### 7. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

### 8. OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

- 8.1 If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following condition should be removed from the licence:
  - 17. Any alcohol served after 2000hours shall be ancillary to a prescribed event and to ticket holders only.
- 8.2 If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, condition 12 on the current licence to amended to read:
  - 12. From 2100 to 2200 there shall be no consumption of alcohol at the front of the premises past 2100hours.

### 9. REASONS FOR OFFICER OBSERVATIONS

9.1 Above amended/removed conditions have been proposed by applicant.

### 10. LEGAL COMMENTS

- 10.1 The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
  - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
  - Public Safety
  - Prevention of Public Nuisance
  - The Protection of Children from Harm
- 10.2 It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

### 11. HUMAN RIGHTS ACT 1998 IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 There are implications to;
  - Article 6 Right to a fair hearing
  - Article 14 Not to discriminate

Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling







Police submit the following representations for the application to vary the premises licence at Rapid Eye Photobook Café, 4 Leonard Circus.

The applicant is seeking to vary the licence by way of extending the hours for the supply of alcohol until 2359 hours on Fridays and Saturday and until 2230hours on Sunday they are also seeking the addition of off sales 1100-2300 hours Monday –Saturday and 2230 hours on Sunday.

In addition to this the applicant is seeking the removal of condition 18 which limits the sale of alcohol to anyone after 2000 hours unless the sale of such alcohol is ancillary to a prescribed event and to tickets holder of such an event. This condition was put in place when the original licence was granted and after discussions with the applicant in order to minimise any disruption to local residents as well as prevent the venue operating as a bar whilst simultaneously allow for events to take place at the venue as per the applicant's business model.

Since the granting of the licence Police have had cause to speak with the licensee due to complaints received from local residents that named the venue as a contributor to ASB and outside drinking. The concern of residents is particularly drawn to outdoor drinking within the area. The developing night-time economy in Leonard circus has seen an increase in Anti-social behaviour as well as disruption to local residents which some have said has made them feel unsafe.

Police have personally visited the area and have seen paraphernalia reminiscent of the previous evening's activities with empty bottles and nitrous oxide canisters left littered around the circus.

There area is home to numerous pieces of street furniture providing seating for members of the public. It is the belief of Police that this furniture provides the perfect setting lending itself to members of the public purchasing drinks to sit in the vicinity of the square. Something we believe will increase as the weathers begins to get warmer and the current restrictions are lifted in linked with the government's current roadmap.

Police are concerned that the removal of condition 18 from the licence would grant this venue a licence to operate as a bar in an area where we have already received complaints regarding an increase in anti-social behaviour. In addition to this police are concerned that without the correct provisions in place the addition of off sales will see the consumption of alcohol in and around Leonard circus leading to further disruption to the residents. And these are all factors that should be taken in to account when considering whether to grant this variation.

Due to the above police believe that the granting of this variation will undermine the licensing objectives namely crime and disorder, public safety

# Supply of Alcohol

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:

  - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
  - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

- 5. 5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.
  - 5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
  - 5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years if age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
    - A. a holographic mark or
    - B. an ultraviolet feature.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that:
  - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
  - beer or cider:1/2 pint;
  - gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
  - still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
    - a. these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
    - b. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

#### Minimum Drinks Pricing

- 7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
  - 7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -
  - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
  - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D+(DxV) Where -
  - (i)P is the permitted price,
  - (ii)D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
  - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
  - (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
  - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
  - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 8. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All public areas and each entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer.
- 9. There shall be a staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a Police or authorised council officer recent data or footage when requested.
- 10. Signs will be prominently displayed at all entrance and exit points reminding customers to leave quietly and respect local residents.
- 11. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as driving licence or passport.
- 12. There shall be no consumption of alcohol at the front of the premises past 2100hours.
- 13. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the council or the police, which will record the following.
  - a. All crimes reported:
  - b. All ejections of patrons
  - c. Any complaints received.
  - d. Any incidents of disorder.
  - e. Seizure of drugs or offensive weapons.
  - f. Any faults in the CCTV system.
  - g. Any refusal of the sale of alcohol.
  - h. Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 14. Premises to operate zero tolerance policy to drugs and comply with Hackney Police Drugs and Weapons policy where appropriate.following:
  - a. all crimes reported to the venue;
  - b. all ejections of patrons;
  - c. any complaints received concerning crime and disorder;
  - d. any incidents of disorder;
  - e. all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons;
  - f. any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment;
  - g. any refusal of the sale of alcohol; and
  - h. any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

- 15. All instances of crime and disorder witnessed or brought to the attention of staff shall to be reported by the Designated Premises Supervisor or responsible member of staff to Police.
- 16. All staff shall receive training on the legislation relating to the sales of alcohol to underage persons and drunken persons and shall have refresher training every 12 months. There shall be written records of such training which will be kept on the premises and produced to a police officer or other authorised officer upon request.
- 17. Any alcohol served after 2000hours shall be ancillary to a prescribed event and to ticket holders only.
- 18. Food and potable water shall be made available at the premises whenever alcohol is being sold.
- 19. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff are fully trained and made aware of the legal requirement of businesses to comply with their responsibility as regards the disposal of waste produced from the business premises. The procedure for handling and preparing for disposal of the waste shall be in writing and displayed in a prominent place where it can be referred to at all times by staff.
- 20. The Licensee shall ensure that any contract for general and recyclable waste disposal shall be appropriate in size to the amount of waste produced by the business. The Licensee shall maintain an adequate supply of waste receptacles provided by his registered waste carrier (refuse sacks or commercial waste bins) in order to ensure all refuse emanating from the business is always presented for collection by his waste carrier and shall not use any plain black or unidentifiable refuse sacks or any other unidentifiable or unmarked waste receptacles.
- 21. In order to minimise the amount of time any waste remains on the public highway in readiness for collection, the Licensee will ensure the timeframe within which it may expect its waste carrier to collect is adhered to.
- 22. The Licensee shall instruct members of staff to make regular checks of the area immediately outside the premises and remove any litter, bottles and glasses emanating from the premises. A final check should be made at close of business.
- 23. The Licensee shall provide a safe receptacle for cigarette ends to be placed outside for the use of customers, such receptacle being carefully placed so as not to cause an obstruction or trip.
- 24. The current trade waste agreement/duty of care waste transfer document shall be conspicuously displayed and maintained in the window of the premises where it can be conveniently seen and read by persons standing in Rapid Eye Photobook Cafe. This should remain unobstructed at all times and should clearly identify:-
  - the name of the registered waste carrier
  - the date of commencement of trade waste contract
  - the date of expiry of trade waste contract
  - the days and times of collection
  - the type of waste including the European Waste Code

- 25. The total capacity of the premises (including staff and patrons) shall be limited to no more than 100 patrons, at any one time.
- 26. The maximum number of persons allowed to use the designated smoking areas at each end of the outside drinking area (on the right and left side) of the premises at any one time is restricted to 4 people.
- 27. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking, requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 28. Staff shall monitor customers smoking outside the premises on a regular basis and ensure patrons do not cause a public nuisance.
