1. **Summary**

- 1.1. This is an application to vary a a premises licence to allow authorisation for
 - To extend the hours for the sale of alcohol (on-sales)
 - To include the hours for the sale of alcohol (off-sales)
 - To include the hours for the late night refreshment
 - To include the hours for the recorded music

2. **Application**

- 2.1. Mr Kevin Jones has made an application to vary a premises licence under section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2.2. The premises is not located within a special policy area.
- 2.3. A hearing was scheduled on 25 August 2022 and after hearing from all parties, The Licensing- Sub- Committee decided to grant the applicant an adjournment to meet with the local councillor and the landlord to try and resolve the issues in dispute with a view to amending their application to hours that would be acceptable.
- 2.4. The applicant is seeking authorisation for the following licensable activities and times:

- 7.1. Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the London Borough of Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Policy) adopted by the Licensing Authority.
- 7.2. The Policy applies to applications where relevant representations have been made. With regard to this application, policies, LP1 (General Principles), LP2 (Licensing Objectives), LP3 (Core Hours), LP4 (Off Sales of Alcohol), LP5 (Planning Status) and LP11 (Cumulative Impact-General) are relevant.

8. Officer Observations

8.1. If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following additional/replace conditions should be applied the licence:

Replace condition 21 with:

A minimum of 1 SIA door supervisors shall be employed on a Friday and Saturday after 2000hrs when the venue is open after midnight and at other times on a risk assessment basis. When employed, all SIA staff shall wear a high visibility armband or vest to be easily identifiable. They shall enter their name, address, SIA number and times they begin and finish their shift in a daily register. If employed by an agency all agency contact details shall be recorded also.

Additional condition:

A dispersal policy is to be provided to police by the venue.

9. Reasons for Officer Observations

9.1. Additional and replace conditions have been agreed with Police.

10. **Legal Comments**

- 10.1. The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
 - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance
 - The Protection of Children from Harm
- 10.2. It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

Notes for Guidance

This application cannot be used to vary the licence so as to extend the period for which the licence has effect or to vary substantially the premises to which it relates. If you wish to make that type of change to the premises licence, you should make a new premises licence application under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.

Dispersal Policy

- Call last orders 20 mins prior to closing.
- Turn any music off 10 mins prior to closing time.
- All lights turned on to the brightest 10 mins before any music to be turned off.
- A staff member and/or security walks around thanking each group or individual in the
 premises for their custom and letting them know the premises are closed and advising
 them that they should leave as quickly as possible.
- Staff are directed to start cleaning up and glass collection.
- Ensure our signage encouraging customers to respect our neighbours and leave quietly are visible.
- Staff and/or security remain just outside and inside the premises encouraging customers
 who are leaving to do so; with no open drinks, quietly and to move away from the
 premises as quickly and orderly as possible.
- Provide information to customers who are in need of a taxi.
- Lollipops and sweets given to customers as they leave the premises to limit noise.

I write to make a representation in relation to this application.

The hours being sought in the application exceed those as set out in LP3 (Core Hours) of the Council's Licensing Policy. It is noted that residential property is located above the commercial properties surrounding the premises. This could have a negative impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives, most notably, the prevention of public nuisance. The applicant's attention is drawn to this policy which states:

LP3 Core Hours

Hours for licensable activity will generally be authorised, subject to demonstrating LP 1 and LP2, as follows:

- Monday to Thursday 08:00 to 23:00
- Friday and Saturday 08:00 to 00:00
- Sunday 10:00 to 22:30

Hours may be more restrictive dependent on the character of the area and if the individual circumstances require it.

Later hours may be considered where the applicant has identified any risk that may undermine the promotion of the licensing objectives and has put in place robust measures to mitigate those risks.

It is also noted from planning records that the planning permission ref: 2017/2980 restricts the hours of use to 09:00 to 23:00 Monday to Saturday and 09:00 to 20:30 on Sundays. The applicants attention is therefore drawn to LP5 (Planning) of the Council's Licensing Policy which states:

LP5 Planning Status

Licence applications should normally be from premises where:

- (a) The activity to be authorised by the licence is a lawful planning use or is a deemed permitted development pursuant to the General Permitted Development Order (1995) as amended.
- (b) The hours sought do not exceed those authorised by any planning permission.

The Licensing Authority may take into account the lack of planning permission or an established lawful use in deciding whether there is likely to be any harm to the licensing objectives. The above representations are supported by the following evidence and information.



We are instructed by ("the Freeholder").

We write to notify the Licensing Authority that the Freeholder objects to the granting of the Application.

BACKGROUND

are the freehold owner of the building at 206, Well Street, Hackney, which includes the Premises.

The ground floor unit is let to pursuant to a lease dated 13 November 2012 ("the Lease"), and where Mr Kevin Jones is the guarantor of the tenant's obligations under the Lease.

The Lease demises only the ground floor unit of 206 Well Street, Hackney, London.

are the freehold owner of not only the Premises, but also the properties at Well Street registered under HM Land Registry title No

That property owned by the Freeholder comprises currently adjoining commercial units at ground floor level and residential accommodation on the two/three floors above.

The Freeholder has become aware of the Application and note the deadline to object as specified on the Licensing Authority's website is <u>8 July 2022</u>. This letter of objection is being sent prior to that deadline.

Whilst it is accepted by the Freeholder that the Premises Licence has been granted, under the terms of the Lease, the tenant is only permitted to use the Premises "as a coffee shop or for any other use within use class 1A of the Town & Country Planning (Use Classes) Order 1987 as at the date this lease is granted...".



Accordingly, use as a bar/café is not permitted under the Lease.

The Freeholder reserves their position in that regard, including to take enforcement action under the Lease but would specifically make clear that this is not the only ground upon which they object to the Application.

The Freeholder accordingly has a legal interest in the freehold of the Premises, and an entitlement for their objections to the Application to be considered.

THE APPLICATION

The existing Premises Licence allows the supply of alcohol to 23:30 on Fridays and Saturdays, with the opening hours of the Premises being permitted until 00:00.

By the Application, the applicant seeks to extend the hours of operation to 2:30am with the playing of recorded music, the provision of late-night refreshment and the supply of alcohol to 2am, each <u>being extended by two and a half hours.</u>

By seeking permission for off-sales, the Application does not satisfy LP4 of the Statement of Licensing Policy 2018-2023 ("the Policy").

It is further noted these extended hours are outside the Licensing Authority's Core Hours, and contrary to the Policy, the applicant has not put in place robust proposals to mitigate those risks to the Licensing Objectives.

Cumulative impact is also relevant, particularly in respect of off-sales where it is stated in the Policy that Hackney already has a large number of venues selling alcohol into the early hours of the morning to supplement "on-trade".

The Freeholder also suggests (for the reasons set out below) that the applicant has not demonstrated an understanding/sufficient understanding to comply with the Policy's General Principles at LP1.

Within the Application, it is suggested that the applicant hosts a number of events at the Premises from community meetings, art exhibitions, book launches and poetry nights to supper clubs, birthday celebrations and funeral wakes.

It is suggested that save in respect of some birthday celebrations (and perhaps a limited number of funeral wakes) the extended hours the Applicant seeks would not be necessary for such uses.

The applicant also makes reference to the apparent intent to only "occasionally" play recorded music and that he does not intend to open until 2:30am on every Friday or Saturday.

However, the Application includes no such limitation on the frequency of the playing of recorded music/opening hours and therefore (if granted) would permit opening until 2:30am on <a href="everyttem://example.com/example.

The Freeholder does not know whether the applicant has indeed made applications/been granted TENs, but it is suggested that this is more appropriate in any event for the occasional extension of licensable activities if that is what the applicant seeks.

Within the Application, the applicant states:

"We have a premises licence which enables us to sell alcohol and food both on and off the premises...."

However, the Premises License sent to us by the Licensing Authority specifically states "On Premises" only.



It would therefore appear the applicant is already operating in contravention of the Premises Licence, or at the very least, misunderstands what licensable activities the Premises Licence permits.

THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES

The Freeholder submit that the Application demonstrates little regard has been had to how the Application would impact upon the Licensing Objectives.

The Freeholder set out their objections below by reference to the relevant Licensing Objectives:

1 THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

The Premises License relates specifically to licensable activities carried out "On Premises".

The Freeholder submits that to vary the Premises Licence to permit off-sales of both food and drink (which is what the variation seeks) would substantially increase the risk of crime and disorder taking place in and/or in the immediate vicinity outside the Premises.

It is suggested highly likely that those patrons buying food and drink for consumption off the Premises are (to a potentially significant degree) likely to seek to consume the same in the street(s) nearby.

There is no reference to the provision of any door supervisors or similar.

There is no suggestion as to how the applicant would seek to mitigate or reduce such risks.

The applicant suggests that no glasses or bottles would be taken outside - but it is therefore unclear how (for example) the applicant would propose to sell beer and other alcoholic drinks for consumption off the Premises.

No suggestion is made as to whether the intention is that alcohol for consumption off the Premises would be provided in "opened" or "closed" containers.

In the event of closed containers, there is of course the potential for use as offensive weapons.

It is submitted that permitting the Premises to be open from 8am with alcohol supplied from 11am until 2:30am on Fridays and Saturdays will increase the risk of crime and disorder.

The applicant suggests within the Application it will make sure there are clear signs letting customers know that CCTV is in operation both inside and just outside the Premises.

The Premises Licence (conditions 9-12) already requires the provision of a CCTV system.

It is also noted that the Policy highlights the impact of public disorder associated with the provision of late-night supply of alcohol.

2 **PUBLIC SAFETY**

The applicant merely suggests that no glasses or bottles are to be taken outside the Premises.

The applicant does not explain how he proposes to deal with off-sales of alcohol.

Condition 15 to the Premises Licence already requires that there be no glass, drinks or open containers taken outside of the Premises at any time.



It is suggested there may also be issues in relation to public safety resulting from groups of patrons congregating outside the Premises (which fronts onto a relatively narrow pavement and through public highway).

It is note that the Premises Licence provides there shall be a maximum of five smokers outside the venue at any one time, and this limitation suggests a potential issue.

3 PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

This is of significant concern to the Freeholder and a primary reason for objecting to the Application.

As stated, the Freeholder own the property at) Well Street.

Above each commercial unit is residential occupation.

The Freeholder are accordingly most concerned as to the impact of noise and nuisance upon any residential occupiers.

This concern relates not only to residential accommodation above the commercial parade at Well Street, but there is also residential accommodation opposite and in the near vicinity.



There is already a condition (Condition 22) to the Premises Licence providing:

"No noise should be audible in the nearest noise sensitive premises".

As stated, there is residential accommodation immediately above the Premises.

It is not clear what noise insulation nor other noise reduction measures are in place or that the applicant proposes to put in place. The applicant certainly does not propose within the Application the implementation of any additional noise reduction measures.

Instead, the applicant also seeks to extend the current above condition, by stating that any music will only be kept "within suitable noise levels". This is very different to the condition requiring "no noise" to be audible....."

There is no suggestion what the applicant considers "suitable" to be, nor how it is proposed to be monitored/enforced. The applicant does not state he proposes to install noise limiters.

No evidence has been adduced to seek to persuade the Licensing Authority to relax Condition 22.

The Freeholder accordingly submit there are very grave concerns that by granting the Application, there will be a significant risk public noise nuisance.

There is also, it is submitted, an increased risk of intoxicated patrons demonstrating rude, abusive or unruly behaviour outside of the Premises until 2:30am and for a period afterwards.

Whilst the applicant states it will adopt a "zero tolerance" policy, it fails to explain what it in fact actually proposes to do to mitigate the risks of public nuisance.

On the assumption that the applicant adheres to Condition 23, there could be up to 70 patrons leaving the Premises at or around 2:30am every Friday and Saturday.



There is residential accommodation both immediately above the Premises, on the upper floors of the parade and opposite the Premises on Wells Street and Crescent Road.

The Freeholder are also unclear how the applicant proposes to address the risk of littering etc by extending the licensable activities to "off sales".

4 PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

It is submitted little thought has been given to this Licensing Objective.


Will children be permitted in the Premises during such extended hours?
