2. APPLICATION

2.1 **Hasret Gumus** has made an application for a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003:

- To authorise the supply alcohol for consumption **on** the premises
- Regulated entertainment
- Late night refreshment

2.2 The application is attached as Appendix A. The applicant has amended proposed hours of operation to those described in para 1 above following agreement with Environmental Protection Team.

3. CURRENT STATUS / HISTORY

3.1 The premises have had a licence since 2006 permitting off-sales of alcohol to 02.00 hours every day. The licence has been suspended since February 2018 for non-payment of annual fee.

6. GUIDANCE CONSIDERATIONS

- 6.1 The Licensing Authority is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003.

7. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

- 7.1 Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the London Borough of Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Policy") adopted by the Licensing Authority.
- 7.2 The Policy applies to applications where relevant representations have been made. With regard to this application, policies LP3 (Operating Schedule), LP4 (Crime and Disorder), LP5 (Public Nuisance), LP6 (Protection of Children from Harm), LP8 (Public Safety) and LP14 (Special Policy Area - Dalston) are relevant.

8. OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

- 8.1 If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following conditions should be applied the licence:

Supply of Alcohol (On/Both)

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence.
 - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5.5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.

5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-

- (a) a holographic mark or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature

6. The responsible person must ensure that:

a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:

- beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
- gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- still wine in a glass: 125ml; and

b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula - $P = D + (D \times V)$

Where -

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by

that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Door Supervision

8. Each individual who is to carry out a security activity at the premises must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Conditions derived from Operating Schedule

9. The DPS, a personal licence holder or trained member of staff nominated in writing by the DPS shall be on duty at all times the premises are open to the public.
10. A CCTV system covering the interior & exterior of the premises will be installed to current metropolitan police / Home office standards and shall be kept operational at all times the premises are open to the public. It shall be capable of taking a head & shoulders shot of persons entering the premises, of recording images to an evidential standard in any light and be capable of storing images for a minimum of 31 days.
11. All staff who may work front of house shall be trained to operate the CCTV system and download images.
12. At least one member of staff trained to operate the CCTV system & download images shall be on duty at all times the premises are open to the public. Footage shall be shown to the police and screenshots provided to them on request. Copies of downloaded images shall be provided to the police on a usb stick, cd or other acceptable means as soon as possible and in any case within 24 hours of the request
13. All staff who work at the till will be trained for their role on induction and be given refresher training every six months. Written training records will be kept for each staff member and be produced to police & authorised council officers on request. Training will include identifying persons under 25, making a challenge, acceptable proof of age & checking it, making & recording a refusal, avoiding conflict & responsible alcohol retailing.
14. An incident book shall be kept at the premises, and made available to the police or authorised council officers, which will record the following:
 - a) All crimes reported,
 - b) Lost property,
 - c) All ejections of customers,
 - d) Any complaints received,
 - e) Any incidents of disorder,
 - f) Any seizure of drugs or offensive weapons,

- g) Any faults in the CCTV,
 - h) Any refusal in the sale of alcohol.
 - i) Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
15. Notices will be prominently displayed by the entry/ exit door and point of sale (as appropriate) advising customers:
- a) That CCTV & Challenge 25 are in operation;
 - b) Of the provisions of the licensing act regarding underage and proxy sales;
 - c) Of the permitted hours for licensable activities & the opening times of the premises;
 - d) To respect residents, leave quietly, not to loiter outside the premises or in the vicinity and to dispose of litter legally.
16. The front of the premises shall be kept tidy at all times and be swept at close.
17. No deliveries will be received or rubbish removed from the premises between 22.00 & 07.00.
18. Any music will only be played at background level.
19. A phone number for the premises shall be made available if required upon request to the police, any other responsible authority or any local resident to express any concerns caused by the operation of the premises. Any complaints and the outcome will be recorded in the incident book.
20. Challenge 25 shall be operated as the proof of age policy and only a valid passport, photo driving license, hm forces photographic id card or proof of age card with the pass logo or hologram on it may be accepted as proof of age.
21. All alcohol will be displayed, kept and sold from behind the counter and be dispensed by a member of staff only
22. Customers to be reminded it is a criminal offence for a person under 18 years to purchase or attempt to purchase alcohol and that it is also an offence to purchase alcohol on behalf of a person aged under 18 years.
23. Deliveries of goods shall only take place between Monday to Saturday from 08:00 to 21:00 hours and shall be carried out in such a manner as not to cause a noise nuisance to the neighbouring occupiers.
24. Recyclable glass waste shall not be handled outside the premises between 21:00 and 09:00 hours in any one day.

Conditions proposed by Responsible Authorities

25. The premises shall maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All public areas, entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV

system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer.

26. There shall be at least one staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to show Police or an authorised officer of Hackney Borough Council recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
27. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available immediately to an authorised officer of the Hackney Borough Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - a. all crimes reported to the venue
 - b. any complaints received
 - c. any incidents of disorder
 - d. any faults in the CCTV system
 - e. any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - f. any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
28. All instances of crime or disorder to be reported by the designated premises supervisor or responsible member of staff to an agreed police contact point, as agreed with the Police.
29. Where the sale or supply of alcohol is taking place employees of the premises must request sight of evidence of the age of any person appearing to be under 25 years of age (Challenge 25). Such evidence may include a driving licence or passport.
30. There shall be prominent signage requesting customers to leave the premises quietly and respect local residents.
31. All staff will be given refresher training every twelve months on the legislation relating to the sales of alcohol to underage persons and drunken persons. Written records of this training shall be kept on the premises and produced to police or other authorised officer upon request.
32. The premises shall adhere to Hackney Police Weapons and Drugs Policies and any updates thereof.
33. There shall be no glass, drinks or open containers taken outside of the premises at any time.
34. Any music played at the premises shall be played at background level allowing a face to face conversation at normal speech level.
35. After 2100hrs there shall be a maximum of ** tbc ** smokers outside the premises at any one time.

36. The front of the premises shall be kept clean and swept at the close of business each day.
37. The licence holder shall maintain a dedicated telephone number of the DPS or Duty Manager for use by any responsible authority or any person wishing to make a complaint. This number shall be provided to the licensing authority, police or local resident upon request.
38. Male and female SIA registered door supervisors shall be employed at the premises on an operational risk assessment basis. All door supervisors shall enter their full details in the premises daily register at the commencement of their work. They shall record their full name, home address and contact telephone number, their SIA registration number and the times they commence and conclude working. If the door supervisor is provided by an agency, the name, registered business address and contact telephone number will also be recorded. This register will be made available to police or other authorised officer upon request.
39. Snooker and pool cues shall remain behind the bar when not being used to play snooker or pool.

9. REASONS FOR OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

- 9.1 Conditions 9 to 22 above are derived from the applicant's operating schedule. Conditions 23 and 24 have been proposed by Environmental Protection and accepted by the applicant. The police have proposed conditions 25 to 39. There is some duplication/overlap between Police proposed conditions and those derived from the operating schedule.

10. LEGAL COMMENTS

- 10.1 The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance
 - The Protection of Children from Harm
- 10.2 It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

11. HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998 IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 There are implications to;
- **Article 6** – Right to a fair hearing
 - **Article 14** – Not to discriminate

- Balancing: **Article 1**- Peaceful enjoyment of their possession (i.e. a licence is defined as being a possession) with **Article 8** – Right of Privacy (i.e. respect private & family life) to achieve a proportionate decision having regard to the protection of an individual's rights against the interests of the community at large.

12. MEMBERS DECISION MAKING

- B. **Option 2**
That the application be approved, together with any conditions or restrictions which Members consider necessary for the promotion of the Licensing objectives.

13. CONCLUSION

OPERATIONAL MANAGEMENT PLAN

April 2018

1.0 Introduction

1.1 This Operational Management Statement relates to Famous traditional Turkish cafe associated facilities at 158 Stoke Newington Road.

1.2 This Statement sets out the guiding principles for the operation of the Famous and associated facilities. The purpose of this Statement is to highlight the key principles that will be adopted in respect of the facilities to ensure effective management and that the amenity of the local area is appropriately protected.

2.0 Mrs Hasret Gumus will directly manage the premise which will ensure a comprehensive and holistic approach towards ensuring the premise operates in considerate manner and becomes a positive addition to the local area.

3.0 Layout

3.1 The layout of the proposed premise has been designed to minimize the potential impact on the amenity of the area. As part of the design process careful consideration has been given to positioning and form of the entrance, the service access.

3.2 The premise comprising ground level and basement.

Ground Floor:

3.3 We have seating area and 2 snooker tables as shown on the plans provided.

Lower Ground Floor:

3.4 The lower ground level contains a space for 2 or 3 snooker tables only together with toilets and stock room.

4.0 Access and Arrivals / Departures

4.1 All access into and out of the premise will be carefully controlled and monitored from the serving area at the entrance. CCTV will be in operation at all times.

5.0 Deliveries

5.1 Generally: deliveries will come by foot or cycle messenger, car, van. Deliveries will be no earlier than

08.00am and will occur throughout the business day until approx 6.00pm and thereafter occasional deliveries not later than 20.00pm.

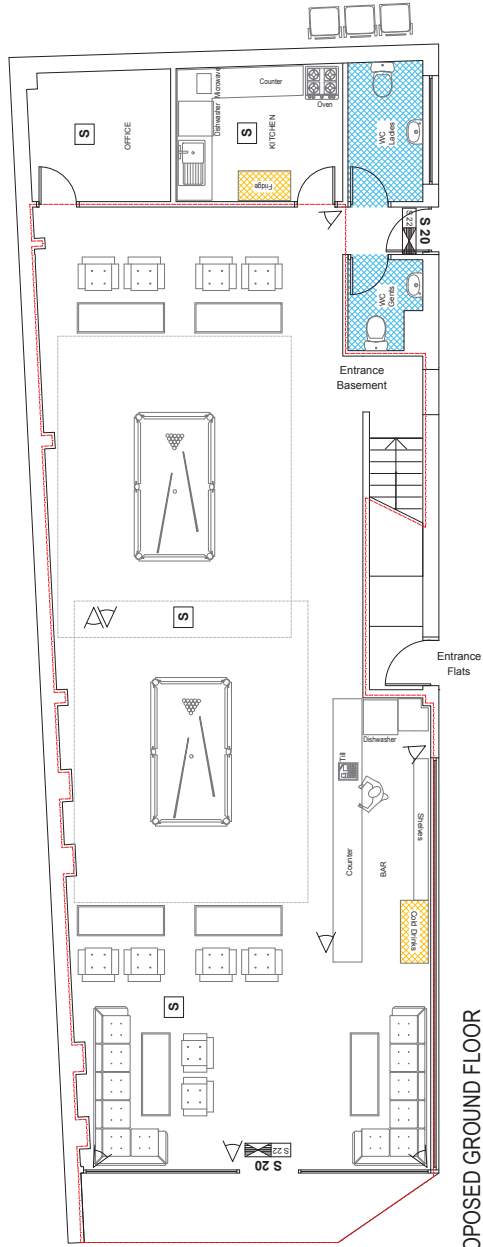
- 5.2 Food Deliveries: Approximately 5 No. morning deliveries per day e.g., vegetables and dry goods.
- 5.3 Beverages: I expect only one delivery per week, e.g., beer, wine, spirits.
- 5.4 All servicing will take place via the service bay on side road.
- 5.5 The management will ensure that systems are in place to monitor delivery schedules to anticipate deliveries in advance. These measures will reduce the time taken for deliveries to be made.
- 5.6 A large refuse store is located at the side of the premise.
- 5.7 Refuse and recyclable waste will be stored in a designated area of the refuse store until it is due to be collected. Immediately prior to timed collections, refuse will be taken from the basement to ground floor level via the service lift where it will be placed in the service bay ready for collection. Bins will be brought back inside the restaurant building immediately after collection.
- 5.8 Bottles and glass waste will be recycled within the basement and binned for collection as above.

6.0 **Hours of Operation**

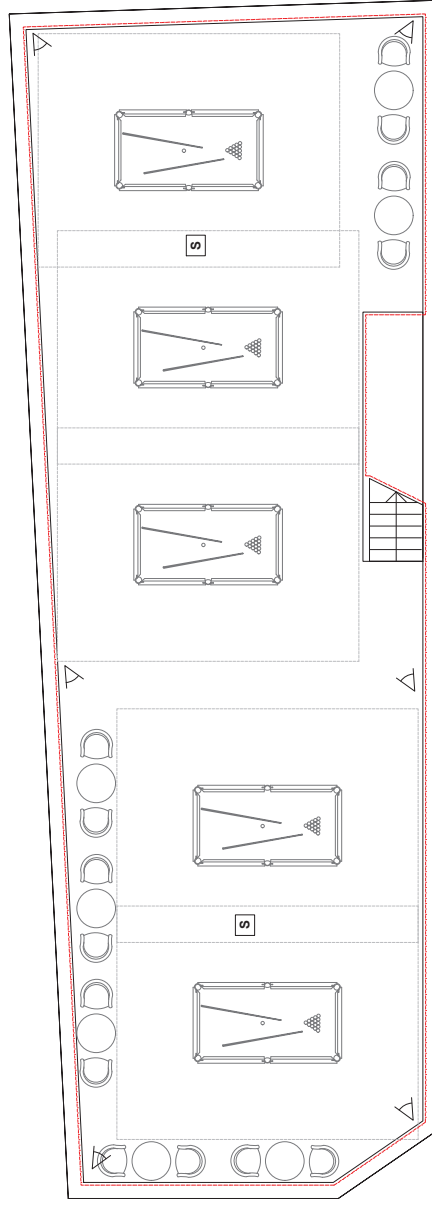

As Director of Public Health (a responsible authority under the Licensing Act 2004), I wish to make a representation against the premises licence application for **Famous, 158 Stoke Newington Rd Hackney, London N16 7UY**

The City and Hackney Public Health function recognises the role that licensed premises play in contributing to the local economy, but the dense availability of alcohol has a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of many of the borough's residents.

Tackling alcohol misuse is key to achieving the aspirations of Hackney's Health and Wellbeing Strategy. We want to establish an environment that recognises the role of alcohol in our society, whilst minimising the significant health damage caused by alcohol misuse. Licensing is an important component in the wider efforts to reduce this harm.


This representation is made under the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective(s).

The application is for a venue within the Dalston Special Policy Area (SPA). As laid out in the Council's Licensing Policy, and under LP13, where a relevant representation is made to any application within the area of the Dalston SPA, the application will be refused unless there are exceptional circumstances. I do not believe that this application shows any exceptional circumstances.

Dalston has been defined as a cumulative impact area. There is increasing recognition of the impact that high density availability has¹, which could lead to an increase in public nuisance, crime and disorder and impact adversely on health of both those consuming the alcohol but also of others who come into contact with them.

The area already has sufficient premises to meet demand and additional outlets supplying alcohol will be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and

disturbance, anti-social behaviour and crime. This includes extra hours of alcohol provision to existing premises.

The area within which this premise is located has high incidences of crime and violence, including those that are alcohol related. The information below is drawn from SafeStats, a service within the Greater London Authority that hosts data from emergency services and other agencies, covering the period year to December 2017. This data shows that, within a 500m radius of the premises:

- There were **123** alcohol related incidents
- **26** alcohol related incidents involved those aged under 26 years
- **103** assaults were recorded by the London Ambulance Service

According to the council's Licensing database of premises allowed to sell alcohol, there are **49 on licence premises** and **31 off licence premises** within 500m of the application venue, with a further **8 having a licence for on and off sales**.

The applicant has not proposed suitable measures which would promote the licensing objectives, nor mitigate against negative impact. Based on the information provided and that the application does not provide by exceptional circumstances in accordance to LP13, **the Public Health function recommends that this application be refused.**

I don't think this application is a good idea. There already is a snooker café at the end of Foulden Road and it's a residential street with lots of young families and plenty of elderly.

I can't see that granting a club hours (2am weekends and midnight weekdays) alcohol licence in such a residential setting makes much sense.

Efes pool hall in Dalston was at the centre of plenty of fairly serious crime .Not saying the same would happen at Famous but means the decision makers have to think really hard. Efes had a much safer location, more public on the main road in Dalston.

I spent much of my youth in pool cafes so I feel funny about challenging an application for one but there was no alcohol served in the cafes I grew up in and they were on the main road Green Lanes in Harringay, not hanging off the end of a residential road where the only business in memory has been a corner shop.

For us to use a corner shop now means crossing the wild main road A10 but of course I appreciate you cannot dictate what type of application is made.

Another issue is who is making the application. I have always found the people in the shop ok but have had my card swiped in there, been defrauded and been shortchanged. Others have too. There was a drive by shooting there a few years back and plenty more no doubt that I haven't personally experienced or heard about.

We are writing to you as very concerned and worried residents from Foulden Road N16 [REDACTED] and Foulden Road N16 [REDACTED]

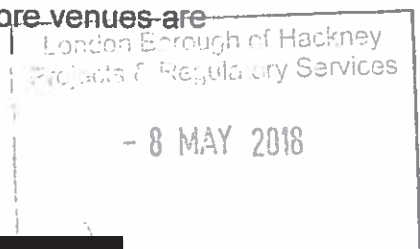
The above application would, if allowed, mean that alcohol would be consumed on the above premises up to 2.00 am every Friday and Saturday and up to midnight Sunday Thursday (assume this is Sunday to Thursday). The application also asks for a licence for indoor sporting events at the same times and provision of late night refreshment up to the same times.

Foulden Road is a residential road which has suffered for years from anti-social behaviour as a result of some local venues opening late and serving alcohol. We have opposed any new licensing applications in recent years, with success and with the help of one of our councillors at the time.

Late night opening and the serving of alcohol lead inevitably to the public gathering at the venue and outside it and additional noise when they leave the premises; shouting in the street and car doors slamming as people leave, more litter and even unmentionable acts in residents front gardens. Many families live on the road and it would not feel safe for teenagers and young people returning home in the evening, walking past groups of intoxicated people, past problems such as these have left residents feeling unsafe and sometimes threatened in their own community.

Residents are extremely concerned that the local police are already stretched coping with the existing bars and clubs opening late in the area and the resulting anti-social behaviour. We know that residents in Dalston and Shoreditch suffer hugely from the number of late night bars and clubs; we are determined that no more venues are given such licenses on Stoke Newington Road.
