Item 4 - Library of Things

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Outline

A library of things is a community resource where people can borrow items they need for short-term use for a range of different purposes. The Dalston Library of Things was set up pre-pandemic and is a social enterprise that helps people save money and reduce waste by affordably renting out useful items like drills, sound systems and sewing machines from local spaces – and by helping neighbours share practical skills. This concept promotes resource sharing, reduces waste, and allows people to access items they may not want to buy or can't afford to buy outright.

This discussion will include information about the areas below.

- 1. Information about the Library of Things service in Hackney and how the service meets the Council's Strategic Plan objectives and net zero ambition.
- 2. Information about the hire charges, user cohort and customer feedback for the Library of Things service.
- 3. Information about why the 'Library of Things' has been successful in Dalston in comparison to other locations, the plans to manage and respond to increasing demand and the measures of success.
