			There are thousands of us who love Hackney's vibrant and diverse scene. It's one of the reasons we choose to live here. Hackney has an incredible cultural life. As well as making the borough a better and more exciting place to live, local bars, restaurants and clubs have brought jobs, investment and new creative businesses.	
			So, I was extremely disappointed to see the proposals for a more restrictive licensing policy. 11pm closing times belong in the 1980s, not in a modern, vibrant and progressive borough like Hackney.	
			Similarly, the proposal to label new music and dance venues in Dalston as "not considered appropriate", and to say the council wants to encourage "less risky cultural activities", is hugely offensive to many of us who enjoy going to local venues. The cultural activities the council wants to encourage tend to appeal to older, more affluent people which is surprising from a council that usually has an admirable focus on equalities.	
			I know that the council has withdrawn the current consultation, which is great news. But, with a new consultation due next year, I am asking you to lobby for a change in approach from the council.	
			The council needs to understand that the majority of Hackney residents enjoy visiting local venues, and benefit from all they bring to the borough. I want the council to celebrate Hackney's position as a famous centre for live music and dance taking advantage of the 24 hour tube and our international reputation to attract more jobs, investment and culture into the borough.	
			Of course we should also tackle the side effects that affect some residents.
