1. BACKGROUND

- **1.1** Each Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) has a statutory duty to produce a Health and Wellbeing Strategy (HWS), setting out its priorities to address the health and wellbeing needs of local residents, as captured in the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA). The HWB also has a statutory duty to involve third parties in preparation of the HWS, including the local Healthwatch and people living or working in the area¹. The strategy will set out the health and wellbeing priorities for Hackney over the next four years and provide an opportunity to make a real impact on tackling and improving health inequalities experienced by Hackney residents.
- **1.2** At the July 2020 Health and Wellbeing Board meeting, the Board agreed to:
 - Use the opportunity of the Health and Wellbeing Strategy refresh to co-create a new strategic (population health) framework for tackling health inequalities through coordinated system-wide action, led by the Board.
 - Adopt a fully co-produced approach to developing the strategy, building on existing assets and resident engagement/involvement mechanisms.
 - Establish a working group to oversee the development of the new Health and Wellbeing Strategy - and advise on the membership of this group.
- **1.3** Since the July HWB meeting, a new City & Hackney Health Inequalities Steering Group has been established to provide a focal point for the extensive work underway to tackle the long-standing health inequalities that have been exposed and exacerbated by COVID-19. The steering group will strive to ensure that our collective efforts have maximum impact and that we

make best use of our combined resources, through collaboration and partnership.

The role and purpose of the steering group will be to advise, prioritise, authorise, coordinate and mobilise local action as part of a system-wide health inequalities plan for the City and Hackney. The steering group is chaired by Dr Sandra Husbands, director of public health, and membership includes strategic system leaders who have the influence and resources to embed local action to tackle health inequalities in wider strategies and practice.

The work of the steering group will be guided by the same population health framework recently adopted by Hackney Health Wellbeing Board and the City & Hackney Integrated Care Board (ICB)². It is intended that the steering group will report into and support both the Health and Wellbeing Board and the ICB. It will provide expert advice and input to the development of a new Health and Wellbeing strategy for Hackney, as well as a population health delivery plan for City and Hackney's integrated care system, which would include a review and refresh of integrated commissioning transformation plans using a population health framework to address health inequalities.

1.4 Proposed membership of HWS development working group

A working group will be established to shape the new strategy's development and ensure that action plans are developed for each priority area.

The proposed membership outlined below includes representatives from City and Hackney Public Health team, LBH Communications, and representatives leading on work that focuses on one or more of the four pillars of the local population health system. The group will be chaired by the lead member for health, adult social care and leisure.

City & Hackney Health Inequalities Steering Group will develop short and longer term local action plans to tackle wider health inequalities - the output of this work will inform the development of Hackney's Health and Wellbeing Strategy. The City & Hackney Health Inequalities Steering Group will work in partnership with the HWS development working group, but will not provide

strategic or operational oversight of this group. The HWS development working group will be accountable to the Health and Wellbeing Board.

1.5 Approach

The strategy, priorities and actions will be developed using a model of co-production, as agreed by the Board in July. Co-production is a way of working that involves residents and communities in equal partnership; and which engages groups of people at the earliest stages of design, development and evaluation³. Co-production acknowledges that people with 'lived experience' are often best placed to advise on what support and services will make a positive difference to their lives. Using a well defined co-production approach will ensure that a person-centred perspective is maintained throughout the development and implementation of the strategy.

The working group will work within the principles of the <u>City and Hackney</u> <u>Co-production Charter</u> to co-design the engagement framework, co-deliver resident and stakeholder engagement activity, and collaborate in developing the new strategic priorities.

1.6 Defining draft priorities

The HWS development working group will analyse the local, regional and national data on health inequalities, as well as evidence on effective interventions for reducing inequalities through local action (in collaboration with City & Hackney Health Inequalities Steering Group). The working group will also review existing community and resident engagement material in relation to health inequalities in Hackney, including insight gathered throughout the current pandemic.

As outlined in 1.3, the City and Hackney Health Inequalities group will provide expert advice and input to the development of a new Health and Wellbeing strategy for Hackney. The HWS development working group and the Health Inequalities group will work collaboratively to develop a prioritisation framework to help develop draft strategic priorities as part of this phase.

1.7 Stakeholder and resident participation, communications and engagement

The working group will utilise Hackney's Place Based Learning Network as a source of advice and guidance in shaping its co-production plans for the development of the strategy - ensuring that effective collaboration is built between the HWS development working group, local residents and key stakeholders in order to develop a shared strategic vision for the strategy. The working group will work to ensure inclusive participation within the development of the strategy, connecting with diverse communities, ensuring that we are reaching out to local people whose voices can be harder to hear, taking steps to overcome barriers to participation and encouraging local people, community groups and key stakeholders to have their say in the development of this strategy.

Strategy engagement work will build on existing assets and resident engagement/involvement mechanisms (e.g. Neighbourhood conversations, HCVS networks, Kings Park Moving Together programme, Integrated Care Communications and Engagement Enabler Group, Hackney Council's community engagement, empowerment and resilience next phase workstream).

Virtual methods of consultation and engagement are likely to be used as part of developing the strategy. The scale of virtual consultation will depend on the COVID-19 guidance at the time of the engagement and consultation planning and delivery, however, the working group will ensure that there are a range of inclusive ways for local people to get involved in developing the strategy, wherever possible.

1.8 Proposed project timelines

The draft timeline below provides an indication of the strategy development timescales for consideration. A detailed project plan will be developed and used to deliver the project within the anticipated timescales.
