6. GUIDANCE CONSIDERATIONS

6.1 The Licensing Authority is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003.

7. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

- 7.1 Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the London Borough of Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Policy") adopted by the Licensing Authority.
- 7.2 The Policy applies to applications where relevant representations have been made. With regard to this application, policies, LP1 (General Principles), LP2 (Licensing Objectives), LP4 ('Off' Sales of Alcohol) and LP11(Cumulative Impact – General) are relevant.

8. OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

8.1 If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following conditions should be applied the licence:

Supply Of Alcohol (On/Both)

1.No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:

(a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence.

(b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available. 5. 5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.

5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years if age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-

A. a holographic mark or

B. an ultraviolet feature.

6. The responsible person shall ensure that:

a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:

- beer or cider:1/2 pint;
- gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- still wine in a glass: 125ml; and

a. these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

b. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(i) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula - P = D+(DxV)Where -P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(b) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and (d) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Door Supervision

8. Each individual who is to carry out a security activity at the premises must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Conditions derived from operating schedule

9. The venue will adhere to and promote the robust measures the council has set out inthe Statement of Licensing Policy 2018-2023.

10. The responsible person will ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises age verification will be in place to ensure supply of alcohol is in accordance to ageverification policy

11. Free potable water will be available at all times to customers.

12.All online sales of alcohol will be subject to real time age verification checks.

13. Adequate and appropriate First Aid equipment and materials will be available on thepremises.

14. At least one suitable trained First Aider will be on duty when the public are present.

15. The premises will have fire fighting equipment installed and maintained as well as firedetection alarm installed.

16.Doors and windows will be kept closed when regulated entertainment is taking placeafter 22:00. Outdoor seating will be rendered unusable after 22:00.

17. The playing of live or recorded music in garden or outside seating areas of the premises is not permitted.

18.Staff will undertake a litter pick to a distance of 2 metres around the

premises daily.

19. The hours of the day during which age restrictions apply are between 2000 hrs and 0000 hrs.

Conditions derived from Responsible Authority representations

20. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period. The CCTV system should be updated and maintained according to police recommendations.

21. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a Police or authorized council officer recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.

22. Signs will be prominently displayed at all entrance and exit points reminding customers to leave quietly and respect local residents.

23.An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the council or the police, which will record the following.

- a) All crimes reported:
- b) All ejections of patrons
- c) Any complaints received.
- d) Any incidents of disorder.
- e) Seizure of drugs or offensive weapons.
- f) Any faults in the CCTV system.
- g) Any refusal of the sale of alcohol.
- h) Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

24. All instances of crime and disorder witnessed or reported to staff to be reported by the Designated Premises Supervisor or responsible member of staff to police.

25.All staff shall receive training on the legislation relating to the sales of alcohol to underage persons and drunken persons and shall have refresher training every 12 months. There shall be written records of such training which will be kept on the premises and produced to a police officer or other authorised officer upon request.

26. The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises shall only be to a person seated customers only. There shall be no vertical drinking.

27. All off sales of alcohol shall be in sealed containers for consumption away from the premises

28. There shall be no Alcohol sold or consumed in the rear courtyard at any time

29. After 2200 hours there shall be a maximum of 2 smokers at the front of the premises

30. The premises shall at all times operate a Challenge 25 policy to prevent any customers who attempt to purchase alcohol and who appear to the staff member to be under the age of 25 years without having first provided identification. Only a valid British driver's licence showing a photograph of the person, a valid passport or proof of age card showing the 'Pass' hologram are to be accepted as identification. Military ID Cards can also be accepted. Notices and/or posters advertising the Challenge 25 policy shall be placed in prominent positions at the premises.

31. The use of the garden at the rear of the premises shall cease at 2200 hours

32. SIA door supervisors shall be employed on an operational risk assessment basis whenever licensable activity is taking place. All door supervisors shall enter their full details in the premises daily register at the commencement of their work. They shall record their full name, home address and contact telephone number, their SIA registration number and the times they commence and conclude working. If the door supervisor is provided by an agency, the name, registered business address and contact telephone number will also be recorded. This register will be made available to police or other authorised officer upon request.

33. The premises shall have a written Dispersal policy that ensures all patrons exiting the venue are encouraged to leave the area. This policy shall be made available to police or responsible authority on request.

34. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking shall be available throughout the permitted hours in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.

35. There shall no glass, drinks or open containers taken out the front of the premises at any time.

36. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff are fully trained and made aware of the legal requirement of businesses to comply with their responsibility as regards the disposal of waste produced from the business premises. The procedure for handling and preparing for disposal of the waste shall be in writing and displayed in a prominent place where it can be referred to at all times by staff.

37.The Licensee shall ensure that any contract for general and recyclable waste disposal shall be appropriate in size to the amount of waste produced by the business. The Licensee shall maintain an adequate supply of waste receptacles provided by his registered waste carrier (refuse sacks or commercial waste bins) in order to ensure all refuse emanating from the business is always presented for collection by his waste carrier and shall not use any plain black or unidentifiable refuse sacks or any other unidentifiable or unmarked waste receptacles.

38. The Licensee's premises are situated in an area within which refuse may only be left on the public highway at certain times (time bands). If the Licensee's waste carrier cannot or does not comply by collecting the refuse within an hour after the close of any time band imposed by the waste authority, the Licensee must remove the refuse from the public highway and/or keep it within the premises until such time as his/her waste carrier arrives to collect the refuse. 39.The Licensee shall instruct members of staff to make regular checks of the area immediately outside the premises and remove any litter, bottles and glasses emanating from the premises. A final check should be made at close of business.

40.The Licensee shall provide a safe receptacle for cigarette ends to be placed outside for the use of customers, such receptacle being carefully placed so as not to cause an obstruction or trip.

41.The current trade waste agreement/duty of care waste transfer document shall be conspicuously displayed and maintained in the window of the premises where it can be conveniently seen and read by persons standing in 434-434 Kingsland Road. This should remain unobstructed at all times and should clearly identify:-

- the name of the registered waste carrier
- the date of commencement of trade waste contract
- the date of expiry of trade waste contract
- the days and times of collection
- the type of waste including the European Waste Code.

9. REASONS FOR OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

9.1 Conditions 9 to 19 are derived from applicants operating schedule. The conditions 20 to 35 proposed by the Police and conditions 36 to 41 by Environmental Enforcement. The applicant has agreed to all the proposed conditions.

10. LEGAL COMMENTS

- 10.1 The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
 - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance
 - The Protection of Children from Harm
- 10.2 It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

11. HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998 IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 There are implications to;
 - *Article 6* Right to a fair hearing
 - Article 14 Not to discriminate
 - Balancing: Article 1- Peaceful enjoyment of their possession (i.e. a licence is defined as being a possession) with Article 8 – Right of Privacy (i.e. respect private & family life) to achieve a proportionate decision having regard to the protection of an individuals rights against the interests of the community at large.

12. MEMBERS DECISION MAKING

- A. Option 1 That the application be refused
- B. Option 2 That the application be approved, together with any conditions or restrictions which Members consider necessary for the promotion of the Licensing objectives.

13. CONCLUSION

13.1 That Members decide on the application under the Licensing Act 2003.



Dear local resident,

Thank you for sharing your concerns with the Hackney council and myself with regard to the council granting a premises licence to the premises located at 155 Stoke Newington High Street.

First of all, Atlas Grinds is a community-based coffee bar which puts great emphasis on being involved with local community, promoting the 4 licencing objectives and creating a safe space for LGBTQIA+ members of our society. We care deeply for the environment, which reflects in our menu which is predominantly vegan & gluten free. We care for families as we create a safe space for people to meet up while we also offer baby changing facilities that is becoming ever so rare. In addition to that, we pledge to sponsor Kynaston Gardens to create a maintained space and give back to the community. We wish to bring life back to the high street after lockdown which is in line with initiatives launched by many councils and also the government.

Our evening offering is a selection of fine natural wines & selection of cocktails to go alongside tapas-style small plates. We also wish to serve coffee until late as many people who choose to work from coffee shops are met with early closure. We promote evening coffee drinking culture and we wish for people to be able to work from our venue in the evenings the same way they would during the day. Our focus is on quality, not quantity, and despite few other venues in the area serving alcohol, there's no space like Atlas Grinds. The idea came from working in hospitality for 15 years, working on operations of busy fine dining restaurants as well as late night entertainment venues. I have gained great understanding and appreciation for regulated entertainment working with many local councils in ensuring that all licencing objectives are respected, and concerns are heard.

In response to concerns raised in the representations, please see below how I aim to adhere to the licencing objectives.

1. Prevention of crime & disorder

First and foremost, the staff are trained to explicitly restrict sale of alcohol to any patrons who are intoxicated. If an intoxicated patron attempts to buy alcohol, they will be offered an alternative soft drink or coffee. Sale of alcohol will cease 30 minutes before closing, search and dispersal policies are also in place. Smoking is prohibited at the front of our venue; our garden area will be a designated smoking area with a strict limit of persons in the area. The smoking area will be closed from 10pm onwards every day.

2. Prevention of public nuisance

We respect the night time quiet period between 11pm and 7am and we have adhered to core hours of trading as lined out in the Hackney council's Licensing Policy. To tackle any potential nuisance we have therefore designed our operating procedures with this in mind, where after 10pm we lower the music to initiate "soft closure" and dispersal policy will be enacted. As mentioned previously, smoking is prohibited at the front of the premises and will be only allowed in the back garden, which will be closed from 10pm each night. No alcohol consumption is allowed in the outdoor area and no music is played in there either. All doors and windows will be also shut from 10pm onwards to prevent any noise emanating from the premises. We provide facilities for our patrons and they will be reminded public urination is an offense. Copy of both dispersal policy and search policy is attached for your perusal.

3. Protection of children from harm

We restrict access of under 18s from 8pm onwards. As mentioned above, the garden area, windows & doors are closed from 10pm onwards to ensure we respect the night time quiet period.

The staff will be trained on Challenge 25 policy, during special events all customers will be subjected to an ID check when entering the premises.

4. Promotion of public safety

Our search policy is designed to prevent any harm to our patrons as well as local residents. Our dispersal policy has been designed to ensure a safe dispersal of patrons is carried out to promote public safety. Staff are trained to carry out regular checks outside our premises to not only collect any potentially harmful objects (glasses, waste) but also to advise any people loitering in the area to disperse. We are committed to joining the local pub watch community, which will enable us to promote public safety as a group.

As mentioned above, we do not permit smoking outside the premises, we also do not permit any patrons to drink anywhere outside or close proximity of the venue.

Atlas Grinds is dedicated in bringing quality produce to Stoke Newington and host our patrons in a safe and regulated environment. Our endeavours lie in bringing life back to the high street, not to line our pockets.

In addition to the points above, we have also agreed to conditions to be annexed to the licence as suggested by the Environmental Health officers which are designed to tackle litter outside of the property.

We have also agreed with the Met Police that the off-sales of alcohol will cease at 11pm every night. Met Police is also content with our dispersal policy as well as our search policy, which will be annexed to our premises licence and we have accepted their conditions to our licence.

DISPERSAL POLICY

Atlas Grinds is operated by an experienced team from late night entertainment venues and we are aware of the importance of ensuring as far as possible that customers leave as quietly as possible.

Atlas Grinds is also aware that the high street location makes safe departure and dispersal of customers of greater importance.

It is our intention to operate in a manner which causes the minimum impact from noise nuisance and anti-social behaviour from our customers to neighbours and other members of the public.

To this end all relevant staff will be trained in this policy and other appropriate skills to achieve an orderly and safe dispersal from the premises.

All staff are compelled by their contract of employment to comply with and actively implement this dispersal policy, where their job role includes these responsibilities. It is the responsibility of the DPS to ensure that this policy is enforced at the premises and to regularly update the policy to meet the requirements of the business.

DISPERSAL

Dispersal shall take place through front door of the premises onto Stoke Newington High Street.

New patrons will be not allowed to enter the premises 45 minutes prior to closing time onwards in order to minimise the number of people in the premises during closing. Patrons will not be allowed to purchase any further alcoholic drinks 30 minutes prior to closing. At this time, the duty manager will initiate "soft closure".

- 1. The music will be turned down
- 2. Lights will be turned up

This is designed to encourage a more even dispersal rather than everyone being asked to leave at the same time. This in turn seeks to minimise the potential for noise and anti-social behaviour which can occur when larger numbers of people leave the venue at the same time.

Staff will be reminding patrons to leave quietly and to prevent patrons from reentering the premises.

SIGNAGE & LIGHTING

The following signs will be displayed at the premises:

- 1. Signs requesting patrons to leave quietly and respect the neighbours
- 2. Signs to inform patrons that drinks may not leave the premises at any time
- 3. Smoking is not allowed in front of the premises

Internal lighting – the premises will turn up the house lights 30 minutes prior to closing time.

External lighting – this should be sufficient for patrons to leave the premises safely, but not to disturb neighbours. The lighting will be reviewed regularly to ensure it is not a cause of nuisance to neighbours.

Both internal and external lighting will be also regularly reviewed to ensure it does not impede with CCTV.

SMOKING AREAS

The premises operate a controlled smoking area at the back of the venue in the garden area. The maximum amount of people is not to exceed 15 patrons at any time.

The outside garden area will be closed from 10pm every night.

BOTTLES, GLASSES & LITTER

The premises will maintain the area immediately to the front of the premises clear of bottles, glasses and litter by regularly sending a member of staff to the area to clear these items.

No glasses or open bottles are permitted to leave the premises.

It may be the case that glass bottles and glasses are left outside our premises from other premises. Despite these items not originating from the premises, it is the responsibility of staff to clear them on a regular basis throughout our opening hours and at the end of the night.

CONTROLLING CUSTOMERS & PREVENT LOITERING

Staff will encourage our patrons to disperse away from the premises and leave as quickly and quietly as possible. If a group of customers are found to be loitering near the building, they will be politely asked to move on as quickly as possible.

SEARCH POLICY

In order to prevent drugs or weapon being brought onto the premises, it will be a condition of entry to special events that customers acknowledge the Company's right to conduct searches prior to entry.

Searches will be undertaken in a polite & respectful manner by trained full-time members of staff. We will make all endeavours to attempt for a same sex member of staff as the customer to carry out this search.

Where this is refused, the customer will be denied entry to the venue. Further to this, searches will be conducted in a well-lit area, in view of CCTV. The customer should be informed that they are being searched as a part of our random search policy.

Searches should also be conducted where there is a reasonable belief that the customer has been using drugs, or may be in possession of drugs or other illegal or offensive items. The customer has the right to refuse a search, whereupon they should be advised that they will not be allowed onto the premises.

When searching, the customer should be asked if they have anything in their possession that they wish to hand over prior to search.



We the undersigned are leaseholders and renters of flats either directly above or very near the premises referred to in the application.

We object to the application on the following grounds:

1. The area is already well served by pubs and bars. Amongst many others, there is an existing bar at 129 and the pub the Rochester Castle just a few doors away. Before lockdown the evening pavements were regularly blocked with stationary people causing noise late at night. It was sometimes difficult to get past without walking into the road. The pavement at 155 is also narrower (210cm) than it is elsewhere, liable to cause further problems. Occasionally there have been violent disturbances serious enough to require police intervention. It is not at all unusual to

- 3. Smoking associated with a licensed premises will impact on the access doorway to the residential flats creating cigarette litter, and making entering or leaving the residential flats a potentially intimidating process where the pavement is quite narrow.
- 4. The rear courtyard is surely intended to be used as a smoking area as it was by the preceding café business- the licensing plan does show tables even though the area has not been included in the application. It is extremely close to several residential bedrooms. The high walls will act as a sound reflector, causing really significant noise pollution at very unsociable hourspotentially the lengthy 7am to midnight hours sought in the application. The staircase to would be exposed to any intoxicated person who takes it into their head to trespass.
- 5. In 30 odd years the unit below has never been licensed and only became a café in the last few years. We are the tenants of **Stoke** Newington High Street, N16 We have recently become aware of a license application for the premises **Stoke Newington** High Street, for supply of alcohol and late night refreshment under the name of ATLAS GRINDS LTD (see attached image of the application notice).

As an interested party (people living in the vicinity of the premises) we are objecting on the grounds that should the proposal go through it will strongly affect our quality of life and living peacefully at the property (our home).

Our flat is a single floor **premises** premises in question and as a Victorian building with thin floors, crowds drinking late into the night will undoubtedly be disruptive both during the day (when one of us works from home) and our ability to have a peaceful nights sleep. This is important for us both, but particularly so for one of us who is a teacher in a local secondary school, with early starts.

As renters we chose this property due to its courtyard space which the premises in question is part of. We are greatly concerned about this disruption to our living environment, as well as that of neighbour, who is an who has a second that also not this area.

Having lived in the property for over a year now we have also observed the dangers of the heavily trafficked road which we have witnessed road accidents on, one of which caused a car to go up onto the curb and knock over a street sign. We are concerned about lingering on the pavement that may be dangerous given the narrow pavement and multi-lane road, particularly when alcohol has been consumed.

On a similar note, this is a high crime area with a high level of petty crime (stealing of bikes – which we have both witnessed and been victims of) and issues of begging and visible drug addiction etc. we are nervous of an increased amount of lingering outside both our and our neighbour's front door.

- Every pub and bar has customers smoking outside on the street. This means smoking in the doorway to the residential flats, generating cigarette litter. The pavement here is also very narrow which will cause adiitional nuisance for residents entering and/or exiting. Needing to ask drinkers to move out the way just to get in or out is intimidating and a risk to personal safety. (Prevention of Public Nuisance, Public Safety).
- The rear courtyard likely to become the designated smoking area is adjacent numerous residential bedrooms. Again this will cause

significant noise pollution at very unsociable hours. (Prevention of Public Nulsance).

- Patrons of the existing pubs regularly urinate in Slindon Court and another bar immediately adjacent this pedestrian alley will exacerbate an already significant problem. (Prevention of Public Nuisance).
- Local residents include children at the second and the second seco
- The proposed licence will have a serious negative financial impact on the leaseholders of The properties will be more difficult to rent, sell or remortgage. Lenders generally do not accept mortgages for flats above fast-food outlets, restaurants and licenced premises. (Prevention of Public Nuisance).
