricted to controlled hours which allow at least some sleep to be achieved after the venues close. If the venue is allowed to open until 6am every Friday / Saturday night it will make it impossible to sleep, particularly during summer months.

The council should bear in mind that, as much as these opening hours my be appropriate for 'out-of-town' or more isolated venues, they are most certainly NOT APPROPRIATE for establishments which are located in mixed residential locations such as Shoreditch / Holywell lane area. If you continue to allow this sort of development then it will impact so negatively on the local area as to make the older buildings (which can't be double glazed) completely uninhabitable. Buildings left vacant will ultimately fall into disrepair and have a detrimental impact on the potential and value of the entire area - from a residential, but also a commercial perspective.

The nature of the location is also such that any loud noise is bounced around and transferred by the acoustics of the local high rise buildings. This magnifies and reflects the noise generated from the local venues back towards the rear of the residential properties along shoreditch high street and holywell lane.

Not only is it unacceptable from a the perspective of noise pollution, the proposed hours are considerable longer than the majority of local venues - this means that after the point in the evening when the other venues close, one can expect an enormous influx of potentially ALREADY INEBRIATED patrons flocking to the area to carry on their night and the only late

night venue - directly behind my home! As a woman who lives alone I am concerned about the level of public safety I would then have in having to traverse this throng of late night drunken individuals in order to get to my residence.

As the venue is directly adjacent to the high street, one can expect that this enormous influx of most likely inebriated individuals will also spill out into the local area - as they can already be seen hanging around on the streets after the club closes on it's current licensed hours - if the individuals are carrying on to 6am then one can assume that they are likely to have abused a variety of substances aside from alcohol to facilitate this late night partying. I worry as to what may happen if these individuals are then wondering around a residential neighborhood unchecked in groups, at the quietest time for police presence and other security - if it were to close at 6am.

Please do not allow these plans to go ahead - they are based on greed and pay no heed to the rights and concerns of local residents. The only reason to request this extension is clearly to attract the patrons from other local venues after they close - do you really think that it is appropriate to then condense these already wasted individuals into one place so close to the homes of local residents families and children? I do not.

I write to object to the above referenced license application, in particular to extend Friday and Saturday hours until 6am.

Village Underground is a key local venue and social enterprise, and yes, venues like this in London are under threat from development, rising rents and business rates. And yes, we should all do what we can to protect our grassroots venues and ensure that the creative economy that defines this city continues to thrive. This is where we would look to the Council and also to London's Night Czar Amy Lamé, to work with the venue to develop a sustainable business model that does not require spurious asks like SERVING ALCOHOL UNTIL 5.30 am as a solution to revenues. There is no reason that residents should have to bear the brunt of this situation. We love living in Shoreditch, and some of us like to get up early in the morning and get on a bicycle and enjoy being outdoors. Having to deal with drunk revellers who had their last drink at 5.30 am is frankly nauseating - not to mention occasionally dangerous and uncomfortable.

While in principe the reduction in weekday hours is welcomed, it's clear that these are not profitable hours for the venue: hence the argument of switching one out for the other doesn't work. There isn't a sacrifice being made here, and the point is not about net opening hours, but what is reasonable in terms of opening hours: for residents, for punters, and for the institution. So, whatever way you look at it this is a bit of "lipstick on the pig": one of our important venues is under threat and residents should absorb cumulative impact to save it. I don't think so.

Specifically, I object for the following reasons:

- 1. This premises is on the edge of the Shoreditch Special Policy Area, and would be inside the newly expanded SPA. This application should receive very close review and the burden of proof is on the operator to make the case for special circumstances, in particular having considered other ways in which they might support the viability of the business.
- 2. The application is for late hours, which under current licensing guidelines means it is the operator's responsibility to show no adverse impact and contribution to cumulative impact. The operator's claims of good faith until now undisputed are insufficient. This needs real exploration and data.

- 3. This address is located in the heart of Shoreditch, near to some of London's busiest bars. It is common knowledge that the neighbourhood is often an open air club, with violence, vomiting, urination, defecation, drug use and unsociable conduct late into the night, presenting real safety and security issues. And here we have an operator suggesting the SERVING OF ALCOHOL UNTIL 5.30 am makes business sense. It's lazy commercialism at its worst.
- 4. The protection of children from harm is vital. Shoreditch can be overwhelmed with inebriated and unsociable people due to the concentration of drinking establishments in particular on Friday and Saturday evenings when much of the trade is not local to the area, or frankly, to London showing little regard for the environment. Evenings attract violence, illicit acts and vile behaviour, and residents have their doors smashed, front doors urinated and defecated on, etc. As residents we shouldn't have to continuously make such a stark trade-off between the place we love to live and the environment our children are exposed to because operators lazily believe that selling more alcohol is the only way to make an enterprise viable. Operators have to take responsibility for the environment they help create, and taxes is not enough, not least in an environment where central government austerity madness means there are fewer police on the streets to manage the fall-out of drunken revelry.

For each one of the reasons set forth above I believe that the Application should be rejected in its entirety by the Council.

If this application will be going to the Planning Sub-Committee I would like to be advised of the date. I also urge the Council to schedule the hearing in the evening allowing those of us that work during the day to attend.

I write to strongly object to the above license application to extend the licensing hours until 6am at weekends.

My young family live in the area and we can barely get a good nights sleep on any day from Thursday – Saturday night because of the screaming and shouting that occurs after closing time in local clubs venues. The bouncers are totally ineffective and once they leave the venue the drunk and often abusive clubbers stumble through the back streets of Shoreditch causing widespread disruption.

Having another venue closing at 6am will simply mean further drunk and disorderly people leaving the clubs and ensuring little or no quality sleep is possible at the weekends.

Furthermore hotel guests and visitors coming to Shoreditch early for the flower market on Sundays should not be met by abusive people leaving clubs, which is generally the case if you visit the area at the weekend around 2-4am to see just how bad it is. Defacation and vomit is normal on weekends in front of our door.

The licensing department and council must work closely together as the area has degenerated so badly as retail spaces have been turned into bars and late night restaurants and the daytime economy has badly suffered with most of the Shoreditch triangle closed during the day. Tower Hamlets licensing have continued to benefit from Shoreditch by blocking bars and clubs opening around Redchurch St, and instead creating one of the most creative retail areas around Redchurch street. This was a lost opportunity for Shoreditch and only by recognising the value of the day time economy can Shoreditch improve.

The Village Underground would make a fantastic retail and event space but in its current use as late night club is only open after midnight so the local council lose out on creation of daytime jobs and boosting the local area.

It goes without saying that staying open so late means yet more crime and disorder, lat summer it was the late night Buskers that were the consequence of such late night bars. Playing electric guitars at 4am on both Fridays and Saturdays.

This is a typical recored unacceptable consequence of late night opening hours.

Dear Sir,

I wish to object in the strongest terms to this application. Village Underground is finally showing its true intentions to be an all-night club venue with minimal other cultural activity. It is not appropriate for such a venue to be located in a mixed-use area with a significant number of residents. My objection is based on the prevention of public nuisance and the prevention of crime and disorder.

My wife and I live from VU (in Fairchild Place, less than away) and have done so since 1996, long before VU started. Our daughter has grown up here and goes to school locally. I met Mr Foxcroft before he opened VU and he stressed his intention to build a cultural venue which might occasionally offer live music, but not a full-time music venue. This intention was abandoned long ago: VU is now well known as a club venue and operates several nights a week including one or two events each week that run most of the night.

I had very little notice of the current application so I have not been able to confirm the current licence hours and conditions. However, the proposed licence is very clear in allowing events to be run every night until midnight, 2am or 6am.

This activity impacts our life in two ways. Most directly, the noise of bass-rich, amplified music penetrates the fabric of our building and has interrupted our sleep on many occasions. On the worst occasions my habit is to complain directly to Mr Foxcroft by text message or email, and I have my record of a dozen such complaints over the past two or three years. (I regret that the Hackney noise patrol ceased to be effective some time ago so I have not routinely logged complaints with them.) Mr Foxcroft has written to me on several occasions following such complaints and his request is always the same – he wants to do a sound level check in my flat. I have refused this because his goal is get some numbers to hide behind; regardless of any sound readings, I know when the noise is disturbing me and that should be enough of a reading for him to reduce the levels of his sound system. The fact is that he advertises loud music, that is what his customers expect, and he is putting his business interests above the rights of local residents.

Village Underground also contributes materially to the saturation of night-time activities in the South Shoreditch area. It is a big venue and there is a great deal of human traffic entering and leaving at all hours of the night. This leads inevitably to more antisocial behaviour in the area and specifically in our street: drunkenness, more noise, public urination and defecation, drug dealing. This is a wider problem but the only

way to tackle it is one application at a time. The extended hours requested in this application would make the problem worse and set a policy precedent of exactly the wrong kind.

I recently provided a taxi service for my daughter to the Brixton Academy, which has been operating as a music venue for as long as I can remember. It is also located in a mixed use area with local residents, and they have a curfew at 11pm for almost all events. This would be appropriate for VU and would almost entirely mitigate the negative impact that their events have on residents.

I will be happy to attend a hearing to re-state these views.

My name is _____, I live in ____ Shoreditch High Street. Someone informed me today that Village Underground has applied to extend their license to operate until 6am.

I believe in supporting the nightlife businesses of London, but I think it is necessary to do it harmoniously with their local environments. Village Underground is a great venue for people that choose to spend their night there, but it is the cause of a lot of frustration for every resident living close to it, such as myself.

The primary reason is that the 100s of people that attend gigs at the venue spend a lot of time outside the venue (taking a break, discussing, smoking, waiting in the queue etc) in Hollywell lane, which causes great amounts of noise until 3am in the morning. Coupled with the fact that they are drunk and uninterested in considering local residents as their intention was to go out and have fun, it makes for a very unpleasant experience for people living nearby. There is consolation in knowing that it will have finished by 3am and we can go to sleep then, but allowing the venue to operate until 6am will likely make the situation insufferable.

To summarise, my two concerns are regarding:

- (1) Public nuisance by the clubgoers
- (2) Public safety, given the number of intoxicated individuals in Holywell lane

I urge you to consider the above when making whether to extent Village Underground's license to operate until 6am.

As a resident of Hackney and as someone who has visited Village Underground on more than one occasion, I wanted to express my support for their application to remain open until 6am rather than 4am on Friday and Saturday nights. I've attended great gigs and club nights at the venue and am consistently impressed by the quality of their bookings. In my experience, the staff have always been friendly and helpful as well.

In general I find 6am a far better time to leave a venue: it's safer as it's brighter outside, and with more public transport running it's far easier to get home. In addition, a later finish means less disruption at closing time as more people have headed home when they feel ready to, rather than the lights coming on forcing everyone to leave at the same time.

While I fully understand the pressures faced by local councils to monitor and regulate noise-levels and public disorder, it seems to me that music venues have faced endless setbacks by being seen as part of the problem instead of part of the solution. The proposed extension of VU weekend hours is in my opinion, a big step forward and one that I wholeheartedly ask you to support.

Later closing hours, especially in the highly monitored environment of VU actually reduces the risk of public nuisance by allowing a more regulated and gradual exit of the venue. Given that public transport is already working at this time, the public is more likely to go straight home versus spending their time on the streets waiting for TFL to resume their services. Furthermore, it is a huge support for their financial viability and increases the possibilities of the venue's brilliant programming.

With a 30% decline of London's small to medium sized venues, Village Underground is more than just a concert space. Not only is a place for everyone to feel safe, supported and represented, but it is also an irreplacable hub for London's music-goers to unite in shared celebration and a vital space for artists to grow and develop their music. Having worked with VU in the past, I have seen how dedicated they are to both their audiences and artists, but also how considerate they have been to their surrounding areas, a balance that is not always so easily found in London, and one that should be encouraged and not limited.

I am a local resident and would like to write in support of the application.

London used to be renowned for its nightlife and I think it would be a great shame if this night venue was to close. I live nearby and consider the venue to have been well run. There have been no deaths or drug incidents I can name and the disturbance caused by the venue is minimal. I cannot hear any noise from music when walking nearby and I would like there to be a late night venue nearby so I could exercise the option to go, if I wished.

Crime and disorder

I have seen no associated crime or disorder with the venue as it currently is and I therefore think it is appropriate for it be given a license extension. There is no substitute for policing the streets. Because the police won't do their job properly it should not be the fault of well run venues. I do not think any noisy people at 6am can be blamed on the venue - ambulances and other sirens and alarms are a far greater nuisance than people.

Public safety

I can think of no additional public safety concern. The venue, so far as I know, has been without incident relating to drugs and appears very well run.

Public nuisance

I would think the erection of a few signs indicating where public conveniences were (e.g. at Liverpool Street station) would help people "caught short". I think a night time venue would actually reduce public nuisance, potentially, by providing a safe place for people wanting to go out at night to go to. A lack of night venues in this area causes young people to congregate in the open air in places like the bishopsgate goodsyard underpass where various dissolute people and the homeless can interact with them and lead them astray. A well managed night venue with proper security like Village Underground can help alleviate this problem and prevent future problems.

Dear Sir / Madam,

I'm the in Charing Cross and over the course of the past thirty years have been responsible for venues such as the Astoria – until it closed in 2009, The Kentish Town Forum, the Brixton Fridge (now the Electric Brixton) and the Bass Clef / Blue Note in Hoxton. I'm writing to support the application of the Village Underground for a later license on the basis of my own experience running venues that have applied successfully in the past to have their own licenses extended and because it happens to be a venue that can genuinely be said to have added something quite special to the London economy – both from an economic and cultural point of view.

Public transport is limited at 4am - even with the introduction of a limited weekend all night tube service. Emptying your venue at that time on a weekend night when you maybe close to capacity means that large numbers of people are departing the area simultaneously with all the noise and disruption inevitable to local residents and businesses. Often people will mull around waiting for public transport to become fully operational and this does have a negative impact on the local area. By closing at 6am you have far fewer people inside at the end and a much longer and staggered and better managed dispersal of the crowd. When we used to close at 4am at the Fridge it was common for us to chuck onto the street a full house. When we started closing at 6am we perhaps were one quarter full and customers left at a steady rate over a period of time with a consequent diminution of noise and disturbance. When we closed at 4am ejecting a full house onto the streets we would have to deal with a myriad of local resident complaints on a Monday morning. These complaints didn't completely disappear once we started closing at 6am – but their number fell very dramatically. It is a simple fact that 1500 people leaving at the same time will make noise. Those same 1500 people leaving over the course of a two or three hour period steadily will make somewhat less of a disturbance. The incidence of crime also fell with a later closing time. Large numbers of customers leaving a venue at the same time when public transport is at best very limited become prey to pickpockets, pirate taxi drivers, etc to a much greater extent than if the venue were to close two hours later. Fewer people on the streets inevitably leads to a lesser likelihood that that they will become the victims of criminal activity in whatever form. From a safety point of view it is in the customers interest for the option to exist for them to remain inside well managed premises until such a time as public transport is fully up and running.

I have been to numerous shows at the Village Underground and I am in a better position than most to judge the way in which a venue is run by virtue of having done this for a living for such a long time. Some venues, you can just tell, have a somewhat 'laissez-faire' attitude to the way in which they are managed. That cannot be said of this venue. The security team whenever I have visited have been professional, courteous and most importantly are in 'control'. This is not a venue that admits anyone – and which is very good at ensuring people the worse for drink or who don't have the required photo ID do not get in. Although I do not know the management on a personal level – I can tell as someone is in this game and who visits their venue semi-regularly that they know what they're doing and are very good at it.

The Village Underground is one of the venues that have opened since Shoreditch / Hoxton became a place in its own right to head towards for a night out rather than a place you passed through on the way somewhere else. The transformation in the area since I managed an old jazz venue called the Bass Clef in Hoxton Square nearly 30 years ago (which subsequently became The Blue Note) has been extraordinary. You could walk from Old Street station into Hoxton Square at midnight on a Saturday night back in the late 1980s/early 1990s and count the number of people you would pass on the fingers of a couple of hands. The tens of thousands of people who now socialize in this part of London have had an enormously beneficial economic and cultural impact on the area. Anything that makes the area

There is continual pressure on the night-time economy from councils and police due to budget cuts and costs of policing. There is considerable uncertainty in the labour market over Brexit. It's getting harder to recruit good staff and it is costing more and more to do so. Food and drink prices are high and rising, in part due to the weakness of the pound. Margins are likely to be squeezed further in the years to come as the majority of suppliers source from the E.U.

There are already casualties in this sector and we are hearing of more every week. You will have seen in the news that London has lost almost 50% of its music venues in the last ten years. Young people are drinking less and staying home more often. There is competition from social media and Netflix as much as with other operators and this is a trend that looks set to continue. We really do not want Village Underground to be another of these casualties - this would not just be bad for them, but bad for artists, musicians and the whole eco-system of contributors that make their living through this venue.

Village Underground is an arts-led venue; one that contributes significantly to the local, national and international reputation of Shoreditch as a town centre. However, the cost of running arts-led venues is high as artists need to be paid. They bring in talent from all over the world. In recent conversations with the Arts Council, the general feeling is that likely complications with visas post-Brexit are set to provide significant barriers to entry for young artists and it will be harder to bring them in and more costly to do so.

In short the macro-economic climate is not good. They are trying to find a way to keep the doors open. Please help them by supporting this application.





We have promoted events at Village Underground since it opened, and for me it is unrivalled as one of best music and arts venues in London, and is both a crucial and essential space in a fast-changing area.

The venue's attention to cutting-edge, progressive and varied London-community focused programming, combined with the best approach to safety, quality and comfortable experiences for event attendees, make it a joy to present events there as a promoter.

In a city where nightlife is so important to people across the weekend, the experience we have of people being made to leave a club at 4pm, rather than to allow a full night time programme where egress is much more staggered, has a significantly less impactful effect on the local area. I have been a resident in the borough for over 15 years always within 15 minutes walk of the centre of Shoreditch. During this time I have witnessed the transformation of Shoreditch from a vibrant, creative hotspot of art and culture to becoming increasingly culturally diluted, where the artists have been replaced by mainstream bars bankers. This is of course mainly to do with it being a victim of its own success - the attraction of the culture the artistic community provided. With it's rise in popularity, property and business rates have sky rocketed and it has become more difficult for businesses to survive without appealing to the mainstream.

I'm a music fan and Village Underground is almost the last bastion of what I consider to be artistically and culturally rich in it's music policy and programming. I remember when Cargo was one of the best music venues in London, playing incredible experimental music from across the globe by new and exciting artists, serving hot sake and experimental food. An all round mind blowing experience which I was eager to share with anyone that visited from around the UK and overseas. The last time I went the music sounded so awfully mainstream it could have been played directly from a Radio I playlist and I was served a terrible drink in a plastic cup. It was heartbreaking.

The pressure of increasing rental prices and operating costs have forced venues to take less risks and what was culture and art is replaced with prescriptive mainstream with no motivation other than to make money through playing what is popular. In my opinion this is a real shame.

From of the experimental attitude of the Village Underground have emerged globally recognised brands such as Morning Gloryville which is famous for sober raving and conscious clubbing before work from 6am. There are not many venues anywhere that would risk backing such new, innovative and experimental ideas.

Village Underground was also the first venue outside of Spain to take a risk and support <u>Elrow</u>, now the fastest growing and one of the biggest electronic music brands in the world, hosting events everywhere from Dubai to Peru. These brands have outgrown Village Underground but without their support they would not be where they are now. With all of these successes in experimental music, there are bound to be less successful endeavours. The team are bold, courageous, hard working and do a job that very few in the world can do.

I am in full support of this application because I know that the increase in trading hours will allow Village Underground to continue to do what is most difficult, to programme creative, experimental and culturally diverse music while making ends meet and taking care of a wonderful team. They have a family attitude to their business and they genuinely care about the community, both locally and those they support through their often very challenging endeavours.

They are one of London's finest treasures and it would be a crying shame for London if it was lost due to the increasing pressures of running this kind of business - in a town which has already lost so many of its cultural assets and musical institutions.



This is very important to me as a regular gig goer and feel strongly that the VU consistently provides Londoners, and specifically those of us lucky enough to live in Hackney, with high quality, safe and accessible entertainment. It is one of my favourite venues in London and if it had to close because the council couldn't agree this small change, I would be extremely disappointed and disheartened by the short sightedness of the licensing board.

VU are offering to close earlier during the early weekdays which would offset trading hours but more importantly, would work towards reducing risk of nuisance and other potential antisocial behaviour at the times in the week that might be more harmful.

As a regular patron of many venues across London, I find the management of VU to be one of the more professional and safety focussed teams in London, especially for a small independent venue. I'm sure they are more than capable of handling any impact the additional hours might have and continue being responsible and considerate neighbours.

I am writing to present my full support for Village Underground and the community of artists they have represented for over 10 years.

Having worked with Village Underground on multiple events, I can say first hand that the venue and it's team dedicate themselves to bringing cutting edge music and arts events to Shoreditch and Hackney. Since it's conception in 2006, more than 150,000 people have visited the venue as patrons and thousands of artists and musicians from the UK and internationally have been part of unique and diverse events.

Unfortunately, arts and music events are loss making and the venues receives no public grant funding. Whilst VU have been operating a social enterprise model that uses commercial income from corporate events to subsidise music and arts productions, this mechanism no longer works due to huge rises in operational and staffing costs.

To counter this VU have applied for an extension of hours on their license, which will allow the venue the flexibility it needs to programme loss making, cultural events in early weekend slots, rather than on the prime days for commercial and private bookings during the week. This variation to the license is not proposed without offered compromise, which shows their continued commitment to respecting their local community.

From my experience as an events planner, the proposed changes would have a positive impact on the operation of the venue...

- The new hours actually equate to a *reduction* in operational hours, particularly over potentially sensitive days during the week.
- Closing the venue at 6am, when public transport is operational, will reduce any disorder or public nuisance caused by patrons leaving the area.
- VU have successfully delivered many events finishing at 6am under TENs, without significant crime or disorder.
- Allows for many more culturally diverse (and important) events to be programmed over the weekend, where they can benefit a greater audience pick up.

For VU this is about maintaining the live music and arts culture it has been central to; Their commitment to the cultural life of the area is shown in their reluctance to increase tickets and drinks prices despite the difficult and ongoing economic challenges. The venue employs over 70 people, many of whom are locals and benefit from their employers commitment to the London Living Wage Foundation.

Unfortunately, because of these costs, Village Underground like many music venues across the country, are losing the small margin that keeps the live cultural events viable.

Please support the continued efforts of this fantastic independent venue and ultimately support the artists and musicians of Hackney.

I am writing in relation to the application of Village Underground (VU) to extend its licensing hours until 6am in the weekends. I am not familiar with all the details of the application but as a neighbour (I live across the road from VU on Fairchild Place) and frequent visitor to VU, the management team asked if I wanted to contact you and provide any feedback I may have about the impact VU has had on crime / disorder, public nuisance and public safety impact locally.

At the outset, I should be clear that I can only speak from my own experience and values, I appreciate my views may not be shared by all residents in the area. Specifically, I am passionate about music and the contribution a music venue with programming as diverse and consistently world class as VU's makes artistically to the scene and also to the immediate vicinity of Shoreditch High street (otherwise pretty rammed with bars, shops, pubs and increasing amounts of chains). We are so fortunate to have a venue as unique as VU in general and in such an accessible area, its iconic street art and carraiges are in itself an attraction to Shoreditch and I walk through tourists taking pictures of the wall art every single day. From my perspective, it is essential we support VU in whatever ways they need to remain open and in Shoreditch by assisting them to be be economically viable and competitive with other clubs around the city and internationally. I approach their application with that philosophy in mind.

In terms of nuisance factor, as a neighbour to the club, plainly it is a noisy area in general and quite honestly - the noise from VU doesn't bother me. I very rarely hear it above the traffic or get woken by it. That's not to say it never happens, but I accept living in this location it is inevitable on occaison. The noise emanating from Dinerama in the weekends relentless, extremely disruptive and unbearably loud, far worse than anything I have ever noticed from VU. What I will say about VU is that the team go out of their way to minimise noise and control their sound. I have written previously to the Council in support of their different application for a venue in Stoke Newington and explained that the sound team from VU have asked to take readings from my flat before, to understand how the sound reaches our building and take steps accordingly. They monitor it. If they were to get feedback about their sound, I have every confidence they would genuinely work towards finding solutions and working with residents to improve the position.

The other important point from my perspective is the timing between 4am to 6am. My experience of all bars / clubs, including VU, is that around closing time there is that spill out to the streets and a general loitering / milling around making arrangements to get home. Often that's the noisiest time in terms of people shouting etc. It is far better, for all concerned, that clubs close at the time all transport is back up and running. People are safer, the streets are busier if they are walking, people aren't talking loudly on quiet streets waiting for cabs. In relation to VU, so close to the overground and tubes, it surely is in the best interests of safety and noise levels that the club closes once they are running.

I've given some thought to the crime / disorder point. I have noticed this outside other clubs in other areas but I personally have not outside VU (at least the nights I attend). I do credit the security team at VU for that, in part. The searching is rigorous, the ticket and ID checking is uncompromising and inside the club security are regularly patrolling. There is always a visible security presence outside the club with full view of the well lit side street the entrance opens to and I have watched them wave cars away that tried to hover, engines on, nearby. I have never had a problem with disorder in the club and that must be reflected in the way the crowd

I am writing to support their application for a licence until 6am on Friday and Saturdays. Village Underground do a huge amount for artists in Hackney and beyond and they are a very professionally run business.

As I am sure you are well aware trading conditions are pretty challenging for the hospitality sector in the current climate. Business rates have increased dramatically. There is continual pressure on the night-time economy from councils and police due to budget cuts and costs of policing. There is considerable uncertainty in the labour market over Brexit. It's getting harder to recruit good staff and it is costing more and more to do so. Food and drink prices are high and rising, in part due to the weakness of the pound. Margins are likely to be squeezed further in the years to come as the majority of suppliers source from the E.U.

There are already casualties in this sector and we are hearing of more every week. You will have seen in the news that London has lost almost 50% of its music venues in the last ten years. Young people are drinking less and staying home more often. There is competition from social media and Netflix as much as with other operators and this is a trend that looks set to continue. We really do not want Village Underground to be another of these casualties – this would not just be bad for them, but bad for artists, musicians and the whole eco-system of contributors that make their living through this venue.

Village Underground is an arts-led venue; one that contributes significantly to the local, national and international reputation of Shoreditch as a town centre. However, the cost of running arts-led venues is high as artists need to be paid. They bring in talent from all over the world. In recent conversations with the Arts Council, the general feeling is that likely complications with visas post-Brexit are set to provide significant barriers to entry for young artists and it will be harder to bring them in and more costly to do so.

In short the macro-economic climate is not good. They are trying to find a way to keep the doors open. Please help them by supporting this application.



In that time I have seen dramatic changes to Hackney and, in particular, to Shoreditch. As regular attendees at live music events, my partner and I have been disappointed to see the closure of so many good live music and late night venues in Shoreditch which has coincided with the proliferation of high-end restaurants, many of them chain or franchise restaurants. For the residents of Hackney that are interested in live music and late night entertainment – and we are numerous – it feels as if good music venues are becoming fewer and further between. Village Underground is a notable exception.

VU is, without doubt, one of the best venues in London for live music. It is one of the few venues left in Hackney that is big enough to still attract large international acts. My partner and I are particularly fond of the diversity of acts that perform at VU which includes folk, rock music, world music, jazz, and boundary-pushing, progressive electronic acts. They even provide drawing classes which my 70 year old mother has attended when she has been visiting London. It is precisely the sort of inclusive venue that encapsulates the diversity of Hackney itself. It would be an enormous loss to Hackney – both culturally and economically – if large, international acts had to perform elsewhere because VU wasn't able to offer the sort of late night license that other venues in London offer.

Although we normally attend rock music acts at VU, a group of friends and I recently celebrated my 40th birthday at VU to see electronic acts Octave One and Dave Clarke perform. We were thoroughly impressed by the professionalism of the VU staff and the smooth running of the venue even at 4am when the crowd was dispersing. Their interest in crowd safety was exemplified in many ways including the sale of specially designed ear plugs for hearing protection. We were also pleased with the friendliness of the crowd who were like-minded people interested in progressive, interesting, cutting-edge electronic music. VU attracts the sort of culturally-aware people that are interested in specific types of music and the arts, as opposed to venues which attract people who just want to get wasted. This in turn means that people leaving VU late at night are still in a state to be respectful of neighbouring properties and businesses.

Having also lived in Australia and Ireland and observed the public debate over licensing hours, I am convinced that the best practice is to have crowds disperse naturally rather than having a set time (be it 2am or 4am) at which everyone has to leave. There is a lesser impact on the local area if people leave naturally throughout the night rather than leaving *en masse*. Block departures of crowds puts a strain on transport facilities which at 4am only includes taxis so people are left somewhat stranded in the area. At 6am the trains and tube are running again. By 6am a lot of people will have already decided to leave of their own accord so you have far fewer people leave at once than if a venue closes at 4am.

I am aware that VU's application includes reducing their hours of opening mid-week. As a professional working in the city that enjoys late night entertainment on the weekends, it is vastly preferable to have businesses operating shorter hours during the week and longer hours at the weekend. Everyone I know that lives in Hackney feels the same way. Professionals that live in Hackney don't want to be out until 2am on a Monday or Tuesday but we do, for time to time, want to be able to have a late night on a Friday or Saturday and see world class artists perform.

I am a Hackney resident and writing to you in support of Village Underground's new LATER LICENSE APPLICATION for an extra two hours trading on Friday and Saturday nights, from 4am to 6am.

I am regularly going to events at Village Underground and it is one of my favorite venues in London. It is extremely professionally run and in all the years I have visited it I have never encountered any trouble. Staff & Security working there are competent and courteous and everything is very well organised with the aim of keeping people save.

The venue has the ideal size and location for the type of events they put on and the space inside is simply beautiful. I love the fact that it's near me like so many other brilliant venues in Hackney which are an asset to the borough in my opinion.

They are also doing important work for the local community by putting on free events such as interactive art workshops for kids which I have attended in the past with my children (see photo form the Hackney Gazette below of my daughter taking part in such an event).

The type of people who attend parties on the weekend are individuals that are in it purely for the music and not rowdy kids who get drunk and cause trouble.

Also the venue is not really situated in a residential street. I think that people who choose to live in that area know about it's famous night time economy and embrace it and not people who want a quiet live. For me the abundance of things to do and see in Hackney make it the best & most interesting place in London to live and that includes it's many restaurants, bars and all night clubs. And precisely for that reason many tourists also choose to visit it, which helps it's economy. Therefore it makes no sense for Hackney Council to try and cut venue's licenses.

Village Underground has a fantastic reputation for providing a platform for cutting-edge live music and the arts and puts on world class artists. If they are forced to close their doors at 4 am they will be unable to compete with other venues in London in this cut-throat market and eventually be unable to attract the biggest names in the world music scene to play there. It simply is not viable to run a venue with a time restriction of this sort on Friday & Saturday nights. Not only that but it will be more difficult for their clients to make their way home in the middle of the night and that will put people off going there. Also rather than going straight home when the club finishes at 6 am because people will be very tired after a long night out, if it finishes at 4 am instead people will be more likely to wander around, looking for something else to go to rather than calling it a night and by doing that cause more disruption to residents. And with most public transport running fully after 6 am, at 4 am people are more likely to call & wait for a taxi because at that time it's more difficult to get home and this causes more noise and traffic congestion.

The fact that Village Underground has volunteered to reduce it's opening hours during weekdays is positive as it will reduce the risk of public nuisance, crime or disorder at potentially more sensitive times of the week when people need to work.

I am writing to offer the support of myself and my company, Club Mexicana to the late licence application by Village Underground (to extend their licence to 6am closing time on Sunday mornings). The activities of Village Underground are beneficial to Club Mexicana. As set out in this letter, we consider that this licence extension will help their business, and in turn ours, and will also likely reduce any potential nuisance, crime and disorder that may be associated with venues such as this.

Club Mexicana is a street food trader, just metres away from Village Underground at Dinerama on Great Eastern Street.

The institution of Village Underground directly benefits our business. We regularly have customers coming to our establishment from abroad or from outside of the area who have come to London solely to attend one of the events put on at Village Underground. When a major event is on, there is a noticeable increase in footfall, reservations and consequentially our business. The change to the licence will allow the venue to continue to put on world class events, drawing in tourists who might otherwise go elsewhere (to other venues in London or in competing cities such as Paris, Berlin or Amsterdam). As a small but growing business, these effects can have a significant impact on our bottom line, ensuring that we can survive in an area facing ever-increasing rent.

In relation to the impact that this licence extension will have, it will likely reduce any crime, disorder or nuisance caused to surrounding businesses although in the experience of Club Mexicana, this has been minimal if anything. By 6am, most transport links in the area are running full services. This means that attendees at these events will be able to easily and efficiently make their way home without having to wait around for reduced night services at exposed bus stops (which often attracts opportunistic crime).

Crime and incidents of public disorder are reduced in daylight hours so extending the licence until 6am would have a positive impact and provide greater safety to those attending such events as they will be able to make their way home in the light.

Recently, London has been taking steps to support the night time economy. Sadiq Khan has expressed his support by appointing London's first 'Night Czar', Amy Lamé and investment in the 'night tube' is evidence of this proactive approach.

Our business directly benefits from the vibrant arts and music culture that continues to thrive throughout Hackney. The award of a Hackney Arts Centre licence to Village Underground was one of many examples of such support the council provides to businesses in the area and highlights Hackney as a leading light in London and across the rest of the UK.

In summary, we, Club Mexicana, hope that you will grant this late licence extension, providing an opportunity for Village Underground to further contribute to the success and economy of the Borough of Hackney.

Please don't allow village underground to become another of London's cultural institutions forced to close because of extortionate rental rates and limited operation hours. Some of the biggest reasons people are drawn to live in this area are because it has so much to offer creatively, culturally and musically. Village Underground is one of the biggest assets to this area bringing together a diverse programme of theatre, live & electronic music.

I live at cheshire st and regularly will pass by village underground on my way home. I have never encountered any noise issues or disruption from it. I think the staff at village underground run one of the slickest operations of London's clubs and do so with the least amount of disruption possible to residents in the areas.

If anything, extending village underground's license hours on a Friday and Saturday will decrease disruption in shoreditch, if they close early you have multiple venues closing at a similar time causing more traffic and noise pollution on the streets from the egress. Allowing it to stay open till 6am will create a smoother egress solution with people likely filtering out from 4am onwards instead of all at once. It also means people will be more likely to take public transport home rather then causing a disruption to traffic with so many cabs outside the venue.

Nobody would buy the flats in these areas if they weren't "cool, vibesy" places to live but these areas would not be cool or vibesey if we have nothing to offer culturally.

To the Hackney Council and Team:

I hope that this letter finds you well. In making decisions for why a certain establishment should be allowed to extend their hours could potentially seem like an easy answer, and that would almost always be a 'no'.

It's quite difficult to see the positives that it may bring — night + club + later hours, how can this potentially be a positive?

However, as a person who's been working in the nightlife scene for over 14 years (closer to 15 now!) and only being 29 years old, owning my own club at the age of 21, working as the head of my department in the #3 club in the world at the moment (ZOUK), I understand how it is working behind-the-scenes, and what kind of heart, dedication, passion, grit, love, sweat, tears and everything else in-between that is necessary to build something and make something thrive, that will not just cash-in on what's-new, but will and can effectively inspire, move, push the barriers, and most importantly, create a community.

To sell drinks, that's just one small part of the equation. You are selling an idea, an aspiration, a feeling, a movement. There are drinks *everywhere*, *just* around the corner at an off-license. The continuation of a vibe, of the night — it carries on (just like when you're on a roll for watching your favourite TV series, reading an amazing book, or speaking to your friends or best friends) and you don't quite want that to end just yet.

I live in Hackney (N16 7TY) and am a regular visitor of Hackney's live music venues and VU in particular. For me the cultural variety in Hackney is one of the reasons for living here and I support initiatives to maintain and improve the situation. This makes a difference not only for Hackney but London too.

It is not always easy to find a balance considering commercial needs and cultural objectives and sometimes a small change can make running a venue much easier and in public interest more successful. I see the current licence application submitted by VU (2 extra hours on Fr/Sat by reducing the opening hours between Tue and Thu) as an attempt to achieve this. Commercial nights on the weekends can cross fund more art related cutting edge events which are often loss making. It should also be possible to have 2 event s on weekends without compromising the quality.

Closing earlier during the week and extending the weekend nights to 6 am should reduce noise levels in the early morning hours between 12 and 6. Public transport will be available making getting home not only more affordable but also more sustainable.

My experience with the venue is very positive. The management is reliable and always focussed on creating an environment ensuring that public nuisance, crime or disorder will not be caused by the proposed change. I personally never experienced any problems with public nuisance, disorder or crime related to VU even when events were being organised based on temporary licences.

Village Underground represent an essential part of our night time and creative industries within East London. Their reputation as an artistic platform and event space is well recognised due to their dedication to the creative arts and the Shoreditch area. The diverse nature of the premises allows for a wide variety of cultural events, exhibitions and opportunities to be supported by a professional and dedicated team. VU's partnership with Trans Europe Halles (TEH) displays it's expertise and their sustainable business practice as a cultural representative for London across Europe.

In alignment with the Licensing Act 2003, I trust that Village Underground are well equipped to continue the enforcement with the four licensing objectives. I am confident in the managements reliability and skill to ensure the Prevention of Crime and Disorder through the CCTV, venue regulations and professional ability of the entire Village Underground team. Alongside their known capability, Village Underground have proposed a total reduction in operating hours which will help to moderate the opportunity for Crime and Disorder at what could be more sensitive hours of the week.

Additionally, the proposed change ultimately reduces the risk of Public Nuisance due to the reduction in total active hours of the venue. A 4am closing time is generally more antisocial due to the lack of options for transportation and consequently less ambient noise to help reduce disturbance. The current closing time can also be attributed to larger groups leaving Village Underground at the same time, rather than as a more filtered exit process across the early morning hours. The proposed extension of 6am closing time combats these issues and goes hand in hand with the total reduction of hours across their weekly operations.

Village Underground are deeply rooted in their local area; their business structure relies on the communication and discussion between themselves, residents and stakeholders. Their attitude for engaging the local area illustrates their responsibility in operating and as a central point for the Shoreditch and the wider East London. 

I'm writing to you in support of Village Underground's application for a later license, from 4am to 6am on weekends. I attend the venue fairly regularly, and I have to say it feels like one of the most professionally run clubs in London. The crowd is good, I've never seen any trouble there, and people generally seem respectful when leaving at the end of the night.

I think finishing at 6am makes a lot more sense than 4am – there is considerably more ambient noise in the street and public transport is running, meaning people get home safer and aren't hanging around.

Through working at Free Trade, I have had the pleasure of working with the amazing staff at Village Underground, with a number of our artists playing at the venue, the majority of these artists are internationally renowned musicians coming from all corners of the world. The team at Village Underground are extremely professional and passionate about the programme of events they deliver to the local area and beyond.

I've also been a Hackney Council resident for a year, living less than 2 minutes from the venue on Curtain Road. Living in such a close proximity from the venue, I can confidently say that I have never had any issues relating to noise pollution or crime and disorder directly coming from the venue or its customers.

The requested change in licensing hours to close the venue at 6am, will help keep noise pollution down to a minimum as well as ensure that its customers can leave the venue at a time when transport links will be running more regularly. The roads surrounding the venue will generally have higher ambient noise levels at 6am than 4am, which will help ensure that those leaving the venue at 6am will be less of a noise issue. As transport links are running more frequently at 6am onwards, it also means that Village Underground customers will be spending less time in the streets/hanging around waiting for transport, which again will help keep noise pollution to a minimum. Closing the venue at 6am will also mean that those leaving the venue will not be outside in the streets whilst it's still dark outside, making it safer for those travelling home.

It has been bought to my attention that Village Underground has applied for a licence extension on Friday and Saturday nights from 4am to 6am.

As an employee of Hackney council for a period last year I was a member of the council's task force meetings that would chair fortnightly to discuss on-going issues around the Borough like anti-social behaviour, criminality, housing and police deployment.

I will keep the facts of the meetings confidential (although as I am no longer employed by the council I could easily 'run my mouth' but I won't) but I will say the extension of this licence to 6am would only be a positive for the following reasons:

- 1. At 6am there would be more police on active duty following the handover of the night shift to the early day shift.
- 2. This would then mean more control of the illegal nitrous sellers that blight the whole of the Borough (especially Kingsland road where I live) and take advantage of the current 4am closing time of Village Underground as they harass and intimidate revellers leaving the club at this hour.
- 3. The road is not heavily residential and if more residential sites were to appear around that area then 6am is a better hour as the ambient noise of the area is higher than at 4am
- 4. CCTV would be better equipped at 6am to ensure the safety of people leaving the area.

Aside from these reasons I would also like to state that I have been to Village Underground on a number of occasions over the years and found it to be impeccably run, highly professional and a credit to Shoreditch as a late night music venue.

Hackney has a reputation as a melting pot for music and nightlife. Please understand that this reputation brings money, jobs, and happiness to many residents of the borough.


