# 1. **Summary**

### 6. **Guidance Considerations**

6.1. The Licensing Authority is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003.

## 7. **Policy Considerations**

- 7.1. Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the London Borough of Hackney's Statement of Licensing Policy ("the Policy) adopted by the Licensing Authority.
- 7.2. The Policy applies to applications where relevant representations have been made. With regard to this application, policies, LP1 (General Principles), LP2 (Licensing Objectives), LP3 (Core Hours) and LP6 (External Areas and Outdoor Events) are relevant.

### 8. Officer Observations

8.1. If the Sub-Committee is minded to approve the application, the following conditions should be applied the licence:

Supply of Alcohol(On/Both)

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
  - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence.
  - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
  - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
  - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
  - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5. 5.1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sales or supply of alcohol.
  - 5.2 The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
  - 5.3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years if age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
    - A. a holographic mark or
    - B. an ultraviolet feature.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that:
  - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
  - beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
  - gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
  - still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
    - a. these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
    - b. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that

### these measures are available.

### Minimum Drinks Pricing

- 7. 7.1 A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
  - 7.2 For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 7.1 above -
  - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
  - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D+(DxV) Where -
  - (i)P is the permitted price,
  - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
  - (c) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol:
  - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
  - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
  - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
  - (e) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
  - (f) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
  - 7.3 Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8.2(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub- paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
  - 7.4 (1) Sub-paragraph 7.4(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 7.2(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
  - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### **Conditions derived from Responsible Authority representations**

- 8. The premises shall maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All public areas, entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer.
- 9. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to show Police or an authorised officer of Hackney Borough Council recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 10. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available immediately to an authorised officer of the Hackney Borough Council or the Police, which will record the following: all crimes reported to the venue any complaints received any incidents of disorder any faults in the CCTV system any refusal of the sale of alcohol any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 11. There shall be clear and prominent signage asking all customers to leave quietly and respect local residents.
- 12. All instances of crime or disorder to be reported by the designated premises supervisor or responsible member of staff to an agreed police contact point, as agreed with the Police.
- 13. Where the sale or supply of alcohol is taking place employees of the premises must request sight of evidence of the age of any person appearing to be under 25 years of age (Challenge 25). Such evidence may include a driving licence or passport.
- 14. The premises will display and maintain appropriate signage advising customers of the contact details of the Designated Premises Supervisor.
- 15. All staff will be given refresher training every six months on the legislation relating to the sales of alcohol to underage persons and drunken persons. Written records of this training shall be kept on the premises and produced to police or other authorised officer upon request.
- 16. There shall be no open containers or drinks taken outside the premises at any time except to those seated in the outside seating area.

- 17. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied for consumption on the premises other than to people taking a substantial table meal from the menu and that the consumption of such alcohol is ancillary to taking table meals. This shall be served by waiter/waitress service.
- 18. The garden shall not accessed/used by customers at anytime.

### 9. Reasons for Officer Observations

9.1. Conditions (8) to (17) are agreed with the Police and condition (18) is agreed with the Environmental Protection team.

### 10. **Legal Comments**

- 10.1. The Council has a duty as a Licensing Authority under the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the following 4 licensing objectives;
  - The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
  - Public Safety
  - Prevention of Public Nuisance
  - The Protection of Children from Harm
- 10.2. It should be noted that each of the licensing objectives have equal importance and are the only grounds upon which a relevant representation can be made and for which an application can be refused or terms and conditions attached to a licence.

### 11. Human Rights Act 1998 Implications

- 11.1. There are implications to;
  - Article 6 Right to a fair hearing
  - *Article 14* Not to discriminate
  - Balancing: **Article 1-** Peaceful enjoyment of their possession (i.e. a licence is defined as being a possession) with **Article 8** Right of Privacy (i.e. respect private & family life) to achieve a proportionate decision having regard to the protection of an individuals rights against the interests of the community at large.

A small restaurant in Stock Newington, London on 63 Nevill Road. The area consists of a mixed residential and commercial properties some of which include an off-license, café and pubs. The restaurant is located on the ground floor of a two story town house. The restaurant will however, occupy the ground floor and basement. The premises being occupied contains the main restaurant with a kitchen, a seating area, a bar and a toilet. The basement will be used as a storage however, there is an additional toilet which will be used by staff and a garden. This premises was previously used as a restaurant.
We intend to provide meals and alcohol on the Ground floor Restaurant/Bar area. The bar area will be segregated by a bar counter and only authorised staff will be allowed in the area. All alcohol stock will be stored in the basement in a storage room that will be locked at all times and the key holder will be the duty manager.
The restaurant will cater to residents, guests, and diners who are interested in indulging in our tapas style menu. As Londoners, we aim to bring diversity and inclusion to the area and continue to promote the values of the Council and London as a whole.

# a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

We are aware of the importance of adhering to these objectives in order to ensure the smooth operation of the restaurant and to ensure public safety. We will also provide emergency contact details to staff should they face any concerns of criminal activities or disorder. All staff will be trained on good customer service which includes making sure there is order at the premises. Staff will also be trained to check IDs for any customers who appear to be under the age of 25 and alcoholic drinks will not be said if the customer is unable to prove their age.

We plan on displaying signs at point of sale such as "Challenge 25" posters.

### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Prevention of crime and disorder is very important to allow for a thriving and successful business. Crime and disorder of any form will be taken very seriously and staff will be trained to alert the police and other emergency service if necessary. Staff will be trained on all types of crimes including illegal use of drugs, financial, fraudulent activities and how to deal with such circumstances.

Staff will be trained to descalate unpleasant situations and in some cases remove individuals who may be acting in a disorderly manner.

We we will display signs within the restaurant highlighting we do not tolerate criminal activites on the premises such as the use of recreational drugs.

### c) Public safety

Our aim as a business is to provide a great atomosphere for customers to enjoy a good meal in a safe environment. In ensuring that this aim is achieved, we will ensure all staff are trained on the safe handling of food and drinks. We will ensure all facilities are kept clean and tidy at all times and check that staff have the correct certification before working. We will make sure we are complying with all fire safety rules and use visual aid to inform customers and staff or their nearest fire exit as well as install fire safety equipement. Our staff will be trained on how to prevent common injuries likely to occur in a restaurant and if in the rare occasion that it happens, how to treat such injuries. The duty manager will be first aid trained and will also undergo a fire marshall training course.

### d) The prevention of public nuisance

We will consider our neighbours when operating our business and will ensure that there the noise level is kept at a minimal. We have used acoustic panel in the restaurant which is geared towards obsorbing noise and keeping it at a minimal. We will also ensure that our customers do not litter in the space outside the restaurant and should we find any customers who are behaving in a way we do not deem appropriate, we will try and speak to them.

We will follow all relevant rules and regulations required and address concerns of individuals appropriately.

We we display signage within the restaurant informing customers to respect our neighbours when leaving the restaurant.

### e) The protection of children from harm

There will be no underage drinking at our premises and children of school age must be acompanied by an adult. We will ensure all bar staff are have a personal alcohol licence and are able to prove by providing their certificates.

If there are any concerns about a child being in harms way, we will contact the police and other relevant authorities.





As per your recommendations, we can confirm that there will be no business trading after 10pm and all windows and doors will be closed.





Dear Neighbors,

We acknowledge receipt of your letter.

I am writing to you with the sincerest gratitude and appreciation for welcoming us into your lovely neighbourhood. Nevill Road has become a second home to us and we couldn't be more grateful. We would also like to thank you for reaching out to express your concerns regarding the application for a premises alcohol license at 63 Nevill Road.

I understand from the responses that you are worried about the potential for late-night noise and disturbance from the business, and you believe that the location may not be suitable for a licensed premises.

After carefully considering the points, you have raised, I would like to address them individually. Firstly, you mentioned that this premises has not been able to sell alcohol in the past and has always operated as a daytime eating establishment. While this is true, as many of you may be aware, we have been lucky to work with the chefs from the previous business and are slowly building a clientele, both old and new. Although our initial plan was to grow our rum business, we have come to realise that the community is receptive to Caribbean food. We would like to continue working with our chef serving the community but also evolve and adapt to the changing needs of their customers. We aim to serve alcohol along with food. We hope to serve our own distilled alcohol which is bottled in small quantities.

Secondly, you pointed out that the area is a quiet residential street with a high density of residents, including families with young children. I completely understand your concern for maintaining the tranquillity of our neighbourhood. However, it is worth mentioning that responsible businesses can coexist harmoniously with residential communities. We reassure you that we have taken this into consideration and have no intentions of creating a loud late-night establishment. Our opening times will be from 9am where we will be serving coffee and pastries and close at 9pm. As you may have already seen, since we started trading, we have closed by 9pm with no issues.

Regarding the potential nuisance of noise and disruption, I assure you that I am fully aware of the importance of maintaining a peaceful environment. As stated in the paragraph above, we will take all necessary measures to minimise any potential disturbances. This includes implementing appropriate soundproofing measures by adding an additional glass to the windows within the premises and ensuring that any outdoor seating area is managed in a way that does not cause disturbance to our residential community. Additionally, I will closely monitor the behaviour of customers and take prompt action if any rowdy or antisocial behaviour occurs.

Furthermore, you mentioned that the premises is not standalone like some other alcohol-serving establishments in the area but is instead embedded in a residential block. While it is true that the premises is located within a residential block, it is important to note that businesses within such areas can still operate responsibly and considerately, ensuring that any potential noise or disturbance is minimized. We have now installed CCTV cameras on the inside and outside of the premises. I am dedicated to ensuring that my staff are trained to recognize and address any potential issues promptly. Furthermore, I will work closely with local authorities and adhere to all relevant regulations to ensure the safety and well-being of both customers and residents.

Regarding the specific concerns, I want to clarify that the license for alcohol consumption on the premises does indeed refer to inside the building and does not extend to the garden or the street in front of 63 Nevill Road. It is essential for me to maintain a controlled environment within the premises to minimise

any impact on our neighbourhood. We do not intend to use the garden for anything other than grilling and use by staff for breaks.

Regarding the garden, I understand that its proximity to your property and those of our neighbours creates a potential for noise amplification. As previously stated, we have made enquiries about soundproofing and changing the windows. I assure you that my intention is not to compromise your peace and privacy. I will ensure that any outdoor seating or activities are managed in a way that respects the residential nature of the area.

Regarding the proposed closing time of 11pm and alcohol sales until 10pm, I understand your concern about noise and disturbance beyond 10pm. We have adjusted our closing time to 10pm. Customers are expected to leave the premises at 9pm to allow us to clean. I believe it is reasonable to expect a residential business to cease generating noise by this time. However, it is worth mentioning that many establishments in the area have closing times of 11pm and over but to reduce potential noise disruption, we have reduced our closing times. It appears that other similar establishments in the area have managed to operate without significant disruption to the neighbourhood. We will make every effort to disburse customers quietly after 10pm.

I appreciate your warm welcome for a new business in the area, and I understand your desire to maintain the peaceful nature of our community. Your suggestion for conditional requirements on the license is thoughtful and reasonable. I will convey these suggestions to the Council and responsible authorities for their consideration. I believe that implementing these conditions, such as not allowing drinks or food to be consumed outside the premises after 10pm, keeping all windows and doors shut after 10pm, and refraining from playing music after 10pm, will help address your concerns and ensure a peaceful coexistence between the business and the residents. However, you can see from the paragraphs above that these measures are already in place.

In summary, In regards to:

- 1. Crime and Disorder, we are committed to ensuring that all licensing conditions, authorised activities, and authorised hours are strictly adhered to. We will implement robust measures to prevent any breaches and actively cooperate with the relevant enforcement agencies, including the police force, to maintain order and security.
- 2. Public Safety: We understand that residential areas tend to have a higher concentration of families and vulnerable individuals. To address this concern, we have conducted a thorough assessment of the potential impact of our premises on public safety. We have taken into account factors such as disturbances, increased traffic, fire risks, and anti-social behaviour. Our aim is to create a safe and welcoming environment for all members of the community. We will implement appropriate measures to address these concerns, including noise mitigation strategies, waste management protocols, and measures to ensure public health and sanitation.
- 3. Public Nuisance: We recognise the importance of maintaining harmony within the community and minimising any potential disruptions. We are committed to mitigating noise disturbances, late-night activity, and increased footfall in close proximity to residential properties. Our team will work diligently to ensure that we operate within the designated authorised hours, while also implementing measures to reduce noise levels and minimize any inconvenience to our neighbours. We will actively encourage our customers to respect the local community and to behave responsibly.

We want to assure you that we value the well-being and quality of life of our neighbours. We believe that responsible alcohol service can coexist with a residential setting when proper measures and protocols are in place. We are committed to working closely with the relevant enforcement agencies to address and mitigate any concerns that have been raised.

I would like to make a representation with regards to the Kellmans Group Ltd application on Nevill Road (N16 8SW) for the supply of alcohol on the premises from 12:00 - 22:00 Mon to Sun.



As a resident living door down from the premises, I am concerned with the potential for late night noise and disturbance from this business and believe it is not a very suitable location for a licensed premises.

The facts, as I see them are:

- · This premises has not been able to sell alcohol in the past
- It has always been used as a day time eating establishment and not as a night time restaurant / bar
- The area is a quiet residential street with a high density of residents including many families with young children
- The premises is not standalone like some of the other alcohol serving establishments in this residential area (e.g. the Londesborough) but instead is embedded in the residential block with flats directly above and either side
- The proposed closing time of 11pm combined with alcohol sales until 10pm has the potential for noise and disturbance beyond 10pm (which I'd consider to be a fair time for a residential business to stop making noise from)

I welcome great new businesses to the area and having discussed their plans with the Kellmans Group Ltd owners it is clear this is not aimed to be a loud late night establishment. That said, it would be serving cocktails and hard liquor until 10pm and would be open until 11pm and with this there is significant potential for noise and disturbance beyond 10pm. Also granting an alcohol license on a quiet residential street sets a precedent for future owners of the property and other businesses looking to do similar in the area. The wider area has plenty of streets with opportunities to start alcohol serving businesses including the High Street, Church Street and Newington Green.

If it is deemed that the license does have to be granted I think it needs to be conditional on:

- 1. No drinks or food bought on the premises to be consumed outside the premises after 10pm
- 2. No use of the outside space to the front of the property or back of the property after 10pm
- 3. All windows and doors must be shut after 10pm
- 4. No music after 10pm
- 5. The owners make best efforts to disburse customers guietly after 10pm

I write concerning this application for a licence for the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises from 12:00 to 22:00 Mon to Sun. I live a few doors down from the premises and am writing in my personal capacity.

I wish to make representations concerning the prevention of public nuisance and the prevention of crime and disorder.

Concerning **public nuisance:** In my opinion this location is inappropriate for a licensed premises, particularly if the venue would be open and serving alcohol at evenings and weekends. The property is in a residential terrace and my concern is that any licensed premises may negatively affect the character of the immediate area (I do not believe that the previous occupants were licensed, or recall that they stayed open very late). The potential nuisance would be noise and disruption due to the nature of the business, which I understand is intended to be a bar or restaurant, particularly into the evenings and at weekends with people coming and going, and the consumption of alcohol increasing the risk of rowdy or antisocial behaviour. This concern would also apply to any outdoor seating as any noise and/or smoking pollution from customers sitting outside would be particularly disturbing.

Concerning **crime and disorder:** I would repeat the points above, particularly around the consumption of alcohol potentially leading to noise and disruption. In my view this foreseeably increases the risk of disorder and antisocial behaviour, which would be unwelcome anywhere but particularly outside normal hours in a residential area.

I take no pleasure in raising these issues and do not wish to discourage any business from succeeding, however I am concerned about the effect that the grant of any licence may have in this particular location.

I am the leaseholder of Nevill Road, N16 where I have lived in quiet enjoyment and at peace with my neighbours for over 20 years, since April 2023. I was sorry to see the departure of Junior's Caribbean café from 63 Nevill Road, and would welcome the premises being put to new use in a similarly neighbourhood-enhancing way, but am extremely concerned that the present licencing application will lead to unacceptable noise disturbance.

Junior's served food, not alcohol, to be taken away or consumed inside the cafe during daytime and early evening hours. Its trade and customers caused no disturbance. But a bar serving alcohol until 10pm and remaining open until 11pm is very different proposition, not suitable for this densely residential street and neighbourhood unless:

- "On the premises" means inside the building, NOT in the garden or on the street in front of no.63
- If music is permitted it is only up to 10pm and at a specified and reasonable maximum volume.
- The owners to use best endeavours to ensure that customers disperse quietly after 10pm and to require their staff to take active steps to achieve this.

A note about the garden:

My "flat" comprises the basement and first floor of no. In the garden of no on one side and from the Londesborough Road flats at the bottom, but a mere wooden fence stands between my garden and that of no.63. My bedroom overlooks the garden as do the balconies of my 4 upstairs neighbours, and windows of our neighbours at no (structurally and are a single building). All of us would have our peace and privacy compromised if the garden of no.63 were to become commercially licenced hospitality premises 7 nights a week. Noise travels easily and is amplified in the space between the back of Nevill Road's buildings and the Londesborough Road flats. Occasionally I have been disturbed by neighbours' private parties in the flats or back gardens, but that is all part of the give and take of city life. A far cry from all of us settled residents suddenly having our living environments disrupted on a daily basis by the imposition of open air licenced premises over my garden fence.

I hope you will pay serious attention to these public nuisance concerns and act accordingly.

Nevill Rd is a quiet, residential street and the granting of this licence will likely negatively affect the residents on the street, due to noise and the disruption the presence of a bar serving alcohol until 10pm at night is likely to cause.

The possibility for anti-social behaviour is also high and would have an extremely negative affect on what is current a quiet, residential area, with many children and families trying to sleep at a time when people are likely to spill out from a premises selling alcohol.

I would urge you strongly to take these public disturbance issues into consideration when you consider issuing this licence and act accordingly.

I am making a representation to the potential approval of the premises licence application submitted by Kellmans Group Ltd for 63 Nevill Road, London N16 8SW. Based on the licensing objectives outlined I believe that granting this licence would not align with these objectives, specifically with regards to the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the prevention of public nuisance. These objections are made more poignant by the location of the premises on a residential street and with its request to serve alcohol until late at night.

Please allow me to outline my objections using the relevant guidance:

- 1. Crime and Disorder: Considering the residential nature of the area where the premises is located, granting a licence raises concerns about breaches of licensing conditions, authorised activities and authorised hours all of which if go unchecked would have an increased impact on the neighbourhood. With the residential location, the premises would receive less attention from the police force and would have less foot traffic in order for the area to be self-regulating.
- 2. Public Safety Objective: The fact that the premises is situated within a residential area, as opposed to a high street or commercial district, further amplifies concerns regarding public safety. Residential areas are typically characterised by a higher concentration of families and vulnerable individuals who may be more susceptible to the potential risks associated with the proposed activities. It is crucial to assess the impact of the premises on public safety, taking into account the potential for disturbances, increased traffic, and associated risks within a residential setting. This is furthered by the increased fire risks and anti-social behaviour. There are also issues concerning sleep and health due to noise. There is also increased risk of sanitary conditions with refuse adding to concerns of public health in urban environments.
- 3. Public Nuisance: The operation of the premises within a residential area heightens the risk of public nuisance, considering factors such as noise disturbances, late-night activity, and increased footfall in close proximity to residential properties. It is important to acknowledge that the consequences of public nuisance within a residential context can be particularly disruptive and detrimental to the quality of life for nearby residents. No amount of measures would be able to adequately prevent and mitigate disturbances to ensure harmony within the community. There would be a dramatic increase in noise, and noise complaints, and as a family area there would be detrimental impact on a great number of the surrounding community.

In anticipation of the potential approval of the premises licence, I urge you to consider the significant risks associated with granting the licence to Kellmans Group Ltd, particularly in a residential area.

I kindly request that the relevant enforcement agencies carefully assess the potential impact of the proposed activities on the residential community and thoroughly evaluate the measures proposed by the applicant to address and mitigate the concerns raised.
